RULES OF ORDER.

1. The Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen annually by ballot, immediately after reading the letters and credentials; those of the former year continuing in office until the choice is made.

2. "Mell's Parliamentary Practice" shall be the standard of rules by which the deliberations of the Association shall be governed.

3. The Clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings, taking care of the books and papers belonging to the Association, and furnish a copy of the Minutes of its transactions at each session for publication and distribution among the churches.

4. At every sitting, business shall be opened and closed with prayer by the Moderator, or whomsoever he may request.

5. Corresponding members and ministers invited to a seat with the Association may debate, but shall not vote on any subject before it.

6. No member of the Association shall absent himself without leave of the Moderator.

7. No person shall speak more than once on any motion, until all others wishing to speak have spoken, unless by the permission of the Association.

8. Arrangements for the next Association shall not be attended to on the first day of the session.

9. When two or more churches apply for the Association to be held with them, the one applying which has been the longest without it shall be entitled to it.

10. The Roll of Messengers shall be read the second and third days of the Association, and those absent on the third morning, unless by consent of the Association, shall have their names stricken from the list of Messengers.

11. The basis of representation from the churches shall be two Messengers for each church, and an additional one for fifty members, and one for every fraction over twenty—and no one shall be eligible to a seat who is not a member of the church sending him.

12. The Minutes shall be leisurely read and corrected, if necessary, before the rising of the Association.

13. These Rules shall be distinctly read by the Clerk immediately after the organization of the Association.

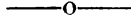

Our next session will be held with the church at Versailles, on the Tuesday after the second Sunday in August, 1887.

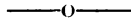
We hope to have you with us at that time, both by letter and messengers.

In directing the work you have committed to our hands, we are fully convinced that the churches will never progress farther in systematic benevolence than their pastors instruct and lead them. We therefore urge upon our pastors to impress upon their people the importance of systematic giving.

Brethren, we are but stewards, and soon shall be called to give an account of our stewardship. Shall sinners rise up in the great day to condemn us for our unfaithfulness?

REPORT OF MISSIONARIES.

HINTON.

Bro. J. H. Cannon has been preaching to this church one Saturday and Sunday in each month. He writes: "This is a faithful little band struggling and doing the best they can against fearful odds. The opposition has been quite strong, but I think the Lord will bring them through, and there will yet be a good church there."

MT. FREEDOM.

This church has been without a pastor until last May, when Bro. J. C. Freeman commenced preaching to them. He reports very encouragingly of the field. The members take great interest in the church and Sunday School. They have a very well conducted school every Sunday morning in the church building, and, in the afternoon, one in a school-house at High Bridge."

Bro. Freeman writes. "The assistance the Board is giving them is, in my opinion, money wisely invested, for I look forward to good results to follow.

CLOVER BOTTOM.

Bro T. Warn Beagle visited this church last May and preached for them—the first service for eighteen months—and organized a Sunday-school of about 80 scholars.

Since May he has preached two Sunday afternoons in each month. In July, with the assistance of Rev. C. M. Riley, he held a meeting of three weeks; during the time 25 were added to the church, strengthening it very much. He reports "the outlook for the church is better than for years."

CORINTH.

Bro. J. V. Riley served this church until December 31, 1885, since which time no report has been received. It is gratifying, however, that even without a pastor, and without regular meetings, the Church sent up a letter, borne by a good sister, with a contribution of Five dollars for State Missions and sixty cents for printing the Minutes.

The Treasurer, having received many contributions during the session of the morning, was not ready to report, and further time was granted him.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Viewed in its extent and difficultness the Foreign Mission work is doubtless the greatest enterprise before the christian world; and it is pleasant to record that God is greatly blessing his people in this work. According to recent statistics, the total number of communicants of all denominations in strictly mission-fields is about 300,000, more than 115,000 being added during the last year.

The last report of the Richmond Board to the Southern Baptist Convention shows 120 missionaries and native assistants employed, 14 in Mexico, 12 in Brazil, 14 in Italy, 17 in Africa, and 63 in China. These laborers

occupy 33 stations, and report encouraging advancement in all their work.

During the year the Board had unusual expenses, and special efforts to collect funds became necessary. As the wisdom of such efforts has been questioned, we give the Board's very clear explanation of the matter. "The expenses of sending out missionaries are often great, and when on the field they cannot be either recalled or forsaken in time of money pressure. Certain heavy expenses are fixed, and cannot be curtailed to meet emergencies. Besides, our missions draw on us quarterly in advance, and the drafts must be met, else ruin would come to the good name of the Board."

Notwithstanding the special efforts the Board closed the year with a debt of \$8,647. If we reckon from her contribution of the preceding year, Kentucky falling \$2,134 behind, helped to that extent to create the debt. If there is a fault here, we of Elkhorn do not share it. According to our Minutes of last year 20 of our churches gave \$900. This year 20 churches report \$959 97, an increase of \$59 97, notwithstanding the financial depression of the times.

We sincerely hope the time is at hand when all our ministers and members will feel it a duty and a privilege to aid this great work, and that the aid, however small, will be extended cheerfully and in due time.

We recommend that money for this work be forwarded by the Treasurer of the Executive Committee to Mr. Theo. Harris, Treasurer of the State Board, Louisville, Ky., and that an order be made accordingly.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

Your Committee would call attention to the following facts, which are of such a nature as awaken prayerful solicitude and earnest enquiry. There were in Georgetown College during the last year, from the territory covered by the Elkhorn Association, exclusive of Scott county, only two students. There were in Georgetown Female Seminary, from this same territory, exclusive of Scott county, six young ladies of Baptist families. Elkhorn Association prides herself on being one of the leading Associations of the State of Kentucky, in the strength of her ministry, in the liberality and intelligence of her members. With an acquaintance somewhat extensive your committee admit this claim. But do not the facts given above indicate that the members of this proud body are radically deficient in the recognition of their duty to train their children for the highest usefulness and power? Are not these facts enough to startle us? Surely they should bring us to an earnest discussion of this subject of higher education, and to an honest consideration of the painful and far-reaching of the consequences of a failure to do our duty in this matter.

The Blue grass region of Kentucky is justly famed for the beauty and fertility of its lands, and the wealth and intelligence of its people. Up to this time the Baptists have been a strong people in this section. But how are they likely to be affected by the continuance of their present indifference concerning the education of their sons and daughters? It is a hard matter to persuade our people to give their means for the adequate endowment of our schools and colleges—it is a harder thing just now to persuade them to avail themselves of the advantages of their institutions for their boys and girls. What is to be done? for something must be done to arouse our people. We recommend—

1st. That those churches which have not contributed their part towards the endowment of the Elkhorn Memorial chair in Georgetown College be urged to do so at once.

2d. That Revs. W. M. Pratt, F. H. Kerfoot and T. W. Beagle be appointed a special committee to aid in every way they can Rev. W. P. Harvey in the completion of this amount.

3d. That our pastors be requested to join their energies and talents to those of our teachers in preaching anew and with flaming zeal the gospel of education to our people.

REPORT ON ORPHAN'S HOME.

Your committee are glad to report that the Home has had a year of gratifying prosperity, notwithstanding the depression of the times. The work in every department has been wisely conducted, and exhibits signs of neatness, order and thrift; while the general management has been entirely satisfactory, and is entitled to our gratitude, renewed endorsement and continued support.

During the year, ending May, 1886, forty-two children were received from nineteen counties in the State, and five were readmitted. Thirty-eight were placed in Christian homes, nineteen of whom were adopted. There are now in the Home sixty children.

Since the Home was founded, June 30th, 1869, five hundred and twenty-four children have been cared for. Of this number, three hundred and sixty-four were from the State at large and the remaining one hundred and sixty from the city of Louisville.

Special reference is made to the necessity of increasing the accommodations of the Home. There are already more applications for admission than can be accepted. Shall we, *can* we, turn a deaf ear to the pleadings of helpless orphanage for food and raiment, for shelter and Christian care? The Board of Managers are calling for twenty-thousand dollars with which to supply the much-needed house room. The Baptists of Louisville generously offer to raise ten thousand dollars of this amount, provided only, that their brethren outside of the city will raise the other ten thousand. Shall we not promptly accept their proposition, so far as it applies to us as churches, and proceed to raise at once our *pro rata* of the amount desired from the denomination of the State? Your committee recommend that such action be taken, and that the Association devise a plan by which the money may be raised.

We also recommend that *The Orphan's Friend*, published at the Home monthly, at \$1.00 a year, be commended to the patronage of all the members of our churches.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We presume that the work of this committee is to report to this body the work or the leading features of the work performed within its limits during the last year, accompanied by facts and suggestions designed to awaken a deeper interest upon a subject which increase with the increase of years.

The Sunday Schools have been requested to answer a few questions which would have enabled us to have come nearer complying with the purpose of our appointment, if the response had been fuller.

We have heard from but 13 churches—not one half—from which we have gleaned the following facts: 1167 scholars, 109 teachers, 76 conversions, \$680 collected, and that almost all the schools use Baptist literature, which certainly is consistent. Very few use the shun—to-declare-the-whole-gospel candidates for public favor. The third largest school reports the largest number of conversions—two twelve—two eleven. Six schools report about the same number of scholars. All but two report conversions. Four, no money, which must have been an oversight. There is an average of eleven (11) scholars to each teacher, and each pupil average 60 cents. Supposing one half of the schools to consist of Christians, there has been one conversion in every seven scholars. Stamping Ground deserves honorable mention, having two mission schools. It is certainly wise to develop the home church and vicinity, which is being done so generally by our churches. Yet are we not slack in our mission work—do we appreciate its importance?

We would humbly suggest for your consideration at this session the propriety of expending part of the money raised for Sunday School purposes in the employment of one or more Colporteurs to work within our bounds in selling Baptist literature and in establishing Sunday Schools in destitute communities; and that our Board encourage such brethren to take hold of this class of mission work with the understanding that they shall receive such aid as shall be deemed judicious.

We would urge the necessity of all the churches taking collections for the Sunday School cause, and to forward the same to the Board, that will use it in the most profitable manner.

On motion, the Committee was continued and authorized to secure the funds necessary to purchase a case in which said property may be preserved.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

From the Report of the Home Mission Board to the Southern Baptist Convention, at its last session, we gather the following in regard to the work of the Board for the year past:

“During the year now closing, the work of the Board has been extended beyond that of any preceding year of its history, and the divine blessing upon its labors excites the deepest emotions of gratitude.

The amount contributed by Kentucky to this work for the conventional year closing with May, 1886, was \$4,080 86, an increase over the previous year of \$266 70. For the present year Kentucky Baptists are asked to contribute for the general work, \$8,000; and for the Cuban Missions, \$2,000.

There are now in the South eighteen millions of people without the pale of our churches. The saving of these millions of souls, in our own land, calls loudly for increased liberality, and renewed and greater consecration, both of spirit and means, upon the part of all professing to be the followers of our blessed Redeemer.

COLORED PEOPLE.

The spiritual interests of this largely benighted people call to us in thrillingly earnest and imperative tones. The work of redeeming them from the gross superstitions peculiar to their race, the errors sought to be instilled into their minds and hearts by false teachers of false systems of religion, belongs to christians in this South-land, and upon none does this responsibility rest so imperatively as upon Baptists: "In all this broad land there is no christian work which has stronger claims upon us, none in which we can hope for more blessed results to ourselves or to those for whom we labor, than among the colored people of the South."

CUBAN MISSION.

In addition to the work at home, the fostering care of this most significantly providential and interesting field has been laid upon this Board. Its claims demand our most prayerful consideration and liberal contributions.

As a fitting close to this report, we make the following extract from the last Report of the Home Mission Board:

"The ultimate end of all Christian effort is to give the gospel to every creature, and every Christian organization—all our churches, Sunday Schools, Mission Societies, Associations, and Conventions—are to be valued by the influence they exert in the accomplishment of this end. They are worth just so much as they contribute to the perfection of this grand design of our Saviour and no more. Let our Home Mission work be estimated by this rule.

The evangelization of this country is the prime factor in the world's conversion. From our American churches, more largely than from all the remainder of the world, must be drawn both of men and means to conquer the world for Christ.

Without the consecration of the resources and energies of our people to this mighty task, there seems, to human eyes, little hope for the spreading of the gospel to the ends of the earth. This land of ours must be the base of supply for the host of God that invades the dark heathen realms. From our churches must go forth ten thousand consecrated soldiers of the Cross, an immortal band, to subdue the nations. To sustain them, we must have strong, active liberal churches at home, organized for the Master's work and thoroughly in sympathy with his loving purposes to man.

We must fill our land with the truth; consecrate to our King the spiritual power of its sixty millions of people; subordinate all its vast material and industrial resources to the work of the Lord; make its commerce tributary to the great ends of human redemption; transmute its gold and precious things into the bread of life to feed the starving nations; then, and to us it seems not until then, over this dark earth will righteousness go forth as brightness and salvation a lamp that burneth."

We recommend that money for this work be forwarded by the Treasurer of the Executive Committee to Mr Thos. Hines, Treasurer of the State Board, Louisville, Ky., and that an order be made accordingly.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Your committee on State Missions would report as follows :

Quoting from the report on State Missions at the late meeting of the General Association, "we find that the sum of \$7,403.04 has been raised and expended for State Missions during the year, being a small increase over the receipts of the previous year. Forty-three missionaries have been employed and sustained in part or in whole, and 2,026 members added to the churches by baptism and otherwise. Contributed on the field for missionary purposes \$1,919.53. Five thousand eight hundred and eight dollars has been raised for church building purposes, and eight meeting houses have been erected."

The number of sermons preached, lectures delivered, and much other work done are not reported.

Of the amount raised and expended in Kentucky during the past year for State Missions, Elkhorn Association contributed \$424.42. We would recommend hearty co-operation in the State Mission work during the coming year by increased contributions and in every other way possible.

HISTORY OF THE ELKHORN ASSOCIATION.

BY J. E. FARNAM.

TENTH DECADE.

1876.

The Association held its Ninety-first anniversary with the Stamping Ground Baptist Church, Scott County, Ky. August 15th, 16th, and 17th, 1876. Introductory sermon by Elder L. B. Woolfolk from Hebrews x: 4. Delegates from twenty-five churches presented letters and organized by electing Elder George Hunt Moderator and B. W. D. Seeley Clerk. Messengers from Franklin, Concord, Shelby County, and Long Run Associations were received and invited to seats. In place of the usual circular letter a "Historical Sketch of the Association," prepared by Dr. B. Manly, was read, and the writer was requested to continue the history, furnishing an abstract thereof for publication in the minutes of the Association for next year.

The history of the Great Crossings Church, prepared by Prof. J. N. Bradley and read on the occasion of the centennial celebration of said church, was ordered to be printed in the minutes of this year.

The Association adopted the following resolution :

Resolved, That in lieu of the circular letter, the history of some one or more of the churches in this Association be written by some one appointed thereunto."

A committee was also appointed to endeavor to obtain the histories of the churches of this Association which have become extinct.

Elder J. P. Boyce, by invitation, addressed the Association in behalf of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville. His address was followed by remarks from several brethren in advocacy of the claims of the Institution upon our churches.

Reports on Foreign, Home, and State Missions and on Ministerial Education, were read and discussed.

It was also

Resolved, That we earnestly recommend to the Baptists of this Association to contribute, in addition to what has been secured, so that the \$30,000, which we desire to raise for the endowment of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, may be secured and the whole amount of \$300,000 from Kentucky be obtained before June 1, 1877.

Resolutions were offered and addresses made "In Memoriam," in reference to Bro. J. M. Frost, Sr., whose death occurred on the 24th of May, 1876.

The Ninety-Second Session was held with the South Elkhorn Church, Fayette County, Ky., August 14th, 15th and 16th, 1877. John Stout was chosen Moderator, and B. W. D. Seeley, Clerk. Introductory Sermon by W. M. Pratt, from Ex. xxxiii: 14.

Delegates from twenty-four churches were enrolled, and Messengers from ten Associations were received and invited to seats and to participation in the deliberations of the Association.

Miss Mary Hollingsworth, Matron of the Baptist Orphans' Home at Louisville, being present, was invited to present the claims of that Institution, and a collection, amounting to \$136 was taken up therefore.

Dr. B. Manly, by previous appointment, read in place of the Circular Letter a sketch of the early history of the Association, and was requested to continue the same next year. The committee appointed at the last Session of the Association to procure histories of extinct Baptist Churches once belonging to this body, reported, through Elder Cad. Lewis, a history of the Big Spring Church, which was ordered to be printed.

Reports on State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, on Education and on Sunday Schools, were made and discussed.

A resolution recommending that "each church of the Association send its pastors and deacons, to meet at Lexington with the Upper Street Church on the 28th of September next, to consult in regard to missionary work in our bonds," was adopted.

The claims of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary were presented by Elder J. E. Carter.

In reference to the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville, it was unanimously

Resolved, That in the opinion of this body, so soon as the sum of \$300,000 has been subscribed there should be no further effort to carry the endowment, at present, beyond that sum, but that the field should be open for other important enterprises to which we are pledged, and that a Committee be appointed to communicate the substance of this resolution to Dr. J. P. Boyce.

Brethren R. M. Dudley, Cad. Lewis and George Hunt were appointed as the Committee.

Resolved, That we urge upon the Trustees of Georgetown College to take steps to enlarge the endowment of that Institution at the earliest expedient time, and commend the enterprise to our brotherhood as one worthy of our earnest and hearty co-operation.

1878.

The Ninety-third session was held with the Cane Run Church, Fayette County, Ky., August 13th, 14th, and 15th, 1878. John Stout, Moderator. B. W. D. Seeley, Clerk. Introductory sermon by J. M. Frost, Jr., from 2 Cor. xii: 1-6.

Delegates from twenty-six churches were enrolled, and messengers from eight corresponding Associations presented letters and were invited to seats.

The usual reports on Missions—Foreign, Home, State, and Domestic—were read and discussed.

Nineteen churches complied with the recommendation of the Association last year to send delegates to a meeting to be held in Lexington for the purpose of devising a plan for more efficient effort "to occupy and have the Gospel preached in the vacant places within our bounds." and the Executive Committee recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That we request the churches of this Association to make a special contribution during the month of October for missionary work

within our bounds, to be devoted, under the direction of the Executive Committee of the Association, to aid the churches in Paris and Nicholasville in securing pastors who shall devote one-half of their time to missionary work in Bourbon and Jessamine counties.

Resolved, That this Association heartily approve the general and special management of the Louisville Baptist Orphan's Home by the Board, and we do especially endorse the efficiency and highly satisfactory government of Miss Mary Hollingsworth during her entire connection with the institution.

Resolved, That it is the duty of the Executive Committee to secure, if possible, collections from all the churches in our Association, and thus remove the necessity of agents visiting them.

Preaching at the stand by Elders Keyes, Carter, and Berry.

1879.

The Ninety-fourth anniversary of the Elkhorn Association was held with Hillsboro Church, Woodford County, Ky., August 12th, 13th, and 14th, 1879. Delegates bearing letters from twenty-eight churches organized by electing John Stout Moderator, B. W. D. Seeley Clerk, and W. B. Galloway Assistant Clerk. J. E. Carter preached the introductory sermon from Acts, 26: 23, "Almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian."

Messengers from Corresponding Associations — Franklin, Boone's Creek, Concord, Bracken, Shelby County, Salem, and Campbell County—presented letters and were enrolled.

Reports on Home Missions, Foreign Missions, on Education, and on Sunday Schools read and discussed.

Rev. M. T. Summer, Secretary of the American Baptist Publication Society, located at Philadelphia, was invited to address the Association in behalf of the society which he represented; and a resolution commending the society "to the confidence and sympathy of our churches" was adopted.

R. M. Dudley was appointed to continue the "Annals of the Association hitherto furnished by Dr. B. Manly.

Appropriate resolutions were passed in reference to the life and labors of Rev. R. T. Dillard, whose death occurred since the last session of the Association.

The transfer of Dr. Manly from the College at Georgetown to the Theological Seminary at Louisville and the appointment of Dr. Dudley to the Presidency of the college were endorsed by appropriate resolutions.

Preaching at the stand by Elders G. Clay Smith and Lansing Burrows.

Contributed during the year to objects of Christian benevolence, as reported: Ministerial education, \$280.40; State Missions, \$561.00; Home Missions, \$396.31; Foreign Missions, \$546 47; Sunday Schools, \$633.76; Orphan's Home, \$253 75

1880.

The Ninety-Fifth Session of the Association was held with the Glen's Creek Church, Woodford County, Ky., August 17th, 18th and 19th, 1880. Delegates from Twenty-eight churches organized by electing John Stout, Moderator, and B. W. D. Seeley, Clerk.

Introductory Sermon by R. M. Dudley from Rom. 4: 5.

Messengers from Corresponding Associations: Franklin, Shelby county, Bracken, Baptist, Tates' Creek, North Bend and Long Run presented letters and were invited to seats.

Resolved, That during the Association no speech of more than ten minutes shall be made, except by Chairmen of Committees making reports, who shall be allowed fifteen minutes.

Dr. Dudley read, as the Circular Letter, the 4th and 5th decades of the

history of Elkhorn Association, which was received and ordered to be printed in the Minutes.

The usual Reports of Committees made and discussed.

The Executive Committee reported appropriations made by them in aid of churches in the Association, as follows: To Bryan's Station, Fifty Dollars; to Bourbon County, One Hundred and Fifty; to Jessamine County, One Hundred Dollars; to Williamstown, One Hundred Dollars.

Committee on the "Bible and Publication Society" reported the following resolution, which was adopted: "That we recommend the literature of the 'American Baptist Publication Society' to our Churches and Sunday Schools." (The Mt. Vernon Church was received into this Association.)

1881.

The Ninety-sixth meeting of the Elkhorn Association was held with the Nicholasville Church, Jessamine County, Ky., August 16th, 17th, and 18th, 1881. John Stout was chosen Moderator; B. W. D. Seeley, Clerk; J. N. Bradley, Assistant Clerk.

Delegates from twenty-eight churches presented letters and were enrolled.

Messengers from seven Associations received and invited to seats.

In place of the Circular letter an instalment of the history of the Elkhorn Association, embracing the years 1816-1829, was read by Dr. Dudley. Adopted and the writer requested to continue the history.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That we, the members of the Elkhorn Association, do deeply sympathize with the brethren at Danville in the loss of their meeting-house by fire, and that we invite their pastor, as financial agent, to visit the churches in our Association and solicit aid to enable them to rebuild their house of worship.

Reports made and discussed on Education, on Foreign, Home, and State Missions and on Sunday Schools.

Sums raised for these objects, as reported by the churches, as follows: On Ministerial Education, \$380.41; Foreign Missions, \$587.24; Home Missions, \$425.16; State Missions, \$902; Sunday Schools, \$919.61; Orphan's Home, \$129.

Preaching at the stand by Elders Pratt and Dobbs.

1882.

The Association held its Ninety-seventh session with the Baptist Church at Mt. Pleasant, Ky., August 15th, 16th, and 17th, 1882. John Stout, Moderator; B. W. D. Seeley, Clerk. Introductory sermon by Elder Lansing Burrows from Mat. 27: 6-7.

Delegates from twenty-eight churches and messengers from four Corresponding Associations, viz: North Bend, Long Run, and Baptist.

Miss Mary Hollingsworth was "recognized as representing the Baptist Orphan's Home at Louisville."

Dr. Dudley read, as the Circular letter, a continuance of the history of Elkhorn Association, which was adopted and the writer requested to continue the history.

The Executive Committee reported as collected for State Missions, \$977.10; for Home Missions \$511.46; Foreign Missions, \$403.45; for Ministerial education, \$87.25; State Sunday School Board, \$77.21.

Sermons preached at the stand by Dr. Manly and Elder G. F. Bagby

Four hundred and thirty-seven dollars were contributed at the stand for the Orphan's Home.

Resolutions were passed urging upon Kentucky Baptists the duty of

their educational interests at Georgetown by patronizing the College and the Female Seminary located there.

It was ordered "that any member of this body present at any Association with which we correspond, be authorized to represent this body."

Resolved That this Association heartily endorse the action of the last General Association, appointing a committee whose duty it should be to suggest a plan by which we may be able to make permanent provisions for aged and disabled ministers.

Resolved, That Bro. W. M. Pratt be invited to close the services of this afternoon with such remarks as he may deem appropriate to the occasion.

Appropriate resolutions were passed in reference to Prof. Danford Thomas, deceased, and ordered to be published in the minutes.

1883.

The Ninety-eight session of the Association was held with the David's Fork Church, Fayette County, Ky., August 11th, 12th, and 13th, 1883.

Delegates from twenty-nine churches were enrolled and organized by the election of John Stout, Moderator; B. W. D. Seeley, Clerk; J. R. Howard, Assistant Clerk.

Introductory sermon by J. J. Taylor, on Luke 17: 20-21.

Messengers from ten corresponding Associations were received and invited to seats.

The following visiting brethren were also invited to seats and to participate in the exercises of this Association: Elders J. L. Burrows, of Norfolk, Va.; J. W. Warder, Corresponding Secretary of the State Board; I. T. Tichenor, Corresponding Secretary of the Home Mission Board; J. M. Frost, Jr., of Staunton, Va.

Dr. Pratt read the report of the special committee on the Centennial resolutions recommending, that besides the ordinary exercises of the Association and interwoven with them, the appointment of persons to prepare and present on the said anniversary addresses on the history of the Association upon the work of the Association and upon the deceased ministers of the Association; that persons be appointed to present a brief history of the churches that now belong or may have belonged to the Association, all of which shall be compiled under the title of "The Memorial Volume of the Elkhorn Association"..... We recommend further.....the endowment of a chair in Georgetown College, to be called the "Elkhorn Memorial Professorship." The report was discussed and unanimously adopted, and Dr. K. M. Dudley appointed agent of the Association to raise the amount necessary to endow the Memorial Chair.

The seventh decade of the history of the Association was read by Dr. Dudley and adopted.

Reports on Home and Foreign Missions, on State and Domestic Missions, on Sunday Schools, and on the Orphan's Home were read and discussed.

1884.

The Ninety-ninth anniversary of the Association was held with the Silas Church, Bourbon County, Ky., August 12th, 13th, and 14th, 1884

Delegates from twenty-nine churches organized by electing Dr. E. H. Black Moderator and B. W. D. Seeley Clerk. Introductory sermon by J. A. Booth from Eph. 2: 3, "We all were by nature the children of wrath."

Messengers from eight Corresponding Associations were received and invited to seats.

The reports from committees on Home and Foreign Missions, on Sunday Schools, and on the Orphan's Home were read and discussed.

Hinton Baptist Church applied for membership in the Association, and the application was referred to a committee, on whose favorable report the church was received to membership, and the hand of fellowship was extended to its delegates by the Moderator.

President R. M. Dudley, appointed at the last session of this body to solicit subscriptions to endow a chair in Georgetown College, reported that he had procured for this purpose, in bonds and pledges, about \$9,000 of the \$25,000 proposed to be raised for that purpose, as a Centennial Memorial.

Brief biographical sketches of Rev. Lyman W. Seeley and Deacon John Stout, deceased during the last Associational year, were ordered to be entered upon the minutes.

Preaching at the stand by Elders Pratt and Bent.

1885.

The One Hundredth Anniversary of Elkhorn Association was held with the First Baptist Church of Georgetown, Scott County, on the 11th, 12th and 13th of August, 1885. Introductory Sermon by J. C. Hiden, from 1 Timothy 3. 15—"The Church of the Living God, the Pillar and Ground of the Truth."

Delegates from Twenty-six churches organized by electing Dr. E. H. Black, Moderator, and B. W. D. Seeley, Clerk.

An Address of Welcome on behalf of the church and the citizens of Georgetown was made by Dr. John A. Lewis, which was responded to by W. H. Felix. Messengers present from twelve Corresponding Associations were enrolled; and visiting Ministers from Ohio, Alabama and South Carolina were invited to seats. The Reports on State Missions, on Education, and the Tenth Decade of the History of the Association, were made and adopted.

The second day of the Session was appropriated to "Centennial Exercises," R. M. Dudley addressed the body on "The Work of the Association"—what it had accomplished during the Century of its existence.

W. M. Pratt delivered an address on "The deceased Ministers of the Association." Thomas Rodman made an eloquent appeal for the "Orphans' Home."

The following telegram from the "General Association of Colored Baptists of Kentucky," was received: "The General Association of Colored Baptists send christian salutations to you in your Centennial Session, and ask your hearty co-operation and aid in the important educational work we are doing;" and W. M. Pratt was directed to make a suitable response.

On the third day of the session Reports from Committees were made on Foreign Missions, on Home Missions and on Sunday Schools, and on Education. A committee was also appointed to prepare a Memorial Volume, and to report to the Association at its next session.

Statistics for the Centennial year:—Number of Churches, 29; ordained Ministers, 22.
