MINUTES

OF THE

Elkhorn Association of Baptists,

Held at Northfork Meeting House, in Franklin County, Ky., commencing on Saturday, the 10th day of August, 1833.

At 11 o'clock, according to appointment, after singing and prayer, Brother GEORGE D. BLACKBURN preached the introductory sermon, from John iii. c. vii. v "Marvel not that I said unto thee, ye must be born iii."

According to established rule, the Moderator of the last session called the Association to order, and the Clerk for last session proceeded to read the letters, and enrol the names of the messengers from the churches

SUNDAY, August 11.

The brethren appointed, preached. The congregation was large, and many present were attentive hearers.

Monday Morning, 9 o'clock.

The report of the committee of arrangement was received and adopted. Brother Waller, from the committee on the circular letter, reported that in consequence of the great length of the letter, and the peculiar nature of the subject discussed, the committee deem it not suitable to the purpose for which it was intended; and therefore the committee offer a substitute, which substitute was adopted by this association as their circular letter.

CIRCULAR LETTER.

To the Churches composing the Elkhorn Association.

BELOVED BRETHREN:-

The time has again arrived, when, agreeably to custom, we have again to address you by letter. To our minutes and to our returning brethren, we refer you to learn the particulars of our present meeting. The year that has elapsed has been in some respects an eventful one. By almost all your letters we learn that a spirit of lukewarmness is complained of, while from a few we hear the cheering news of the outpourings of the spirit of God. We are happy to see that your letters all seem to breathe a spirit of prayer, that God would

revive his work; that he would make bare his holy arm.

You will see that our minutes present a dreadful catalogue of death. Many of our most valuable brethren have fallen asleep. The dreadful pestilence that now walks in darkness and wastes at noonday, seems to have fallen heavily upon us. Brethren, it is the Lord's doings, and let him do what seemeth him good: For we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose. And we reckon that the sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared to the glory which shall be revealed in us. Let us try to remember that whether we live or die we are the Lord's. Death is the inheritance of the saints, the gate to glory; life and death, things present and things to come, all are yours, and ye are Christ's, and Christ is God's.

Let us then, brethren, humbly approach a throne of grace, and pray our heavenly father to reconcile us to his divine pleasure; and that, if it seemeth good unto him, he would be pleased graciously to withdraw the ire of his displeasure, and remove the heavy judgments that desolate our lands; that he would revive his work, convince the world

of sin, and in wrath remember mercy.

Dear brethren, the signs of the times are ominous of some important event. The judgments of Heaven, the commotions of the world, indicate that something important is at the door. A restless enquiring spirit pervades the earth, and a mighty revolution must ensue. When enquiry is awakened, truth will prevail. Let us have grace, whereby we may serve God acceptably with reverence and godly fear; for our God is a consuming fire. Be not conformed to this world; but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect will of God. Watch and pray. And may the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the com-

munion of the Holy Ghost, be with you all. Amen.
