WILLIAMSTON, MICH., June 1st, 1897

Opened with prayer by A. C. Marshall, of Corunna.

After singing, reading of the Scriptures by Rev. L. D. Dunning. Committee on Program reported changes as follows, after appointment of committees, that Bro. C. E. Conley be given five minutes, and at 7:15 fifteen minutes, which was adopted.

Rev. L. H. Trowbridge presented the progress of liquidating the H. & F. M. debt—about \$20,000 yet needed.

Rev. A. E. Mather continued his appeal in behalf of the Minister's Home.

A collection of \$10.00 was then taken for the same.

- Rev. J. C. McDonald in the absence of Dr. Jameson, presented the cause of Home Missions.
- C. A. Johnson spoke in behalf of the American Baptist Publication Society.

Moderator appointed M. L. Marvin on Committee on Resolutions in place of D. D. O'Dell.

Committee on Minutes made verbal report of several churches having failed, one for three years, to contribute to the fund for minutes.

Committee on Resolutions reported as follows, which report was adopted.

Resolved. That we are in hearty sympathy with each of the great benevolent organizations of our denomination, and rejoice in the probable extinguishment in the united debts of the Missionary Union and the Home Mission Society.

Resolved, That we recommend all of our churches to make provision for a contribution, each year, for Home, State and Foreigh Missions, for the benevolent work of the Bible and Publication Society, for Christian and Ministerial education and for the Baptist Ministers' Aid Society.

Resolved. That we recommend that an earnest effort be made to secure something from every member of our churches for each of these objects, so that all may share in the blessedness of giving for the cause of Christ.

Resolved. That we commend the Publication Societies literature, The Michigan Christian Herald and the Baptist Union to our members and urge the more general use of these valuable instrumentalities for the training of our people for Christian work and usefulness.

Resolved. That we believe the traffic in intoxicating liquors is a grevious sin, and that to share in the profits of the business renders society a partner in the iniquity; and that it is the duty of every Christian voter to persistently demand that all laws which legalize the traffic be repealed, and that the sanction of the law be no longer given to the accurrsed business.

Resolved. That we rejoice in the prominence given to our young people's work, and recommend that all the Young People's Societies take up the work of raising funds for the various denominational objects, to the end that they may have greater incentives to action and that their aims may accompany their prayers for the coming of the Kindom of God.

Obituary Committee reported as follows:

Your Committee finds upon examination of the letters from the various churches, that the angel of death has visited us during the past year and removed quite a large number from our midst, and taken them to their eternal reward. Thirteen churches have thus been caused to mourn, with a total loss of 32.

Although we are left to mourn their loss, we find consolation in the knowledge that our loss is their gain. It is ours to emulate their virtues and to follow their example in as far as they were faithful to the Master, that we may be prepared to go whenever the call shall come to us to go up higher.

On motion, the special report with the St. Johns letter relative to the death of Sister Swegels, was ordered printed in the Minutes.

Treasurer's report called for, and in his absence, Clerk reported \$18.08 received for Minutes, and \$15.12 for State Convention.

Committee on Systematic Benificence reported by recommending the following resolutions; which on motion was adopted:

Resolved. That this Association appoint a commission on Systematic Beneficience in accordance with the suggestion of the Baptist Denomination in its Anniversary Meeting in Asbury Park in 1896, to co-operate with the various Missionary Agencies of the Denomination in disseminating missionary literature, and in securing better support for our Missionary Work throughout the state, the nation and the world.

Resolved. That the Commission consist of five persons—three brethren and two sisters, and that they be instructed to secure the appointment of a Commission in each church at ouce, to aid them in carrying out the plan of the work.

Committee recommend that the resolutions be adopted.

Moderator in compliance with the foregoing, appointed Rev. D. B. Davidson, of Vernon; Rev. J. C. McDonald, of Williamston; Rev. M. L. Marvin, of Okemos; Mrs. J. Fisher, of Corunna; and Mrs. D. D. O'Dell, of Lansing as such Committee.

Moved by Rev. D. B. Davidson, seconded by Bro. C. A. Johnson, that the thanks of this body be extended to the Baptist church of Williamston, Mich., and the friends of the church who assisted them, for the very kind and hospitable entertainment we have received during our sojourn amoung them.

On Motion, pending reported resignation of D. D. Mills as S. S. Superintendent, W. M. Hoag, of Lansing, was elected assistant. Report of Missionary Committee as follows:

The work in the Association during the past year has seemed to be more of the nature of laying plans for future than of present ingathering. New pastors have located at Chesaning, DeWitt, Okemos and Bath, Laingsburg and Vernon, and pastors have resigned at St. Johns, Byron, Laingsburg and Okemos.

Most of our churches are in a prosperous condition, but some of them are sadly run down. We sent letters to the churches and pastors last fall with a view to secure help for the weaker churches. The pastors responded heartily, but for various reasons the plan was not a great success. Dr. O'Dell spent a little time at Chesaning and helped the church very much.

The failure, we think, seemed to be largely due to the failure of the churches to prepare for the brethren to go to their aid.

We believe that if the churches and pastors could co-operate, much aid could be given to the weak churches by letting the pastors spend a little time with them.

Read and adopted.

Minutes of the several sessions were read and approved.

After prayer, Association adjourned.

Obituary.

Since the last annual meeting of this Association, the St. Johns' church has sustained a great loss in the death of our dear sister,

MRS. HARRIET CORYELL SWEGELS,

who died in Detroit, Sept. 23, 1896, aged 74 years.

She was born at Hornby, N. Y., in 1822, and in 1840 was married to John Swegles. In 1843, they removed to Hillsdale, Michigan, where both were converted. When the constitution of the state was revised, her husband was clerk of the convention, and soon after was elected auditor general; this caused them to make Lansing their home for the next four years. Since 1854, St. Johns has been her home.

In 1875, she was chosen State Secretary of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the West, and for fifteen years she gave that exalted, cheerful service which is only the outcome of a fully consecrated life. During the fourth year of her service as State Secretary the state organization was effected and Michigan stood second in contributions among 23 states. The reports of nine years give a partial record of her work. In that time she traveled 20,105 miles, attended 140 associational meetings, and wrote 7,359 letters, besides visiting among the churhees

At the close of 15 years, 275 organizations were contribung to the work. Personal interests, possessions, comfort, all subserved to it. Failing health alone compelled her to resign the office several years ago, but she never lost in the least degree her interest in and anxiety for the progress of Foreign Missions.

Hers was a life of rare self-abnegation and trust in the Master whom she served with her whole heart. In the home church she was ever foremost in every good work, and as in her life ishe filled a large place in our hearts, so in her memory is a sacred legacy. We miss her cheerful, inspiring presence, her words of encouragement and wise counsel, but we thank God we have had the example of true faith and consecrated service of our dear sister, who has heard the "Well done, good and faithful servant," and who has entered into the joy of her Lord.

CONSTITUTION.

ADOPTED IN 1894.

- ARTICLE 1. This Association shall be known as the Shiawassee Baptist Association, and shall be composed of Baptist Churches, and each church shall be entitled to three delegates, and an additional delegate for every fifty members,
- ART. 2. This Association has no power as a LEGISLATIVE body, but as an INDIFENDENT body has power to govern itself, and disclaims all interference with the particular discipline of individual churches. Yet we deem it our privilege to judge for ourselves of the propriety of continuing any church in our connection.
- ART. 3. The object of this Association shall be to gather information in regard to the state of churches, both as respects STATISTICS and RELIGION; to promote the Christian fellowship and to sustain the various benevolent objects connected with the promotion of Christ's kingdom.
- ART. 4. This Association shall by delegation of churches, meet annually on the first Tuesday and Wedndsday of June, and shall hold such other meetings as the body may direct.
- ART. 5. The officers shall be a Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Auditor, President of Pastor's Conference, Associational Superintendent, Associational President B. Y. P. U., Superintendent of Woman's Mission Work and Missionary Committee of three (to co-operate with the State Board,) to be elected annually, by nomination or ballot, to continue in office till others are elected. It shall be the duty of the Associational Superintendent and Presidents to have general oversight of the work in their departments throughout the Association, and to develop and encourage the same and to assist the Program Committee in making out the program for the anniversary meeting.
- ART. 6. Each church shall send with its delegates a letter containing an account of its numerical changes, and generally what pertains to its peace and prosperity, and money for minutes. Any church neglecting to do this for three successive years shall be dropped from the Minutes.
- ART. 7. Churches giving satisfactory evidence of being sound in doctrine and sound in practice, may, on application, be admitted into this Association.
- ART. 8. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting, provided that notice of the proposed amendment has been given at the previous annual meeting.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS.

RESOLVED. That the Treasurer be instructed to pay over all moneys that are in or may come into his hands to the several agents to whom said money belongs and take a receipt therefor.

RESOLVED, That any member of this Association whose name is in the Minutes present at the meeting of any Association with which we correspond shall be a delegate to that body.

RESOLVED. That the Clerk be instructed to forward the Minutes to each Association and corresponding Body in the State. Also to the Colgate Library, Hamilton, N. Y., and to the Library of the University of Chicago.

RESOLVED. That churches requesting admission to this Association be required to show a formal recognition from a council of Baptist churches convened for such purpose.

RULES OF ORDER.

- I. In the absence of any of the officers of the Association, others shall be elected pro tem.
- II. The order of business at each annual meeting of the Association, shall be as follows:

FIRST-The introductory service, Annual Sermon and organization,

SECOND-The Rules of Order read.

THIRD-Appointment of Committee on Ministrations,

FOURTH-Invitations to Visiting Brothers to sit with us.

FIFTH-Applications for admission of Churches received.

SIXTH-Annual Pastor's Conference.

SEVENTH-Election of officers.

EIGHTH-Annual Rally of Baptist Young People's Union.

NINTH-Sunday School session.

ELEVENTH-Reading of Letters.

TWELFTH—Addresses by representatives of denominational, benevolent, educational and missionary organizations.

THIRTERNTH-Woman's Work.

- III. No person shall speak more than once on any one subject, nor longer than allowed on program or vote of the Association.
- IV. Every proposition submitted to the Association for discussion must be put in the form of a motion, and not be debated until seconded.
- V. No motion shall be discussed if such discussion be opposed by a majority of the members present.
- VI. The following committees shall be appointed at each anniversary convention; each committee to consist of three persons.

FIRST-A Committee on Nominations.

SECOND-A Committee to provide program for next Anniversary.

THIRD-A Committee on Obituaries.

FOURTH—A Committee on Publication of Minutes, of which the Clerk and Treasurer shall be members.

FIFTH-A Committee on Resolutions.

SIXTH—A Committee on place and preacher of annual sermon for next anniversary,

- VIII. At every sitting, business shall be opened and concluded with prayer under direction of the Moderator.
- 1X. All churches neglecting to represent themselves in this Body for two years in succession, shall be visited by a committee chosen for the purpose, who shall report at the next annual meeting.
- X. Any Article of this order may be suspended for consideration of other business, by a vote of the Association.
- XI. The Minutes of the meeting shall be read and corrected before the rising of the Association.

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
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
