OE THE LONG RUN ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS,

## HELD AT BRASHEARS' CREEK MEETING HOUSE, THE FIRST FRIDAY IN SEPTEMBER, 1824.

An intreductory sermon was delivered by Brother Wilisam Srout, from Luke 24th Chap and $46 \& 47$ verses-"And said unto them, thus it is written, and this is brioveod Cbrist to suffer, and to rise from the dead the third day; and that repentance and remission of sins, might be preached in his name amoug all nations, beginning at Jerusalem "
The association was opened with singing and prayer by the moderator, the letters from 31 churchés read, and the messengers' names enrolled.

On motion agreed, that the lettera trom Drennon's Creek Charch, be committed to the Committee of Arrangements-

The circular letter was called for, and placed with the same committes to prepare it for publication

On motion agreed that a committee be appointed, to write all the letters to corresponding associations, to consist of Brethren Vorhiés, Clack; M’Guire, Carpenter and Hank: brough.

Agreed that the correspondence with the Laughrey association, be discontinued of aceount of the uncertsinto of receiving the eommunications from each other.

The commitice of arrangement, was then apmoisted, consisting of Brethren Nuckola, Allen, J. A. M'Guira, Halsey, Standiford; and the moderatorand clerk-

Agreed that we do now adjourn until Saturday morning, $90^{\circ}$ clock
At 9 o'elock; on Satorday morning, the assosiation met, and after prayer by Brother Clack, proceeded to business.

According to the arrangement of the businesy of the day, we reply to various questions from the churches, reapecting the union-the following sentiments were onadimous. ly agreed to:
"The Long Run Agsociation not only considers berself as belonging to the general union; but she wishes to maintain, cherish and pefpetuate thet union; and to be governed by its principles in her conduct towards other associations, prorided neveriheless, that nothing eontained in those terms of union, sball be so construed as to effect modify, or deatroy any sentiment in her original conatitution, or be so expounded as to come in contact with that instrument."

In reply to the following query from Beargrase, the association submite this answer:
Q.-Wouku it not be advigable for this association to consider: the object for which she entered into correspondence. with the Licking associatiou, and whether, haping failed to accomplish that objeet, she can consiatently continue the same?
A.-We beg leave to say, that although our efforts to reconcile that associsation with the Elkhorn, have not yet erentuated an we could have desired; yet we cannot concesive the differences between them, should weane: our affections from either. We therefor say, that it is expedient and proper stilf to continue our cerrespondence with hathand still to pursue the course originally devised, with the hope of iltimately accamplis. ing our object; and we therefore agree to appaint.a committee to attend tham both, it order to endeavour to effect a'reconciliation between them. The committee to consin of Brethren B. Allen, G. Waller. P. H Vorhies, P. S. Fall, and Z. Carpenter.

The ease of Drennon's Creek Church, was then taken up, and the committee ap. pinted to attend them, produced a letter from that church - It was then agreed by the assiciation. that she have liherty to sfote any further reasons why this body ohould $b$. satisfied with her course;-after much diescussion, it was agreed that the following by inserted in our minutes respesting that church: "For as much as the chureh, at Dree. non's Creek, expresses no desire to be separated from us, or to bear on the feelings of bil nasociation, and notwithstanding we believe she has acted inconsiderately, in professiof fellowship and communion, for the separate Baptists who are distinct from, and ow i:) anion with us, we feel disposed to exereise forbearance towards her, with this spec. al adrice -that she rescind ber order establiohing full fellowabip, and commuina with the separate Baptizte.

## CIRCULAK LETTER.

The long run association to the churches composing her body, sendeth christian salutation. Drar Brethrla;

As a manifestation of our love to you, we send this letter, desiring you toreriew with us, a few of the privileges and favours with which our Heavenly Father bas blesse d our nation; particularly in giving us the word of Revelation. The excelleocy of this Heavenly lamp, in the dark night of time; this uuerring guide in this wildernesn of sin, is vaotly more valuable than all the honours and wealth of the world, The people, or nation who are deatitute of this healing influence of the Bible, have nothing to retard the progress of vice, and kirb the unruly passions, but the light of unas. ainted reason: This, it is true, seems to teach man the propriety of worshiping a supreme Being, of whose parfections and character be can haye nojust idea; errousoursiy,
educlading him a being of malevolent disposifion, and therefore they punisin themselve personally, or sacrifice a child or some object dear to them; supposing thereby to op pease divine wrath and attone for sin; -and others bowing down to idols of their unt make, for want of better information. So reasonable does $1 t$ appear, even to benighteg Hearhens, to worship the Supreme Being, but from want of the word of God, are sur to engage wrong in the work; and even when bur attention is drawn from this gloom scene of idolatry, superstition and ignorauce, and we view man under the blaze of evan. gelical unstruction, how awful his situation, astonishing to see him enmity against God. and every imagination of the thoughts of his heart is evil continually. There ts nout righteous, no not one-there is none that understandeth-there is none that seeketh affy God-their shroat is an open sepulchre; with their tongues they have used deceit-ty poison of asps is under their lips, whose mouth is full of cursing and bitterness-tbey feet are swift to shed blood; destruction and misery are in their ways, and the way pease have they not known-there sa no fear of God before their eyes-being fill with all unrighteousness, covetousness, maliciousness, full of envy, murder, debate, dr ceit, malignity, whisperers, backbiters, haters of God, dispiteful; proud. boasters, in venters of evil things, disobedient to parents, without understanding covenant breaken without natural affection,implacable unmerciful; this is the piciure of man in a state nature. drawn by the inspired penman. But, dear bretbren, we hope and believt bo ter things of you; you jusily love the Bible, that blessed source of divine instruction which is so manifestly calculated to promote all the true interests of mas, and advana the happiness of society in general. Sin bas filled the world with contention and dif order; it bas imbittered the bearts of man egainst each other, kindled domestic strif and untional war, and in a word, has produced all the miseries under which the wort groans To counteract this inundation of accumalating + vil, to prevent the exercise base passions, to restore lost man to a knowledge of his true interest, and to furnisb , example of mysterious benevolerce; the self moving disinterested, unmerited, uns licited, unerring, eternal unchangable love of God, bas brought life and immortality ,'ght by the Gospel, has established a singdom, which, under the complete controul an government of the'great head of the church, shall prosper and stand; which in glory $f_{c}$ exceeds, \& is over all earthly kingdoms, and in its duration, sball run parallel with ete nity, and in accomplishing these purposts, also the malicious scheme of Satan, are ove thrown. and even the wrath of man made to praise him; and imnortal souls rescu out of the enemy's hand, united togetber in love here and prepared for a fature state more refined socie!y where sickness and sorrow. sin and death, are feared and felt ! more. All this and much more useful, delightful, interesting knowledge, we recein through the medium of the Bible-and seping the sacred volume oever directed any pet son wrong; bow carefully we should attend to, and search after its teachings, and adm nitions, to know our duty as members in our several stations; or as individuals in d. mestic life, and be careful to maintaio good works, as a fruit necessarily flowing frof grace planted in the heart. To put on the whole armour of God, be careful and peti ticular that you atteud to the divine rule in receiving members in society-that ithe give evidence of being taught of God;-a proper attention to your duty in this matter will have a tendency to keep the unity of the spirit in the bond of peace, and all in a god degree of one mind,-and when you hear the enemies of the cross, misrepresent and buse the doctrines of grace, answer with meekness, if you answer at all-many, ver many are crying lo! here and lo! there, but go you not after them, unless after ccm pariug their doctrines by the word of God, jou find it according to truth; otherwise re ceive them not into your protection, nor bid them God's speed. If they spitefully us: aud persecute you, pray for them. Finally, brethren farewell, may the God of pati tience and consolation, comfort, strengthen and estatlish you, and make you perfect io every good word and work, working in you that wbich is pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory foreier.
