CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I. NAME.

This association shall be known as the Shiawassee Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. OBJECT.

The object of this association shall be, to gather information as to the state of the churches, their statistics, to promote Christian fellowship, and to advance the various benevolent enterprises of the denomination.

ARTICLE III. Membership.

This association shall be composed of Baptist Churches, which approve of this constitution and work in harmony with the same.

ARTICLE IV. MEETING.

This association shall, by delegations from the churches, meet annually on the first Tuesday and Wednesday of June.

ARTICLE V. Delegates.

Each church shall be entitled to three delegates and one additional delegate for every fifty members or fraction thereof above one hundred.

ARTICLE VI. OFFICERS.

The officers of this association shall be moderator, clerk, treasurer, bible-school superintendent, and delegates to, and directors of the Baptist Convention of the State of Michigan, as provided in Section 1 of the by-laws of said convention. These officers shall be elected annually; their duties shall be those usually performed by such officers.

ARTICLE VII. LETTERS.

Each church shall send to the clerk two weeks previous to each annual meeting, a letter containing the numerical and financial statistics, with a concise account of the spiritual state of the church

ARTICLE VIII. AMENDMENTS.

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting, provided that notice of the proposed amendment or amendments be given at the meeting one year previous.

BY-LAWS.

- 1. Each session shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. Each meeting shall be governed by the parliamentary usage common to such gatherings.
- 3. The order of business shall be arranged by the program committee, subject to the vote of the delegates present.
- 4. A nominating committee, composed of five delegates from as many Churches, shall be appointed at the opening session of each annual meeting.
- 5. The program committee shall consist of the moderator, clerk, pastor of the entertaining church, and the presidents of the auxiliary associational organizations.
- 6. The moderator shall appoint at the first afternoon session of each annual meeting the following committees, each to consist of three delegates:
 - Standing Committees: Associational Missionary, Ordination, World Wide Missionary.
 - Temporary Committees: Resolutions, Obituary, Place and Preacher.
- 7. It shall be the duty of the Associational Missionary committee to inquire into the state of religion in the churches, to assist in every way possible the weak churches, and to report the result of its observations and effort to the association with such recommendations as seem wise.
- 8. It shall be the duty of the Committee on World Wide Missions to co-operate with the National societies, to advise the churches regarding their apportionment for the various benevolences and to get a full response from each church. It may also suggest to the churches methods of raising their finances.
- 9. The clerk shall receive five dollars annually for services rendered.
- 10. Each church shall make contribution toward the expenses of the Association and the State Convention.
- 11. These By-Laws may be changed at any regular meeting by a majority vote of the delegates present.

RESOLUTIONS.

- 1. RESOLVED, That we endorse the Northern Baptist Convention, promise our co-operation in its work, and urge our churches to raise their apportionment.
- 2. RESOLVED, That we recognize the necessity of a clearer conception of the imperative needs of World Wide Missions; and of more spiritual and systematic efforts to provide men and money for meeting those needs; that to this end we endorse the Every Member Canvass with the objective of Ten Cents per member per week for Missions.
- 3. RESOLVED, That we express our confidence in the General Superintendent of Missions, E. M. Lake, and the secretary of State Missions, Joshua Roberts, and that we urge increased contributions for the work of State Missions.
- 4. RESOLVED, That we declare our undying and uncompromising opposition to the saloon, brewery, and distillery as menaces to the social order and public safety; that we at each opportunity will use and encourage every effort of the Antisaloon League and other organizations for the suppression of the liquor traffic in Michigan by Constitutional Amendment; that we pledge to support every effort for the enforcement of laws now existing for control of the liquor traffic and associated evils.
- 5. RESOLVED, That recognizing the power of the religious press, we especially commend our missionary magazine—Missions—and the Michigan Edition of The Standard, to our Churches and urge a systematic canvass of the members for both of them.
- 6. RESOLVED, That we recognize the significance of the appeal made by the propaganda in the interests of Social Service; and that we pledge ourselves to the inculcation of its central principle—namely, a spiritual life pervading the whole man in all his relations, which will naturally project itself into all his business, pleasures, and domestic life; that the ideal of the Christian life to which we pledge ourselves is the perfect character of Jesus Christ.
- 7. RESOLVED, That we recognize the universal law of love instituted by Christ, and that we deprecate war and all its associations; that we pledge our influence for universal disarmament and the bringing in of universal peace among nations.
- 8. RESOLVED, That we thank the South Baptist Church of Lansing for its bountiful hospitality and splendid entertainment.

MINUTES.

TUESDAY MORNING.

The Seventy-eighth Annual Meeting of the Shiawassee Baptist Association was called to order by the Moderator, O. J. Price, at 10 A.M. June 3d, 1913, at the South Baptist Church, Lansing, Mich.

E. J. Cross led in praise and devotional service. "The Son of God Goes Forth to War," and "Onward Christian Soldiers" were sung, and selection from the 6th chapter of Paul's Letter to the Ephesians was read and expounded.

Quotations from scripture and prayers by those in the audience were heard.

Upon motion by E. J. Cross the program arranged by the committee was adopted subject to such changes as would be necessary.

The Annual Sermon was preached by John G. York, of Owosso, using as his subject "The Triumph of the Cross."

The Moderator appointed a nominating committee as follows: J. E. Gregory, E. J. Cross, A. D. Werden, Mrs. G. S. Northrup, and Mrs. J. R. Edwards.

The Annual Letters and reports from the churches were read.

Upon motion by Gregory, the Moderator appointed a committee to consider the matter of handling the applications for membership sent in by the Free Baptist Churches. Mr. G. S. Northrup, C. E. Van Dorn and Henry Morgan were appointed.

The resolution from the Grand Ledge Free Baptist Church, asking for membership in the Association, was referred to the committee named above.

Upon motion by Cross and Edwards, the Moderator appointed L. Severance, Miss Gladys Smith and Miss Frances Hurd as committee to canvass the state of religion in the Association.

The new ministers of the Association were introduced by the Moderator.

The nominating committee made its report, which was adopted upon a motion to that effect by J. G. York.

After the introduction of the new Moderator and making of certain announcements, J. R. Edwards made the closing prayer.

WOMAN'S SESSION.

At 12:00 o'clock the society was called to order by the President, Mrs. G. S. Northrup.

The nominating committee reported, naming officers for the year. This report was adopted.

Adjournment was taken until 1:30 P.M.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

At 1:30 the meeting was called to order by the President.

Reports from Mrs. F. L. Young, the corresponding secretary; Mrs. Fred L. Smith, corresponding secretary for young women; Mrs. C. Mahaney, secretary-treasurer, and Mrs. Arthur Morse, secretary for children's work, were made and discussion followed.

Miss Julia Davis, of Detroit, made an address and answered questions informally.

The Treasurer reported cash on hand, \$10.44.

At 2:45 the Association was called to order and all united in singing "O Worship the King."

The Committee on Reception of New Churches reported as follows:

"We, your committee appointed to consider the reception of the under mentioned Free Will Baptist Churches, which upon the initiation of this Association have applied for admission into the Shiawassee Association of Baptist Churches, viz.: Grand Ledge, Hazlett, Rose, and Elsie; we therefore recommend that the hand of recognition and a hearty reception be given to these churches.

"We further recommend that Hillsdale College and other religious and educational institutions be recognized by each denomination as mutual interests, and that the Shiawassee Baptist Association recognize and send delegates to the Lansing Quarterly Meeting of Free Will Baptist Churches.

"We also further recommend the reception into this Association of the South Baptist Church of Lansing.

Upon motion by York and Cross, the report was adopted and welcome extended to these churches.

Mr. G. S. Northrup gave the hand of fellowship to delegates of the above named churches, except Elsie (there being none present).

Responses were given by the pastors of churches—Severance, Bowser, Gawne and Werden.

Congregation sang "Blest Be the Tie That Binds."

At 3:45 Rev. R. J. Russell, Missionary from the Philippines, gave an address, using as a text "Inasmuch as ye did it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye did it unto me."

Prayer was offered by C. H. Callahan.

At 4:15 a class of little girls rendered a special selection of music.

The Committee on Associational Missions reported as follows:

The Associational Missionary Committee beg leave to report the following:

The churches of the Shiawassee Baptist Association are all supplied with pastors, except Webberville, Antrim and Chesaning. No startling reports of great spiritual awakening have come to our notice. No large increase in membership in any of the churches.

However, there are signs of a distinct awakening upon the part of the churches to the possibilities of establishing the Kingdom by work with boys, Mission Study Classes among the young people, and other practical work.

The greatest thing which has happened in the Association during the past year has been the invasion of Missionaries and Missionary Society Secretaries into the midst of our people. Doctor Aitchison, Drs. Lynch, Capen, Barlow, Stackhouse, and

Messrs. Groesbeck, Petzoldt and Russell have spent some time among the churches of the Association. Folks who had never seen a live missionary had erroneous ideas of missionaries and mission work dispelled like the morning mist. Their foghorns have ceased to blow!

Nearly every church now makes an annual Every Member Canvass for Current Expenses and Missions.

We recommend:

First.—That our churches be exhorted to organize their constituencies into Community, Mission, and Civic Study Clubs, and ally themselves with every organ for the upbuilding of the economic, social, recreational, domestic and religious life of the community in which they live.

Second.—That our churches be exhorted to encourage their pastors to take occasional vacations for the purpose of availing themselves of certain educational advantages now offered by the Universities and Theological Seminaries in brief courses. The need of wide-awake, progressive, up-to-date religious leaders to guide the churches in fruitful activities makes this imperative.

Third.—We recommend that the services of missionaries available be secured to visit the churches of the Association during the months of October and November, carrying out further ideals for mission study and interest.

The report was adopted.

The committee on Ordination reported as follows:

"The Committee on Ordination met in Perry, March 10, 1913, to confer with Mr. John R. Edwards, of Vernon, Mich., concerning his ordination to the gospel ministry. All the members of the committee were present. Mr. Edwards gave a full account of his faith and Christian experiences, and was largely questioned as to his character, credentials and fitness for gospel work. The committee unanimously recommended the Vernon church to call a council for the ordination of Mr. Edwards. This Council was called for March 19, 1913, and on that date delegates

from the several churches of the Association assembled in Vernon and held a council, which was followed by a public service for the ordination of Mr. Edwards to the gospel ministry.

This report was adopted.

Upon motion the following delegates were appointed to attend the Lansing Quarterly Meeting of Free Will Baptist Churches: E. J. Cross, James Rork, Mrs. Elmer Holley, Mrs. Glen Hartwell.

Reports of the Committees on Resolutions, Place and Preacher, and Obituary were made and adopted (see directory).

At 4.45 Mr. E. J. Cross led in a demonstration of games upon the church lawn. Very much enjoyed by all who took part.

TUESDAY EVENING.

At 7.00 the meeting was called to order by the Moderator. After singing "At the Cross" and "How Firm a Foundation," prayer was offered by J. G. York and G. S. Northrup.

At 7.15 Mrs. H. A. Whittaker, State Secretary of Women's Societies, made an address, giving reports of the Detroit Northern Baptist Convention meetings.

The choir rendered special music.

A resolution was offered by E. J. Cross relative to appointing a committee for the purpose of preparing a history of the churches of the Association, one to be prepared and read at each successive annual meeting henceforth.

Upon motion, this resolution was referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

After singing "Revive Us Again," Rev. Russell was asked to make a brief address on "The U. S. and the Philippines."

Doctor A. T. Wishart, pastor of the Fountain Street Baptist Church of Grand Rapids, made the address of the evening upon the theme, "The Church's Task."

After special music by the choir, closing prayer was made by O. J. Price.

WEDNESDAY MORNING.

At 8.30 the ministers had a session, at which it was moved and carried that a ministers' conference be called to meet at the Quarterly Meeting of the Free Will Baptist Churches in August; expenses to be pooled, and program to be arranged by the Moderator and clerk of the Association.

J. G. York read a paper on "The Minister's Social Etiquette," and was given a vote of appreciation.

It was voted that the matter of having a tent meeting at Hazlett Park through the summer season be left in the hands of Messrs. Bowser, Hoskins and the officers of the Association, with power to act.

At 9.45 devotional exercises were conducted by Henry Morgan.

Final reports of the Committees on Resolutions, and Place and Preacher were given and adopted.

At 10.30 Mr. E. G. Crossman made an address on "The Organized S. S. Class."

The claims of "The Standard" were presented by J. E. Gregory, and on Christian Education by S. G. Young.

Miscellaneous discussion was had by delegates.

The report of the Committee on State of Religion in the Association was made and showed a gain of \$807.00 in the benevolences for the year, and some of the reports not yet in.

By motion Mr. Cross's resolution that a committee be appointed to prepare histories of the churches was adopted, as follows:

"RESOLVED, That a committee be appointed to prepare a statistical table of the statistics of each Annual Meeting of this Association; also be it

"RESOLVED, That at the next Annual Meeting a brief historical account of the Antrim Church be given, and at each Annual Meeting thereafter the history of the next oldest church in order shall be given."

The Moderator appointed that committee as follows: E. J. Cross, Henry Morgan, W. H. Thompson.

The following recommendation from the Ministers' Conference, held on January 7, 1913, was read and adopted:

"Motion by O. J. Price and Werden, that it is the sense of this body that we recommend to the Association in June that plans for an Every Member Canvass by the churches be made to begin October 1st, 1913. Carried."

Closing prayer was made by Mr. Gawne.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator at 1.30. After singing "How Firm a Foundation," and prayer by Asa Hoskins, the following subjects were presented and discussed respectively:

"Work With Boys," E. J. Cross.

"Camp Fire Girls," Mrs. E. G. Albright.

"The Mothers' Club," Mrs. O. J. Price.

"The Rural and Village Church," W. H. Thompson.

"The Church and Recreation," L. Severance.

Mr. Thompson sang "A Clean Heart."

The report of the Treasurer was given and accepted.

Closing prayer was offered by Asa Hoskins and Mr. Towner.

Adjourned to meet June 2 and 3, 1914.
