## Opening Meeting, -Tuesday Afternoon.

Rev. Bion Colvin of Chesaning led in an opening devotional service.

In the absence of the Moderator, Rev. J. J. Cooper who had removed from the Association, Kev. G. S. Northrup of St. Johns was elected temporary Moderator.

The provisional program was adopted with such changes as would be necessary to make.

The preacher of the annual sermon and his alternate, both being absent, Rev. Thos. Howland of Laingsburg consented to dellver a sermon. He gave a very helpful sermon, based on John 19:30, on Christ's finished life and work, after which all joined in singing "Alas, and did my Savior bleed."

At this time the Moderator appointed the following Committee on Nominations: Deacon Hoag and Revs. Brown and Baker.

## Women's Hour.

Our new Home Secretary, Mrs. F. L. Church of Owosso, gave a very encouraging report and urged the circles to be sure and ralse their apportionment.

Mrs. P. A. Johnson's report as Foreign Secretary was read by Mrs. O. M. Thrasher of Williamston. An exceptional feature of the report was that the circles of the Association had exceeded their apportionment, and this in face of the fact that some circles failed to contribute anything.

Mrs. E. M. Lake of Lansing read the report on young women's work and urged the organization of more Farther Lights' Circles and What I can Societies.

Mrs. Kittie Bare Cooper gave an exceedingingly interesting address on Missions among the Indians.

Chapman's famous Stainless Flag address as may be furnished by the Michigan Anti Saloon League for that purpose.
II. Resolved, That since the Missionary Spirit is the life of the church and hope of the kingdom, we express our apprec:a tion of the excellent work being done by all our Boards and exert ourselves to increase their efficiency.
III. Resolved, That we in recognition of the great value of all our Missionary Journals and the ever insreasing worth of The Christian Herald, shall endeavor to place them in every Baptist home in our Association.
IV. Resolved, That we deplore the lack of space on the statistical table of the church letter for proper report of B. Y. P. U., Bible School, Junior union, and Farther Light Contributions; and further we implore for such a table as shall encouraga all our workers.

Shepardsville:-No marked success. Two baptized and one united by letter. Have preaching once in two weeks. Have no Sunday School or prayer meeting.

St. Johns:-Work greatly hindered by sickness, plans for meetings during winter failed. Considering our resources our contributions for missions and general finances are excellent. Are planning for great things during the next year. Invite the Association to meet with us next year.

Vernon:-Have been blessed financially and spiritually. Have lost three of our aged members by death. Have purchased new seats for the auditorium. Special meetings resulted in quickening the church and the conversion of others. Prayer and covenant meetings and B. Y. P. U., are doing good and the Sunday School is effective. The Ladies' Aid is a strong helper.

Webberville:-Rev. Wm. Allenbaugh closed his labors with us last January, Rev. O. M. Thrasher began April first as our stated supply. Preaching service and Sunday $S$ Shool each Sunday afternoon. Sunday School has gocd interest, Ladies' Aid is doing efficient work.

Williamston:-We heartily welcome the Association. The past year one of pleasant fellowship. Five have been baptized. Three of our older members removed by death. Several active members have moved to other fields, Brother Floyd Mixter our

Sunday School Superintendent moved to Kalamazoo to prepare for the ministry.

## STANDING RESOLUTIONS.

Resolved, 1,-That the Treasurer be instructed to pay over all monies that are in, or may come into his hands, to the several agents to whom said money belongs and take a receipt therefor.

Resolved, 2-That any member of this Association whose name is in the Minutes present at the meeting of any Assicia. tion with which we correspond, shall be a delegate to that body.

Resolved, 3-That the Clerk be instructed to forward the Minutes to each Association and corresponding body in the State; also to the Colgate Library, Hamilton, N. Y., and to the Library of the University of Chicago.

Resolved, 4-That churches requesting admission to this Association be required to show a formal recognition from a council of Baptist churches convened for that purpose.

Resolved, 5-That this Association appoint a Commission on Systematic Beneficence in accordance with the suggestions of the Baptist Denomination at its Anniversary Meeting at Asbury Park in 1896, to co-operate with the various Missionary Agencies of the Denomination in disseminating Missionary literature throughout the State, the nation and the world.

Resolved, That the Commission consist of one person, and that he be instructed to secure the appointment of a Commission in each church at once to aid in carrying out the plan of the work.

Resolved, 6-That this Association. especially disclaiming any and all authority over the individual churches, yet feeling the need of such a standing committee of judicious brethren, who shall have the endorsement of this body shall elect annually an advisory committee of five brethren, who shall on request of any church give to such church the beneft of their advice and counsel, and we recommend that the churches consult with the committee before calling a council for the ordination of any brother to the work of the Gospel Ministry. We also recommerd that every candidate of ordination be advised to consult with this committee and obtain their counsel before asking for ordination. We also recommend that the church calling any such council invite all the churches in the Association to send delegates to sit with them in the council.

## CONSTITUTION.

## Adopted in 1894.

Article 1. This Association shall be known as the "Shiawassee Baptist Association," and shall be composed of Baptist churches, and every church shall be entitled to three delegates and an additional delegate for every fifty members.

Article 2. This Association has no power as a Legislative body, but as an Independent body has power to govern itself, and disclaims all interference with the particular discipline of individual churches. Yet we deem it our privilege to judge for ourselves of the propriety of continuing any church in our connection.

Article 3. The object of this Association shall be to gather information in regard to the state of churches, both as respects statistics and religion; to promote the Christian fellowship and to sustain the various benevolent objects connected with the promotion of Christ's kingdom.

Article 4. This Association shall, by delegation of churches, meet annually on the first Tuesday and Wednesday of June, and shall hold such other meetings as the body may direct.

Article 5. The officers shall be a Moderator, Clerk, Treasur. er, Auditor, President of Pastors' Conference, Associational Superintendent of Sunday Schools, Associational President of B. Y. P. U., Superintendent of Womans' Mission Work, and Missionary Committee of three (to co-operate with the State Board), to be elected annually, by nomination or ballot, to continue in office till others are elected. It shall be the duty of the Associational Superintendents and Presidents to have general oversight of the work in their departments throughout the Association, and to develop and encourage the same and to assist the Program Committee in making out the anniversary meeting.

Article 6. Each church shall send with its delegates a let e: containing an account of its numerical changes, and generally what pertains to its peace and prosperity, and money for minutes. Any church neglecting to do this for three successive years shall be dropped from the minutes.

Article 7. Churches giving satisfactory evidence of being sound in doctrine and sound in practice, may, on application, be admitted into the Association.

Article 8. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting, provided that motion of the proposed amendment has been given at the previous meeting.

## RULES OF ORDER.

I. In the absence of any of the officers of the Association, others shall be elected pro tem.
II. The order of business at each annual meeting of the Association shall be as follows:

First-The introductory service, Annual Sermon and organization.

Second-The rules of order read.
Third-Appointment of Committee on Ministration.
Fourth-Invitations to visiting brothers to sit with us.
Fifth-Applications for admission of churches received.
Sixth—Annual Pastors' Conference.
Seventh-Election of officers.
Eighth-Annual Rally of Raptist Young Peoples' Union.
Ninth-Sunday School Session.
Tenth-Reading of letters.

Eleventi-Addresses by representatives of denominational, benevolent, educational and missionary organizations.

Twelfth-Woman's Work.
III. No person shall speak more than once on any one subject, nor longer than allowed on program or vote of Association.
IV. Every proposition submitted to the Association for discussion must be put in the form of a motion, and not debated until seconded.
v. No motion shall be discussed if such discussion be opposed by a majority of the members present.
VI. Tne following committees shall be appointed at each anniversary meeting; each committee to consist of three persons:

First-A committee on nominations.
Second-A committee to provide program for next anniversary.

Third-A committee on obituaries.
Fourth-A committee on publication of minutes, of which the clerk and treasurer shall be members.

Fifth-A committee on resolutions.
Sixth-A committee on place and preacher of annual sermon for next Anniversary.

Seventh-An Ordination Committee, consisting of five brethren.

Eighth-A Commission on Systematic Beneficence, consisting of one person.
VII. At every sitting, business shall be opened and concluded with prayer under direction of the Moderator.
VIII. All churches neglecting to represent themselves in this body for two years in succession, shall be visited by a committee chosen for the purpose, who shall report at the next annual meeting.
IX. Any article of this order may be suspended for consideration of other business, by a vote of the Association.
$X$. The minutes of the meeting shall be read and corrected before the rising of the Association.
