The petition from the churches from Goose creek and Pond creek for admitance into our ution was raeced.

The request from Bethel and Buck creek churches, respecting Campbellism was taken up, and the following answer adopted:

In answer to recquests from two of our churches, that we enquire into ant $\overline{\text { d }}$ dis them of the facts in relation to : "mp'ellism, and of their duty is relation to thase who support that system of things; we sty, ti at this Association was corstituted on the Philadelphia Baptist Confession of aith, with the exception taken by the Elkhorn Association, as at cerresion of her views of the doctrine of the Bible and as it is one of the plainest dictates of sober refection, that while we continue members of the body, we shoull maintain the primciples of its existence; and as the writings of Alexander camplell are i , direct epposition to the existence and gener al dictates of our corstitutios, we theretore advise our hrethren, that they discourtenance those writings and all those who support that course of rebellion against the principles of our Associational xistenct. And we further advise our hrethren that they exercise great tenderness in relstion to those among us, who think differ ently from us, rememisering, that as we are in the flesh, we are at best imperfec: creatures.

The request from Fish Pools respecting a day of humiliation, fasting, and praye was taken up, and the Saturday before the $2 d$ Lord's day in November appointe as a day for that pur;ose.

The request from Che:owith's run passed over. Union Meetings for the ensuir year as follows: 1st at Salem, 2d at Fish Pools, 3d at 18 Mile, 4th at Chenowith Run.

The next Association to he held at Bethel in the county of Shelby, five mild east of Stelbyville, to commence on the 1st Friday in September, 1831.

## CTMCULAR HETRTER.

Dear Brethren; It being our custom to address yeuliy way of letter, ind sceing no cause to disominue the ractice, but iacreasing uecessity to do s.: yourill see by the Miautes the state of the © hurches in our i nion, and the business that ta been before us, and we refer you to them for the articulars. While for your edification and comf, rt, ue would call your attention to the new oovenant or kinghon of ehrist, as brought to vic $w$ in the wort if God, it is the only one published since the birlh of the Mesiah it acermplishes and $m_{1}$ ly y cxhibits, that condmimed of Giod in : hrist pronised to Abraham, thirty years before the covenant of circumeicion, and tour hundred and thirty yeare beline the wai covenalit. 'lhereliore, Paul and the rest of the anostles, who were made able Minsters of the fiew Testament, declare in the strongest terns its superiority to the old Covebant, because it was a full and luminous exhibition of that promise of God in (hrist to Abraham, and developemert of it. From what is recorded of this covenant in the id chap. 2d epistle to the Corinthians, Gal. 3d, and Hebrews Sth, Sth, and ioth chay. we are authorised to say that it exceieth in giory. All the Jewish Covenantsiwere unly $\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{i}}$ es of it, and had no glory by reaso:t of the glory that ex. coleth. For in reacet of its romises, its subjects, its seal, its meciation, it was devised ia eternity ; eternal life was promised ial relation to it beiore the world began. Four thonsand years roled on and introfiuced its petablishment. When the blaze of its glory barst forth, when its Angust Mediato a;peared, the rod of wonders droped from the hand of Muses: the Mitre fell from the head of Aaron, and the sceptre departed from the tribe of Judah. When its sacrifice was exhibited, the brazen and the golden altar lost thei: victims. Whenits promises and its laws were unfolded no thunders burst forth, but the tongues of Seraphs whispered peace. When its worship was instituted, what pleasing acceats and songs of triumph rose from hearts smitten with the love of God. When its ordinances were ordaired, the choicest elements of nature distinguished its sacred rites-water that purifies and refreshes, bread the staff of life, \&c.

米'Ihe spirit of benevolence which it breathes; knowsro artificial bounds: it respects not claims, nations, tribes, nor tongues, but embraces in its bosom sume out of every nation, kindred, people, and tongue, (Rev. $5: \mathrm{h}, \mathrm{l}$ th.) Its spirit is the Spirit of Love, of sacred a we, and of a sound: mind its zeal is not the child of blinded bigetry, nor of wild enthusiasm, but a true refard tor the glory of God and the good of man. the subjects of this covenant are not the children of: one birth, nor thnse of one particular family. St. John when describing the subjects of this. spiritual Kingdom, says he canie unto his own, and his own received him not, but as many as received him, to them crave he nower to beeotio the suns of "'od, eve: to them that believed on his name which were born not of blocd, nor of the will of the flesit, nor of the will of natim, but of God. "'heir seal is no exteral mark ime'osed by the hands of mat, bat an imprestion made, not on the flesh but in the spinit, having the law of their God written not upon tations of. stone (nor on paper only) but in flethly chine os the heart, accurding to taf romise of their Covenart God, cee Hebrews oth, ith, th, 11th, : ath v. "Behold the days come, sath" the Lord, when I will make a new eov, enant with the House of Israel and with the h.ase of Judah, not accorling to the coven ant that I made with their fathers, in the day when itook them by the hand to lead them ont of the land of Egypt; because they continued not in my covenant, and 1 revarded them not, saith the Lord. For this is the covenant that I will make with the house of isw rael, atter those days, saith the Lord; 1 will pat my laws into their mind, and write them in their hearts; and I will be to them a God, and they shall be to me a people; and they shall not teach every unan his neighbor, and every man his brother, saying know the Lord; for all shall know me, from the least to the greatest. For I will be merciful to their unrighteousness, and their $\sin -$ and their iniquities will I remember no morc. ithe blessings which are promised to the subjects of this new covenant, are not measured nor circumscribed by time. The guarante of them i: not the word or oath of man that repents, nos

- f the sons of nien that deceive, but is the prom sse, the oath, and the seal of the living God, who is faithful to bis promises, and omminotent to accomplish them: who will do all his pleasure, and his counsel shall stand.

Dear Brethren; from the very limited view which we have takell of this new covenant, its subiects, its laws and ordinances. as brought to viow in the new Testament, we are led to consider all the members of it as a peculiar people, born of Gol, and taught by him, for Paul declares, as many as are led by the Spirit of God they are the sons of God, and further adds, $i$. soms then heirs and joint heirs with (hrist, who is head over all things to the Church, and blessed forevermore. We love him, says the Anostle, because he first loved us. Beloved, if Gorl so loved us, we ought also to love one another; hence arises obedience to the laws of Christ; first love to God, and love to our neighbor, for Jesus says, on these two hang all the law and the Prorhets. How important then the keeping of these commandments of God. If the prin-: ciples of this new coveriant are engraven in your : hearts, let it abound in your lives and conversa-: tion, both in the Church and in the world, in doing this you will give evidence to your brethren. and to the world that you are the children of God; for the world looks more at what we do thar what we believe. All Christians are commanded to watch and pray : surely this is a time when the Disciples should be engaged in watch. ing and prayer. When we look around and view many of our sister churches, what do wr see aind hear, innovations and distress, the peace and harmony of brethren destroyed forever. Those who once could join together in singing the sweet songs of Zion, and set around the table of the Lord, are parted asunder; no more that sweet union and commumion together. Is there nut a cause? Why all this ridicule from the sulpit and press, which we see and hear co stamly? when we compare the present system of things with the new covenant, as brought to view and compare them together, we see bow
very widelt they differ-the former unites and biids tocether, the latter severs and divides. From all we see and hear at home and abroad. we are constramed to believe the system of Reform so called, is plainly the subject of A postolio warning, sce 3 d Phil. and! v . ilso Rom. ! fith 17th. Now I beeeech you brethren, mark them which cause divisions and offences, contrary to the doctrine which ye tave learned, and sooid them : as in 2d Acts th and ?nth v. For Iknow this, that after my denarting, shall grievous wolves enter in among you, lont snaring the flock, also of your own selves shall men arise, sreaking nerverse things to draw away disciples after them ; and 3!st of same char. Therefore watch and remember, that by the space of three years. I ceased not to warn every obe, nizht and day with tears. 'These with a nnmber of others ecually applicable, are refered to for description of these men, all of which you will fird inscribed on the sacred pases, all which go to describe those false teachers that should arise in the latter days. 'Iherefore we are not to believe every spirit, but try the spirits, see whether they be of God. The Apostle exhorted his Brethren not to be carried about with every wind of doctrine but to be stedfast. We see the necessity ofdaily searching the scriptures and attending to the commands of e hrist. Let us brethren, put on the whole armour of God, having our loins girt about with truth, having on the breastplate of rightecusness, and our feet shod with the preparation of the Gospel of peace. Let us take the shield of faith, the helmet of salvation and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God; praying aluay with all prayer and supplication in the spirit, and watching thereunto with all perseverance and supplication for all Euints. And now Brethren we commend you ali to God and the word of his grace, which is able to build you up, and give you an it heritance among them that are sanctified.
