## OPENING MEETING, TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

Rev. C. Van Dorn, of Perry, led the devotional service, assisted by Rev. E. J. Cross, of Durand.

Rev. John McLean, of Durand, was elected Moderator pro tem. Moderator Deacon Wm. Hoag not being present.

The following new pastors were introduced at this time. Rews. Geo. Laughton, of Owneso: Henry Morgan, of liyron, and F . J. Cross, oí Durand.

The program provided ly the committee was adopted. with such changes as were necessary.

The Moderator appointed the following brethren as a nominating committec: Revs. G. S. Northrup of St. Johns: J. B. Huff, Laingshurg, and C. Van Dorn, of Perry.

Scriptures were read by Rev. FF. L. Currey, of Lansine, and prayer was offered by Rer. N. D. Potter of Ovid. Rev. Orlo J. Price, Ph. I)., of Lansing, then delivered the ammal sermon, which was atn inspiration to all who listened.

The reading of the Owosso church letter at this time removed all doabts, if any existed, as to the sincerity of their weleome to the Association.

## WOMEN'S HOUR.

The women's session was condncted by the President. Mrs. J. Fisher, of Cormma, who introduced the ltome Mision Secretary, Mrs. Frank Young, of Lansing, as one of our new and younger workers. She gave the report of the Home Mision work, which was followed by the Foreign Secretary, Mrs. C. L. Herrick, of Lansing, who very checerfully reported that the women of this. Issociation had excectied the foreign apportionment by $\$ 14.00$.

Mrs. N. D. Potter, of Ovid, recently elected Secretary for the Young Iadies, Juniors, Balby Pands and Sunday Schools, spoke a fru
moments in regard to the work connecied with her office, and asked the co-operation of the officers of these organizations.

After a very pleasing solo rendered by Mr. Gilbert Loring, of Owosso, Miss Grant, of Detroit, gave an inspiring address on Home Missions, urging that the Sunday schools be encouraged to take up the study of missions and make an offering for the same at least once a guarter.

Mrs. Pettit, of Detroit, followed with an interesting and enthusiastic address on Foreign Missions, showing the great need of more work being done in Airica, China. Japan and India, and leading the women to see the great responsibility resting upon them to help carry forsward this work.

In offering oi $\$ 3.96$ was received.
By action of the Association, 1)r. Ketman, of Chicago, was given opportunity at this time to speak on the Northern Paptist Convention.

The report of the nominating committec was adopted with exception of ihe offices of Clerk and B. Y. T. U. President, which were refered back to the committee for further consideration.

## WEDNESDAY MORNING.

Devotiona! meeting was conducted by Rev. Cronkite, our Associational Missionary.

Pastor Harry Richardson, of the new Immanuel Church, Owosso. was introduced.

On motion the Immanuel Church letter was read, after which the hand of welcome was extended by the Moderator.

Rev. Leslie Bower was elected delegate to the State Convention, with Rev. G. S. Northrup aiternate.

Revs. F. L. Currey and Harry Richardson were elected directors to the State Convention, with Revs. E. J. Cross and D. W. Cronkite, alternates.

Worthy Thorpe, of Owosso, was elected delegate to State Laymen's Association.

Rev. E. J. Cross was appointed Reading Clerk and the church letters were then read.

Moved and sustained that a committee of three be appointed as follows: Revs. O. J. Price, Gro. Laughton and G. S. Northrup, to consider ways and means for raising and placing in the hands of the Treasurer $\$ 30.00$ for expenses.

Moved and sustained that a committee of three be appointed on reception of new churches. The nominating committee was selected as such committee.

Rev. I). (i. Young, of Missouri, spoke words of cheer at this time. This brother was the lirst licentiate from the Vernon Church.

Rev. F. J. Cross introduced the following standing resolution, which was adopted:

In the future church letters to the Association shall be limited to 200 words, and, if possible, typewritten and sent to the Associational Clerk at least two weeks before the annual meeting.

Rev. W. L. Currey took charge of the S. S. hour, speaking on the subject: Is the Evangelistic Spirit Vital to the Success of Our Sunday Schools? An interesting discussion followed in which Rev. Geo. Laughton said his best endeavor is to be expended in Sunday School work; Rev Leslie Bower raised the question of the advisability of having godless superintendents and teachers, and what to do with them if you have them; Rev. G. S. Northrup said consecration to the work will be incentive in its nature; Rev. Geo. Hudson said many fail to realize the importance of Sunday school work; and Mrs. Herrick said missions should be taught in the Sunday school and suggested some helps.

Mr. C. B. Hahn, called the King of Boyville, gave a very interesting talk and proved his right to the title.

Adjourned with prayer.

## WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

Devotional service was led by Rev. Henry Morgan.
The nominating committee, with increased duties, reported as follows: Mr. Frank Young, of Lansing, to be Councillor on State Laymen Executive Committee; Revs. John McLeān and O. M. Thrasher on Asociational Missionary Committee; and recommended that the Immanuel Church, of Owosso, be received into the Association. Adopted.

After no small amount of discussion, the following resolution, by Rev. E. J. Cross, concerning the revision of the constitution, was adopted:

Resolved. That a committce of three be appointed to revise the constitution, bylaws and standing resolutions, and submit the same for adoption next year. Said committee to be known as a Committee on Revised Constitution. Also, that the Program Committec provide ample time on the program of the next annual meeting for the consideration of the report of said committee.

Revs. E. J. Cross, Geo. Hudson and O. M. Thrasher were appointed as such committee.

Following is the report of Committec on Resolutions:

Resolved, That we endorse the Northern Baptist Convention, and promise our co-operation in its work:

Resolved, That we recognize the marks of Divine favor bestowed on the activities of the Layman's and Forward Movements that have recently come into our church life: that we express our heartv appreciation of what is being accompiished with the other missionary activities; that we urge a larger recognition of layman's work and efforts, and that we exert ourselves to increase the efficiency of all our missionary activities.

Resolved, That we appreciate the present financial situation of the Board of State Missions and express our conficlence in its administration. especially the work of the Superintendent, Joshua Roberts.; alio, we urge increased contributions for its work.

Resolved, That recognizing the place and power of the religious press, we give a larger place to our missionary periodicals,-that we particularly pledec ourselves to the support of the Michigan Christian Herald, as an indispensable part of our state work, and that the securing of subscriptions to these periodicals be placed in the front rank of importance in the endeavor of our local pastors and churches.

Resolved, That we pledge our undying allegiance to the cause of temperance, and the abolition of the saloon, and we express our confidence in and appreciation of the Anti-Saloon League, and all other moral forces, used of God, for the extention of the Kingdom.

Resolved, That we express our thanks to Almighty God for the preservation of international peace, for the prospect of its continuance, and our heartfelt prayer for the fulfillment of 1sa. 2:4.

Resolved, That we thank the Owosso Church for its cheerful entertainment of the Association upon short notice, and we appreciate its bountiful hospitality.

Following the reading of the above report, Rev. Geo. Laughton was called apon to lead the Association in prayer.

The Associational Misstonary Committee now rendered their report through Charman Rev. G. S. Northrup, as follows:

## REPORT OF ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONARY COMMITTEE.

During the year your committee have held three meetings, and have had the missionary interests of the Association on their hearts. Chesaning, Maple River, DeWitt, Bath and other pastorless fields have been visited and encouraged by numbers of the committee.

The applications for aid from the State Board by the churches at South Lansing, Laingsburg and Durand have been approved, and the thoroughly evangelical pastors, and most excellent work done upon the fields more than justify this action.

At the time of the State Convention a proposition was made by the Superintendent of State Missions that a missionary should be placed upon this field in connection with the rlint River Assoccia-
tion. As the Association had, two years previously, instructed the Missionary Committee to endeavor to bring about just such an arrangement, the proposal was gladly accepted and Rev. D. W. Cronkite, who was already upon the field, took up the work. The terms of this agreement were. that each association should pay $\$ 200$ toward the missionary's salary and half of his traveling expenses. This amount was equitably apportioned by the committee, and all the churches were asked for contributions. Up to the present time only six churches have responded, as follows: Durand, $\$ 19.00$; Maple River, $\$ 36.12$; St. Johns, $\$ 12.06$; Shepardsville, $\$ 24.00$; Bengal-Riley, $\$ 6.45$; Chesaning, $\$ 1.93$; total $\$ 99.50$. Amount now due the missionary, $\$ 51.42$.

The excellent service of the missionary, who will himself give a report of his work, has proved the wisdom of this undertaking.

But, unless the arrangement is expressly approved at this meeting, and unless the other churches of the Association shall immediately respond with adequate contributions, the services of the missionary must be discontinued from this date.

## CONSTITUTION.

## Adopted in 1894.

Article 1. This Association shall be known as the "Shiawassee Baptist Association," and shall be composed of Baptist churches and every church shall be entitled to three delegates and an additional delegate for every fifty meinbers.

Article 2. This Association has no power as a legislative body, but as an independent body has power to govern itself, and dis. claims all interference with the particular discipline of individual churches. Yet we deem it sur privilege to judge for ourselves of the propriety of continuing any church in our connection.

Article 3. The object of this Association shall be to gather information in regard to the state of churches, both as respects statistics and religion; to promote the Christian fellowship and to sustain the various benevolent objects connected with the nromotion of Christ's kingdom.

Article 4. This Association shall, by delegation of churches, meet annually on the first Tuesday and Wednestlay of June, and shall hold such other mreetings as the body may direct.

Article 5. The officers shall be a Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer Auditor, President of Pastors' Conference, Associational Superintendent of Sunday Schools, Associational President of B. Y. P. U., Supérintendent of Woman's Mission Work, and Missionary Committee of three (to co-operate with the State Board), to be elected annually, by nomination or ballot, to continue in office till others are elected. It shall be the duty of the Associational Superintendents and Presidents to have general oversight of the work in their departments throughout the Association, and to develop and encourage the same, and to assist the Program Committee in making out the anniversary meeting.

Article 6. Fach church shall send with its delegates a letter containing an account of its numerical changes, and generally what pertains to its peace and prosperity, and money for minutes. Any church neglecting to do this for three successive years shall be dropped from the minutes.

Article 7. Churches giving satisfactory evidence of being sound in doctrine and souund in practice, may, on application, be admitted into the Association.

Article 8. This constitution may be altered or amended at any annua! meeting, provided that motion of the proposed amendments has been riven at the previnus meeting.

## RULES OF ORDER.

I. In the absence of any of the officers of the Association, others shall be elected pro tem.
II. The order of business at each anmual meeting of the Association siall be as follows:

1. The introductory service, Annual Sernion and organization.
2. The rules of order read.

3 Appointment of Committee on Ministration.
4. Invitations to visiting brothers to sit with us.
5. Applications for admission of churches received.
6. Anrual Pastors' Conference.
7. Election of officers.

8 Annual Raliy :f Baptist Young Peoples' Unio:.
9. Sunday School Sessinn.

1r. Reading of letters.
11. Addresses by representatives of denominational, benevolent. educational and missionary organizations.
12. Woman's Work.
III. No person shall speak more than once on any one subiect. nor longer than allowed on program or vote of Association.
IV. Every proposition submitted to the Association for discussion must be put in the form of a motion, and not debated until seconded.
V. No motion shall be discussed, if such discusion be opposed by a majority of the members present.
VI. The following committees shall be appointed at each anniversary meeting: each committee to ennsist of three persons:
1.-A committee on nominations.

2 -A committee to provide program for next anniversary.
3. A committee on obituaries.
4. A committee on publication of minutes, of which the clerk and tieasurer shall be members.
5.-A committer on resolutions.
6.-A committee on place and preacher of annual sermon for next Anniversary.
7.-An Ordination Committee, consisting of five brethren.

IX. Any article of this order may be suspended for consideration of other business. by a vote of the Association.
