

## CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.—NAME AND OBJECT.

This organization shall be known as the Central District Association of regular Baptists in Kentucky. The objects of this Association shall be the promotion of purity, Christian doctrine, unity of fellowship, and to advance the cause of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ; also co-operation in the promotion of Sabbath School and Missionary work throughtout the District by meeting annually for mutual and religious counsel.

#### ARTICLE II.—Churches and Messengers.

All regular Baptist churches in the District shall be entitled to membership in the Association. Churches shall be represented at each annual meeting by messengers and letters setting forth their spiritual condition and the extent of their benevolent and Missionary operations.

#### ARTICLE III.

Each church shall be entitled to two messengers, and for every two hundred members, over eight hundred, one additional messenger.

#### ARTICLE IV,

Each messenger shall before taking his seat in the Association, give satisfactory evidence to the Association, of his appointment by the church he represents; yet this Association shall be competent to refuse membership to all unworthy messengers.

#### ARTICLE V.-OFFICERS.

The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, an Assistant Moderator, a Recording Secretary and a Treasurer, who shall be annually elected by ballot or otherwise. Their duties to be common to same respective offices in similar Associations.

#### ARTICLE VI.

The Treasurer shall hold all funds of the Association and shall pay them out only upon order of the Association or Executive Board, drawn by the Secretary and signed by the Moderator. He shall be required to give sufficient security for the safe keeping of all money commit at to his care. He shall give a full report of all money received ad expended at each annual meeting.

#### ARTICLE VII .- EXECUTIVE BOARD.

There shall be appointed annually, an Executive Board of nine representative brethren, who shall conduct the business of the Association during the intervals of its sittings. Said Board shall submit annually a report of their work.

#### ARTICLE VIII.-MISSIONARY.

The Association shall appoint a Missionary or Missionaries, who shall devote the entire year to preaching the Gospel, organizing churches and labeling for the denomination within the bounds of this District. He or they shall submit monthly reports to the Executive Board of the work done.

#### ARTICLE IX. GRIVAENCES.

All griveances coming up before the Association from churches or individuals, shall be referred to a Committee of seven disinterested brethren, whose decision after an impartial finding shall be final

#### ARTICLE X.-ANNUAL MEETING.

The annual meeting shall be held at such time and place as the Association may direct

#### ARTICLE XI.—CONSTITUTION.

Constitution and its By-Laws, shall govern the Ministers' cons' meetings, which shall precede the regular sittings of cation; and in which such subjects may be considered and last end to the furtherance of the object of the Associat' n

Only such messengers as are in good standing in the churches shall be enrolled in the Ministers and Deacons' meeting

#### ARTICLE XII

This Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting of this Association by a two thirds vote of the members present.

#### ANNUAL AND LIFE MEMBERS

Any member of a regular Baptist church may become an annual member of this Association by the payment of fifty cents, and a life member by paying \$2 50.

A roll of life-members shall be kept in connection with this Constiiuti n.

## Rules of Decorum.

- 1. Every Brother must respectfully address the Moderator standing; he must confine himself to the subject under debate and avoid personalities.
- 2. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject, nor longer than five minutes without permission from the Association.
- 3. Messengers shall not be permitted to offer motions to table or refer matters, immediately after addressing the Association if others desire to speak upon the same.
- 4. No member shall absent himself without permission from the Moderator.
- 5. Any member leaving the Association for his home without leave of absence—his name shall not appear in the minutes when printed.
- 6. Any Brother violating any of these rules may be called to order by another member, in which case the Moderator shall immediately decide the question raised.
- 7. If any proposition or motion contains two or more points, it may be divided at the request of any member and the vote taken separately.
- 8. Before the vote is taken on any motion it shall be distinctly stated by the Moderator
- 9. At each annual meeting of the Association, the Moderato may appoint a time when gifts shall be received for such aged indi

gent ministers as deserve the assistance of the denomination.

- 10. These rules of order may be suspended when deemed necessary by the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.
- 11. Mell's "Parlimentary Practice," shall govern this Association in all questions not otherwise provided for in this Constitution.

- 1. At every sitting business shall be opened and closed with Divine service by the Moderator, or by whosoever he may appoint.
  - 2. Appointing Committees on Eurollment and Finance.
- 3. Reading letters from churches, which shall be first in order after the approval of the journal of each sitting.
  - 4. Report of Committee on Enrollment.
  - 5. Appointment of Committee on Permanent Organization.
  - 6. Election of Officers and their introduction.
  - 7. Reading letters from new churches and Associations.
- 8. Introduction of Corresponding messengers and visiting brethren.
- 9. Appointment of Committees on Devotional Exercises, Executive Board, Obituary, State University, Home and Foreign Missions, Indigent Ministers' Fund, Correspondence, Vacant Pastorates, Sunday Schools, Place of Next Meeting, Annual Sermons, Writer of Circular Letter, Temperance, Printing and Distributing Minutes,
- 10. Reports of Executive Board, Treasurer, and Missionary, followed by report of other Committees.
  - 11. New Business.
  - 12. Reading of minutes for amendment or approval.
- 13. Vote of thanks. Valedictory by the Moderator. Parting hand Adjournment.

## MINUTES.

FIRST DAY-MORNING SESSION.

BARDSTOWN, KY., JULY. 9, 1903.

The Central District Association met in its Thirty-fourth annual session with Rev. C. H. Parrish, D. D., in the chair, who called the meeting to order at 10 o'clock a. m. Devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. H.W. Jones, who sang "Must Jesus bear the cross alone."

The Moderator read I chapter Romans and made some interesting remarks. Rev. S. Mack led in a fervent prayer Rev. H. W. Jones sang "Never to leave me alone," Dr. D. A. Gaddie offered prayer for the objects of the Association. Rev. Wm. Johnson lined "There is a fountain filled with blood."

The Moderator then read the order of business and appointed the following Committees:

Finance—Revs. J. H. Perdue, C. M. Jacobs and Prof. W. C. Jorden.

Enrollment Revs Wm. Johnson, H. W. Jones, H. Bowen and Prof. F. B. Hawkins.

Letters from the various churches were read until the hour of adjournment.

On motion the rule was suspended to hear the Committee on Enrollment make a partial report.

On motion the partial report was adopted

An earnest prayer was offered by Rev. C C. Bates

The Moderator appointed Revs. R. Reynolds, E. W. Reed, N. Caldwell, G. F. Watson and John H. Frank as a Committee on Permanent Organization.

Benediction by Rev. Wm. Reed.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Association reassembled at 2 o'clock p. m., with Dr. C. H. Parrish in the chair. Devotional services were conducted by Rev. W. B. Hall who sang "Must Jesus bear the cross alone" Prayer by Rev. E. B. Milton.

The Association sang "Alas and did my Savior bleed." Prayer by Dr. E. P. Marrs. The Moderator read the 3rd chapter of Phillipines and commented on the Scripture read. Rev. E. T. Offutt lead the Association in prayer, Minutes of the morning session were read and adopted.

Rev. J. F. Tevis presented the request of the Clay St. church, asking the Association to give them a collection to assist them in raising funds for their old debt.

On motion a collection was taken for said church to the amount of \$4.13.

On motion a collection be taken for Rock Bridge church on Friday afternoon. The hour for preaching having arrived, the Moderator introduced Rev. E. T. Offutt, who led in singing "Savior more than life to me," and offered prayer.

Rev. G. F. Watson was introduced and preached an excellent and thoughtful sermon. Song 'How firm a foundation." The speaker took for a text, Luke 14:17, "Come, for all things are now ready." Subject, The Universal Invitation"

Rev Wm Reed led in singing "Did Christ over sinners weep." Rev. R. Reynolds offered prayer. Song "My soul be on thy guard."

The Committee on Permanent organization made its report. The majority report made by Rev R. Reynolds recommended for:

On motion the majority report was adopted with an amendment, allowing any other nominations that should be made Collection 60 cents.

On motion the Association adjourned.

#### NIGHT SESSION.

The Association met at 8 o'clock p. m., Rev. S. Mack in the chair. Rev. C. J. Murphy lined "Shall wisdom cry aloud" Rev. L. H. Coleman offered prayer. The congregation sang "Amazing grace," Rev. Wm. Johnson led in prayer. Rev. L. H. Coleman lined "O for a closer walk with God."

The Moderator introduced Rev. John H Perdue, the appointee to preach the Doctrinal sermon. The choir sang "O happy day," the Moderator read a selection from the gospel of John and Hebrews, Rev. C. J. Murphy offered prayer. The choir sang "Sweet peace." The Rev. Perdue took for a text Psalms 119:9, "Where with all shall a young

man cleanse his way by taking heed according to thy word. Subject, 'Early conversion of the youth, the hope of the world.'

Rev. John H Frank, D. D., offered prayer. The congregation sang "Bless be the tie that binds."

On motion the Association meet to-morrow morning a 9 o'clock a m Collection \$4.22.

Benediction by Rev. A. Merrifield.

#### SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION.

The Association met at 10 o'clock a. m., Moderator Dr. Parrish in the chair Devotional services were conducted by Rev. F. Generals, Song "Amazing grace how sweet the sound" Bro. A. H. Weber offered prayer The services were further introduced by Rev. I. Herrington who lined "Bless be the tie that binds" Prayer by Rev.G. W. Floyd

The Moderator read a few verses of the fourth chapter of 2nd Timothy and commented on several verses. Song "Blessed Assurance."

The minutes of the afternoon and night sessions were read and adopted The clerk then proceeded to read letters after which the partial roport on Eurollment was adopted.

Prof. W. C. Jordan was then presented and delivered a welcome address.

On motion Rev. H. W. Jones responded.

The Association met at 2 p. m, Rev. W. H Craighead in the chair. Rev. Wm. Brown read 6 chapter of 2nd Timothy. Rev. E. W. Reed lined hymn 202 and offered prayer.

The minutes of the previous session were read and adopted.

Rev. John H. Frank, D. D. made the report of the Executive Board.

On motion the report was adopted. See report (A.)

On motion of Dr. C. H. Parrish, a Committee on Resolution be inserted in the Rules of Order

The Treasurer, Dr. D A. Gaddie made his report.

Revs. M. Toomy of Nashville, Tenu., and Jesse Williams now pastor at Anchorage were introduced and made remarks.

On motion Sister Lula M. Jackson, the representative of the Baptist Women's Educational Convention be given an opportunity to present her work immediately after the Missionary sermon.

The hour having arrived for the Missionary sermon, Rev. J. B. Winrow lined "I heard the voice of Jesus say," read 24 chapter of Mathew and offered prayer.

The Moderator introduced Rev. H. W. Jones of Owenton, who took for a text 14 verse of the 24 chapter Mathew "And this Gospel shall be preached in all the world for a witness, then shall the end come." The speaker handled his subject with perfect ease and preached a stirring sermon

Rev. E. P. Marrs, D. D., offered special prayer for Rev. S. Smith who is now sick at his home in New Liberty.

As is our custom a collection for Mission work was lifted, \$4.13.

Sister Lula M. Jackson was then introduced, who presented the claim of the Baptist Women's Educational Convention. A collection was taken to the amount of \$8 oo.

A collection of \$1.25 was taken for Rock Bridge church. On motion \$2.00 be taken from treasury to supplement the collection.

Committee on Sunday Schools made its report. On motion the report was adopted. See report (H.)

On motion after the collection for Education to-night Dr. Iordan be allowed to present his claim and a collection be taken for his work.

Committee on Indigent Ministers made its report. On motion the report was adopted. See report (I.)

On motion the appointing of a District Missionary be referred to the Executive Board.

On motion we stand adjourned. Benediction by Dr. C. H. Parrish.

#### NIGHT SESSION.

The Association reassembled at 8 o'clock p m. Rev. E. P. Marrs, D. D., read 23 Psalm Prayer was offered by Rev. Toomy,

Dr Parrish read the report on State University. The report was discussed by Dr. Marrs and Rev. Hampton.

On motion the report was adopted. See report (L)

Committee on Resolutions made its report. On motion the report was adopted. See report (K.)

Rev. W B. Hall read 7th chapter of Matthew. The choir sang a selection. Prayer by Rev. W, B Hall.

Dr, C. L Purce was introduced by the Moderator. The speaker took for a text :4th verse 7th chapter of Matthew, "Ye shall know them by their fruits" The Dr. preached an excellent logical sermon

A collection was taken for State University to the amount of \$15 07.

Rev. L. G. Jordan, Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board was introduced and stated the necessity of Foreign Missions in a very impressive manner. A collection for his work was taken to the amount of \$4.16.

The minutes were read. On motion the minutes were adopted.

The Financial Committee made its report and raised \$160.95. On motion the report was adopted.

Rev John H. Frank, D. D, Moderator of the General Association urged upon the Ministers and friends to attend the General Association which meets in Danville in Angust.

The parting hand was extended and the Association adjourned to attend a Banquet, given by the members of the church.
