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BEIRUT, 1897.

The American Missionaries in Syria, extend a most cordial welcome to all Christian friends visiting this land. It is a pleasure to invite you to our homes and to help you to study personally the various phases of Missionary work. We look to Christian lands for prayerful sympathy, substantial aid, and reinforcements. Assured of your warm interest in Christ's work we lay before you the following facts

It is over 70 years since American Missionaries came to this land. The American workers of the Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions, with which we are connected, are 16 men and 23 women. These reside in five centers.

1. Beirut: 2. Tripoli with 27 out-stations, and reaching to Aleppo on the North: 3. Abein in Mt. Lebanon with 28 out-stations: 4. Zahleh in Cœle-Syria with 19 out-stations: 5. Sidon on the South with 24 out-stations, and reaching nearly to Galilee and Nazareth.

The departments of activity are:—1. Preaching. This in 28 organized churches with 2,247 church members, and also in 94 preaching places. 2. Educational. 6,981 day-scholars are being taught in 124 common schools, elementary branches and thorough religious instruction, while several hundreds in High Schools, Female Seminaries and Academies for boys receive advantages which fit them to be Christian workers.

A theological class of ten have recently completed their course of preparation for the ministry. Associated with the Mission, practically though not organically, is the Syrian Protestant College, with 302 students in the Preparatory, Collegiate and Medical departments. As one result of this educational system we have the aid of 4 ordained pastors, 42 licensed preachers, and 163 teachers.

The American Press last year issued 62,700 vols., and printed nearly twenty-three million pages. There are now

about 661 distinct publications on the catalogue, which can be obtained at the Press. They include, not only the Scriptures, but religious and educational books, theological, scientific, historical, juvenile, and miscellaneous books, prepared by the American Missionaries, and the Professors of the Syrian Protestant College, and by Syrian authors.

Medical work is conducted by Professors of the College at the Prussian Johanniter Hospital, Beirût, and also by medical Missionaries at their stations and in their tours.

An Industrial Training School and Orphanage for Protestant boys has been organized in Sidon, and needs help at this stage.

The Mission endeavours to combine these various departments, to supervise and organize the whole work so as to develop a strong, self-supporting native church.

While thus reporting what the Lord has given us to do, we do not forget other Christian agencies about us. These are the Reformed Presbyterians in Latakia, the Irish Presbyterians in Damascus, the Scotch Free Church in Shweir, the Church of Scotland Mission to the Jews, and the British Syrian Schools, as well as various individual workers.

Both the American and the British Bible Societies and Tract Societies have agencies in Beirût, and do a great work in the land.
