CONSTITUTION.

ADOPTED IN 1878.

ARTICLE 1. This Association shall be known as the Shiawassee Baptist Association, and shall be composed of Baptist churches in fellowship with the denomination, and each church shall be entitled to three delegates, and an additional delegate for every fifty mem-

ART. 2. This Association has no power as a LEGISLATIVE body, but as an INDEPEND-ENT body has power to govern itself, and disclaims all interference with the particular dis-cipline of individual churches. Yet we deem it our privilege to judge for ourselves of the propriety of continuing any church in our connection.

ART. 3. The objects of this Association shall be to gather information in regard to

the state of the churches, both as it respects STATISTICS and RELIGION, to promote Christian fellowship, and to sustain the various benevolent objects connected with the promotion of

Christ's kingdom.

ART. 4. This Association shall, by delegation of churches, meet annually on the first Wednesday and Thursday of June, and shall hold such other meetings as the body may

ART. 5. The officers shall be a Moderator, Clerk, Corresponding Secretary, rer, Auditor, and Associational Superintendent, to be elected annually, to continue in office until others are elected.

Each church shall send with its delegates a letter containing an account of ART. 6. its numerical changes and generally what pertains to its peace and prosperity, and money for Minutes. Any church neglecting to do this for three successive years shall be dropped for Minutes. from the Minutes.

ART. 7. Churches giving satisfactory evidence of being sound in doctrine and correct in practice may, on application, be admitted into this Association.

ART. 8. This constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting, pro-

vided that notice of the proposed amendment has been given at the previous annual meeting.

CONSTITUTION SUNDAY-SCHOOL DEPARTMENT.

ARTICLE 1. This organization shall be called the Sunday-school Department of the Baptist Association and shall be auxiliary to the Michigan Baptist Sunday-school Convention or Association.

The object shall be to promote the interests of Baptist Sunday-schools in the ART. 2. bounds of the Association.

ART. 3. This organization shall be composed of the Pastors, Deacons and Delegates of the Churches, and the Officers, Teachers, and Delegates of the Sunday-schools in the Association.

The officers of this organization shall be elected annually, and consist of a President, Superintendent, Treasurer, and one Vice-President from each Church and Mission School in the Association, of whom the President, Superintendent, Treasurer, and two Vice-Presidents to be designated by the body shall constitute an Executive Board.

ART. 5. The Moderator of the Association shall be the President of this body, and

the Treasurer of the Association shall be the Treasurer of this body.

Art. 6. The President and Treasurer shall discharge the usual duties of such officers.

Art. 7. The Superintendent shall keep a record of each meeting, and shall have a general oversight of the Sunday-school work of the body. He shall call the meetings of the Executive Board to arrange for the meetings in Institutes and Conventions, circulate the programmes by correspondence or visitation, see that the work in each field is faithfully done, be the medium of correspondence with the State Superintendent, and secure and forward to him, at least one month previous to the annual meeting of the State Sunday-school Convention, statistics of the schools in his field.

ART. 8. It shall be the duty of the Executive Board to make arrangements for the meetings of the body, to prepare its programme, select speakers, raise funds to defray its expenses, consider the wants of the field and appoint and plan work to meet them. They shall also aid the Vice-President to establish and maintain Baptist Sunday-schools.

ART. 9. It shall be the duty of each Vice-President to secure the organization of a Baptist Sunday-school under the care of the church of which he is a member; and also to organize and encourage mission schools in all adjoining neighborhoods where they are needed.

ART. 10. The annual meeting of this body shall be held in connection with the annual meeting of the Association. Other meetings shall be called at the discretion of the Executive Board.

This Constitution may be altered or amended at any regular meeting by a ART. 11. majority vote of the members present.

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MINUTES.

HE Forty-eighth annual session was held with the Baptist church of Owosso, Wednesday and Thursday, June 1st and 2d, 1887.

RESOLUTIONS.

Your committee recommend the following:

Resolved, That the cause of missions still needs our earnest thought, prayer and support. Though designated as "Home and Foreign," and having two boards of management, the cause is one, and our duty is to give the Gospel to every creature, whether in America or inlands across the sea. We rejoice that the reports from our societies this year show that the debts are all paid, but we nevertheless recommend increased contributions, that our missionary work at home and abroad may be extended.

Resolved, That we will still support the State Convention to the extent of our means in aiding feeble churches in Michigan, and in opening new fields for the preaching of the Gospel.

Resolved, That in the work of evangelization and Christian endeavor, there is no power against us so great as the liquor traffic. We therefore pledge ourselves to make an uncompromising warfare against this enemy and will work for its entire prohibition.

Resolved, That we congratulate the ministers and society in the success which has attended its efforts thus far in establishing a home for superannuated ministers, and we recommend that a collection be taken in each church annually for this worthy object.

Resolved, That we are heartily in favor of Christian education, and strongly desire to see our college at Kalamazoo put in such a condition financially and otherwise as will make it a source of educational strength and power.

Resolved, That our thanks are due to the church of Owosso for its bountiful provision for our physical wants and the delightful hospitality of their homes.

DIGEST OF LETTERS.

Antrim.—Another year gone, another year of fighting against sin. We have held the "banner" aloft. We are weak and labor under discouragements, yet determined to live. Rev. J. E. Platt closed his pastorate last Jan'y, having been with us three years with success. Rev. Arthur Day commenced in March. Also held some extra meetings. Baptized three. Have services once in two weeks—good attendance. Present membership thirty-five.

Bath.—The year past has been one of prosperity—some mercy drops have proved God's saving presence. During the winter we held extra meetings. The conversions were among Sunday-school scholars and young people. This has given courage and greater efficiency. We continue Rev. A. R. Hicks as pastor. He has broken to us the bread of life seven years. On the third Sabbath in June we will visit the baptismal waters and expect to keep on sowing and reaping.

Bengal and Riley.—We are thankful for mercies spiritual and temporal. Rev. G. S. Northrop resigned in December. Was without preaching three months. In March secured Rev. M. L. Marvin of St. Johns each Lord's day. Services well attended. Our pastor has won his way to our hearts. Covenant meetings well attended and of great profit.

Byron.—Prof. Brayton's services closed last fall, and Rev. Arthur Day has become pastor. We have Sunday morning services now instead of afternoon, and a flourishing Sunday-sehool under the faithful supervision of Bro. J. S. Smith. Church scattered but looks with prayerful and earnest spirit for the Lord's blessing upon the sower and the seed. Raising money for sanctuary improvements. Cordially invite the Association.

Chesaning.—Encouraged. June 1st, 1886. Rev. C. W. Bennett commonced, and for four months earnestly prosecuted work among us, winning our heasts. Regretfully accepted his resignation and were again without

preaching until April 1st, when Rev. J. J. Martin became pastor. Sunday-school, prayer and covenant meetings attended with increasing interest. Though embarrassed with debt, have raised \$150 toward it and have purchased a bell and have \$100 on hand to pay for it. Pray for us.

Corunna.—Past year one of change. Bro. Snider, on account of failing health, gave up the care of the church. About the middle of January Rev. I. R. Spencer became pastor. Congregation increasing and as a church thankful to again have morning services and encouraged by increased interest and regularity of attendance of both officers and pupils in attending Sunday-school.

Dewitt.--We have maintained service every alternate Lord's day. Pastor A. R. Hicks, who has served us for six years, has resigned. R. H. Covert of St. Johns supplies us during the summer. We are not strong enough numerically or financially to support a pastor alone. Membership very much scattered. Have about 28 paying members. Maintain a Sunday-school during the year. Shall observe children's day.

Durand.—We are glad to report progress. Have baptized six and five more to be baptized. Have been without a pastor since April. Prayer meetings on Wednesday and Sunday evenings. Good attendance. Also covenant meetings. Our house of worship was dedicated last November 14th, free of debt, although \$173 of pledges yet to be redeemed. At present not able to support a pastor. Yet trusting and wishing for better things.

Laingsburg.—Last year were full of discouragements. Our house of worship had been closed for over a year. Past year one of reviving and blessing. Bro. Covert held a six-days' meeting with us the first of August, and the ninth of September Bro. W. S. Cole was publicly ordained by council as our pastor, and has since labored with us with great zeal and success. In January C. S. Bullock came and held a meeting of three weeks, resulting in great good. A large number expressed hope in God's saving mercy. Fourteen have been baptized. Are still weak financially.

Lansing.—We are enjoying the ministrations of Rev. E. H. E. Jameson, D. D., and we are working with him to the end that all departments of the Master's work shall receive due attention, and while we rejoice in good congregations and an efficient Sunday-school, with three missionary societies, we are not unmindful that the field is the world. Three of our membership, one of them one of the constituent members of the church, have passed on to their reward. Have made good progress toward paying the debt upon the new parsonage and expect to do the same this year.

Maple River.—We rejoice in a quickened zeal in development of spiritual life, and an earnest striving after holiness. Congregations are increased. Weekly prayer meetings well attended as is also the newly inaugurated cottage prayer meeting. We are also actively engaged in temperance effort. We desire to record the efficient help of the faithful sisters who are helpers in all our work.

Morrice.—We have no preaching or Sunday-school of our own, so that we are doing little for the cause of Christ, denominationally. Sisters have mission circle. Our Covenant meetings sustained most of the time.

Okemos.—We rejoice in that during the latter part of the year the Lord has in his providence sent among us Rev. B. N. Conway, who has by his coming brightened our prospects for usefulness. Our Sunday-school is well attended and from it we hope to secure conversions that will increase us in numbers and efficiency.

Ovid.—Congregations large. We sustain the prayer mettings. Are deeply interested in the benevolent work of our denomination. Are still united in our pastor Rev. H. P. Eldredge, whose ministries are unwavering ly scriptural. Five of our membership have passed from the church militant to the church triumphant, one of them the Rev. J. Martin, one of the pioneer Baptist ministers of the state,

Owosso.—Extends a cordial welcome to the Association. As a church have labored the last year harmoniously in all branches of church work. Meetings quite well sustained though there has been no special religious interest. Make it a point to contribute to all the benevolent objects of our denomination. Greatly mourn the loss of some valuable members.

Perry.—During the past winter our town was canvassed for Christ. Fifteen volunteered and were baptized. Three restored. Lost one by death. Rev. J. E. Platt has entered his fourth year as pastor. Has proved himself a faithful worker. Sustain two prayer meetings weekly. Our young are growing under leadership of our pastor. Our Sunday school, superintended by Bro. O. Flint, is prospering.

Pittsburg.—We have been somewhat revived during the winter, but still we need more grace to the end that the cause of Christ be furthered among us, and sinners converted. Are enjoying a very prosperous union Sunday-school.

Shepardsville.—We have no pastor at present, but have hopes of better days. Ask the prayers of the Association to this end. Prayer and covenant meetings are kept up.

St. Johns.—One year ago we reported that we had commenced buildding a new house of worship. We went forth "believing." November 25, 1886, it was dedicated. During six months we had but one service, that on Lord's afternoon. In December, Rev. G.S. Northrop resigned. Rev. M. L. Marvin commenced in February. Our pastor, assisted by Rev. R. H. Covert, held three weeks' special meetings. Some conversions. Several reclaimed. The past year has been one of blessings. Our meetings are well sustained. The church extends an invitation for the associational gathering next year (1888) to be held with us.

Vernon.—Commenced the year with some fear and hesitation, but have been greatly blessed. In November held one week special services.

They were of great profit. In April called Bro. C. S. Bullock to assist in revival work, the other churches uniting. Some 70 professions, twentynine united with us. Our pastor is faithfully dispensing to us the "word." All services well attended. Our Sunday-school conducted by Bro. J. B. Harris. It is prospering. Have improved our house of worship by carpet, heating stoves and street lamp.

Webberville.—We are united and happy, and are encouraging the ministrations of Rev. Wm. Remington. We are sustaining a live Sunday-school, and our weekly prayer meetings are well attended. We are expecting the blessing of good upon us in the salvation of souls.

Williamston.—We are led to exclaim, "God is good." Have had the "word" faithfully preached by our esteemed pastor, Rev. Wm. Remington. Baptized five. We shall go forward sowing the seed. We mourn the loss of our sister Jane L. Brown; when the Lord called he found her watching. Have purchased a good parsonage. Cost \$1300. Paid down \$900, the balance in three years. Our services well attended. Our temperance motto, "Hold the Fort!"

LAINGSBURG. Two sisters received the call to "come up higher." Sisters Fanny McKee and Betsy Shirts, both aged and very faithful, though great sufferers.

MAPLE RIVER. Mrs. Dunlap was suddenly taken from the number of that small church to the great congregation above.

OVID. Five members were called from the church below to the church of the first born in heaven.

PITTSBURG. Mrs. Pitts was called to her rest and reward.

Owosso. The list is further increased by several deaths in this place. James A. Thompson, called to his reward, was a good student of the Bible, and a warm friend and supporter of the church. In October last the good and venerable Dea. E. Comstock was suddenly taken from earth to heaven. He was a constituent member of the church, and also of the State Convention; a mar of devout piety, of pure life and noble manhood. Betsy Lyon, wife of the late Dea. Lyon, aged 75, has passed away. Fourth—Letters from the churches read.

Fifth-Sunday-school reports and exercises.

Sixth-Application for admission into the Association received.

Seventh—The appointment of the following committee: 1. A committee of three on the Circular Letter. 2. A committee of three on Digest of Letters. 3. A committee on Resolutions. 4. A committee of three on Nominations, which committee shall designate the place of the next annual meeting, the preacher of the introductory sermon, and the delegates to the Baptist State Convention.

Eighth—Communications from corresponding bodies received Ninth—Reports of committees called for.
Tenth—Miscellaneous business.

Eleventh—Reading the Minutes of the Association.

XI. All churches neglecting to represent themselves to this body for two years in succession shall be visited by a committee chosen for the purpose, who shall report at the next annual meeting.

XII. Any article of this order may be suspended for consideration of other business by a vote of the Association.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS.

Resolved, That the treasurer be instructed to pay over all moneys that are in or may come into his hands to the several agents to whom said money belongs, and take a receipt therefor.

Resolved, That any member of this Association whose name is in the Minutes, present at the meeting of any Association with which we correspond, shall be a delegate to that body.

Resolved, That the Corresponding Secretary be instructed to forward the Minutes to each Association and corresponding body in the State.

Resolved, That churches requesting admission to this Association be required to show a formal recognition from a council of regular Baptist churches convened for such purpose.
