RULES OF ORDER.

- 1. The Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen annually, by ballot, immediately after reading the letters and credentials; those of the former year continuing in office until the choice is made.
- 2. 'Kerfoot's Parliamentary Practice' shall be the standard of rules by which the deliberations of the Association shall be governed.
- 3. The Clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings, taking care of the books and papers belonging to the Association, and furnish a copy of the Minutes of its transactions at each session for publication and distribution among the churches.
- 4. At every sitting, business shall be opened and closed with prayer by the Moderator, or whomsoever he may request.
- 5. Corresponding members and ministers invited to a seat with the Association may debate, but shall not vote on any subject before it
- 6. No member of the Association shall absent himself without leave of the Moderator.
- 7. No person shall speak more than once on any motion, until all others wishing to speak have spoken, unless by permission of the Association.
- 8. Arrangements for the next Association shall not be attended to on the first day of the session.
 - 9. When two or more churches apply for the Association to be held with them, the one applying which has been the longest without it shall be entitled to it.
- 10. The Roll of Messengers shall be read the second and third days of the Association, and any Messenger known to have been present during the session shall be counted as present.
- 11. The basis of representation from the churches shall be two Messengers from each church, and an additional one for fifty members, and one for every fraction over twenty—and no one shall be eligible to a seat who is not a member of the church sending him.
- $12\,$ The Minutes shall be leisurely read and corrected, if necessary, before the rising of the Λs ociation.
- 13. These rules shall be distinctly read by the Clerk immediately after the organization of the Association.

PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

ELKHORN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

The Elkhorn Baptist Association convened in its One Hundred and Thirteenth Annual Session with the Upper Street Baptist church, Lexington, Ky., Tuesday, August 16, 1898, at 10 o'clock a. m., and after devotional exercises conducted by the Moderator, J. R. Howard, and prayer by Bro. T. Warn Beagle, proceeded to the transaction of business.

The letters from the twenty-seven churches composing the Association, were called for by the Moderator and all responded by letters and Messengers, which showed that the work within the bounds of the Association was in a hopeful and healthful condition.

After the reading of the letters from the several churches, Bro. J. J. Taylor, of Mobile, Ala., a former pastor of Upper Street church, Lexington, by invitation extended a hearty and generous welcome to the members and visitors at the Association, which was happily responded to by Bro. W. H. Felix, a former pastor of the First Baptist Church, Lexington, the Association being now entertained at the said First Baptist church through the courtesy of its officers and members, the location and seating capacity of its place of worship being better adapted to the accommodation of its sessions.

11 O'CLOCK A. M.—Bro. J. S. Sowers appointed to deliver the Annual Sermon, then preached from John 17:19.

Brethren E. G. Stout and C. H. Stevens were appointed Tellers to take the vote for Moderator and Clerk of the Association for the ensuing year, at the assembling of the convention at 2:30 o'clock. And then the Association adjourned until 2:30 o'clock p. m. Prayer by T. T. Eaton.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

We, your committee, would respectfully submit the following:

The subject of this report is one of great and growing interest with all well informed brethren. Obstacles in one department of this work have, in the Providence of God, been removed and the door has been thrown wider open than ever before for consecrated Baptist workers. In the vast field supervised by the largest body of Baptists in the world, there is a crying need for more preaching and labor, just such as is prosecuted by the wise Board at Atlanta, through its efficient laborers. We gave this work last year \$489.20. We believe the amount given this year is larger.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Your Committee in behalf of the churches of Elkhorn Association, desire with humble thankfulness to acknowledge the honor put upon us by Almighty God in making us co workers with His Son, our Lord Jesus Christ in the glorious mission of spreading the Gospel of Salvation unto the uttermost parts of the earth.

There is much to encourage our efforts. The great commission bears with it a greater promise. Our Lord is with us in all power; hundreds of thousands of our brethren throughout the South are united with us in praying, working and giving for the cause of Foreign Missions. 193 earnest men and women are on the field, faithfully proclaiming the tidings of the cross to the sin-cursed people of the earth. God is blessing the united labors of His people. During the conventional year 701 converts were baptized; and letters from the field tell of much good work now being done.

To day Southern Baptists stand face to face with a future calling for the largest conception of duty, larger contributions of money, and more earnest prayer than ever before. The fields are widening on all sides. War, diplomacy and commerce are breaking down every barrier to the Gospel. The men stand ready and anxious to enter these fields. God has prospered our people so that we are well able to send them. May we be as willing as we are able.

Elkhorn Association contributed for Foreign Missions last year \$1,390.12, about 25 cents per member. The following churches, David's Fork, Georgetown, Glenn's Creek, Midway, Paris, and Mt. Vernon have given more than \$100. Let us all endeavor to meet the full measure of our obligations for the glory of God and the salvation of a lost world.

In conclusion your committee would heartily commend the helpful work of the Womans' Societies within our bounds; also the heroic efforts of the Foreign Missionary Board in removing

the heavy burden of debt from our work, and the Foreign Mission Journal as a most efficient organ of information on all missionary topics. We would also call attention to the Fifth Sunday meetings now being planned for this Association, in which the subject of Missions will be fully presented.

CIRCULAR LETTER.

OUR POSSIBILITIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES.

To the churches composing the Elkhorn Association: We greet you again with our Annual Circular Letter. The past year has rolled into eternity with all its deeds recorded in the book of remembrance. It has, with all its failures and successes, brought to us wonderful possibilities and therefore greatly increased our responsibilities. By a gracious dispensation of God's special providence the gates to our mission fields are thrown wider, and the Macedonian cry from every clime is sounding louder, "Come over and help us." Moved and carried that the report of the Committee on Education be permitted to report at this hour, instead of the Committee on State Missions; which report on Education was read by Bro. J. N. Bradley, and after discussion by Brethren W. B. Crumptonland J. J. Taylor, was adopted.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Your committee are gratified to report that the schools and colleges within Elkhorn Association have had a prosperous year. Schools of private instruction have been well attended and pupils have made satisfactory advancement. The Female Seminary at Nicholasville has had a large attendance under the management of Mrs. Vineyard, and the year's work has been highly satisfactory to patrons, pupils and teacher. Georgetown College is in the fore front of all educational institutions of the State. It has had during the year closed in June, 1898, 25 instructors; an enrollment of 357 students, 225 males and 132 females; with 35 ministerial students. Its course of instruction has been thorough and complete, and its growth and prosperity is most gratifying. The graduating class of 1898 numbers 24; 15 young men and 9 young ladies. Of these 6 took the degree of Master of Arts, 5 young men and 1 young lady; 12 the degree of Bachelor of Arts, 8 young men and 4 young ladies; 4 the degree of Bachelor of Science, 2 young men and 2 young ladies; 2 Belles Lettres, both young ladies. We thus particularize to call attention to the fact of the success of the young women along the lines of young men, and we would emphasize the point that they have not only attained the same degree, but have finished the course as satisfactory as have the young men. Thus it demonstrates, beyond question, that co-education in our college is a great success.

We regret to note that Dr. A. C. Davidson, the President of the college, has resigned. His administration has been remarkably smooth and successful. While it is with grief that we give him up, we feel sure that a wise Providence will raise up the man to fill his place. Let us pray to this end, and rally to the support of the one chosen.

In order to accommodate the Committee on Temperance, some of whom were compelled to leave the Association, by motion and second the report of the Committee on Baptist Orphan's Home was postponed and the report of the Committee on Temperance was offered by Bro. Z. T. Cody, and after remarks by Brethren Cody, Kerfcot and Eaton, was adopted. A collection was taken amounting to about \$100.

The Association by motion and second, then proceeded to hear the report on Baptist Orphan's Home, which was read by Bro. J. M. Roddy, and after remarks by Brethren Roddy and Eaton, a collection in cash and pledges amounting to about \$300 was taken.

REPORT ON ORPHAN'S HOME.

With profound gratitude we acknowledge God's blessings upon the work being done at our Orphan's Home at Louisville. During the past 29 years 1,028 children have been received at the
Home. Of this number 300 were from the city of Louisville,
728 from the country. The Elkhorn Association at present has
one child at the Home. During the last Associational year there
have been received into the Home 23 children. Given out by
adoption 19; apprenticed, 6. The health of the Home during the
past year has been good, there being only one death. We wish
especially to commend the present management of the Home.

The great care exercised in receiving and giving out children indicates that the present managers have at heart the interest of the denomination, as well as the temporal and spiritual welfare of those placed under their care by the denomination. It is a lamentable fact that in the past year only eleven of our churches responded to the calls of our Home for help. The bills for current expenses of the Home are now over due. Brethren, come to the help of this your beloved institution. God continues to bless it. Are not you anxious to become a co-laborer with Him in providing for the homeless?

WEDNESDAY-2:30 O'CLCCK P. M.

After devotional exercises conducted by Bro. F. W. Eberhardt, the committee to whom Circular Letter had been referred, reported that they had examined the same and recommended its adoption, which was done accordingly without objection.

The hour for the consideration of the report on State Missions having arrived, Bro. W. H. Felix read the same and after interesting talks by Brethren W. H. Felix, J. W. Warder, H. H. Hibbs and I. M. Wise was adopted.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Your committee would call the special attention to what has been done in State Missions during the past year. We take the following statistics from the report of our Executive Board. There has been collected and expended on the field the sum of \$5,052.04. The missionaries under the Board have preached 4,556 sermons, attended 1,609 prayer-meetings, witnessed 1,182 conversions. They baptized 576, received 611 by letter and relation. They raised for church buildings on mission fields \$14,652.04 and for missions 1,322.13. They organized 58 Sunday-Schools, made 15,760 religious visits, distributed 85,022 pages of tracts, sold \$1,573.46 worth of Bibles, books and tracts, and gave away \$111.25 worth of Bibles, tracts and Testaments. On their

field were 79 Sunday-Schools, with 5,508 pupils. The schools raised \$350.61 for missions and \$606.58 for other benevolent purposes. The growth of the work in the last fourteen years has been encouraging. We call special attention to the work in Eastern Kentucky. We desire to commend the action of the Board to raise and expend \$5,000 on the mountain field in church building.

Bro. T. C. Bell, of Harrodsburg, was recognized and invited to a seat.

The report of the Committee on Young People's Work was read by Bro. E. B. Yates, who is an earnest and enthusiastic worker, and after being discussed by Brethren Hughson, the two brothers Felix and F. W. Eberhardt, the report was adopted.

REPORT OF YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK.

To Elkhorn Association: Your committee has labored earnestly to gather such statistics as would enable you to see the true condition of this work within your borders. The information thus gathered reveals some startling things. There appears to be no organized effort on the part of our Baptist workers to take up this work, and in consequence of this inaction the whole district is practically without any systematic helps for that large body of young people coming into our ranks each year. In gaining the information below tabulated, your committee sought the co-operation of each pastor; a blank form was sent by mail to each, with insructions to fill out and return to the committee at once. The result was as follows:

Fifteen pastors report no young people's societies of any kind; 10 pastors failed to make any report at all; while two pastors have societies in working order, with a total membership of 110. Paris Baptist church reports a B. Y. P. U. with a membership of 30, also a Junior B. Y. P. U. in splendid working order. Georgetown Baptist church reports a B. Y. P. U. with a membership of 35, also a Young People's Society, composed largely of college students, with a membership of 45; also a Mission Band has been organized among the children and is accomplishing much good under the leadership of a consecrated young woman. Your committee urges that an earnest appeal be made at once to all the pastors in this Association, to organize and keep in working order, at least one young people's society in each church, in which young and old may be willing workers, believing that in this lies the future greatness of our denomination.

SUNDAY-SCHOOL REPORT.

This work in our churches is of such importance, when considered in its bearing upon the future of the denomination, that it would be difficult to give it too emphatic or prominent a place in our discussions or plans. Your committee therefore would insist that more attention be given to Scriptural teaching—learning the Scripture and memorizing it—and to the study and regular recitation of the Spurgeon Baptist catechism, that by thus doing we may have a membership more thoroughly versed in the word of God, the very best guarantee for the perpetuity of Baptists. To accomplish this work it will require the co-operation of every friend of the churches and member of the Sunday-School. The need of such co-operation is apparent, the duty therefore while a privilege, is imperative. The Sunday-School work becomes the exponent of the consecration of the membership of the churches. The most gratifying achievements are secured along this line, when the home, with pious persistence, displays interest not only in striving to secure the attendance of every member of the home, but that each, from the oldest to the youngest that can, prepare the lesson. The number from each home, whose duty it would be to attend, and the manner the lesson is recited reveals the real interest of the home in the sunday-School work.

Parents should not only appreciate the duty devolving upon them of not only taking the household to Sunday-School, but a still more important duty, that of all the household remaining to the preaching service. If any one of the home is to be excused from either service let it be from the Sunday-School, important as it is, rather than the preaching service. Nothing should be allowed to rival or take the place, with adult or child, of the preaching of the blessed gospel of Christ. The Sunday-School should be not only a means of adding to the congregation, but the source from whence most of her membership should come. We call attention to the fact that the school population of our country in 1897 consisted of 21,082,472 persons. The number

in our Sunday-Schools is 12,288,153, says an eminent statistician; this shows the Sunday-Schools to be falling behind in comparison with the secular schools. It is further stated that while the secular schools show an advance, the Sunday-School is bearly holding its own. Comment is unnecessary. After a practical test of the helps and literature of the Sunday-School Board at Nashville, under the efficient management of Rev. J. M. Frost, we cordially commend it to our schools. Let us pray for, and labor in, our Sunday-Schools.

Report of special committee on I. P. Shelby's Fund read and the same received, and the Committee continued to carry out the sentiment set out in said report.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON I. P. SHELBY'S WILL.

This committee was appointed by a resolution passed at the

last meeting of this Association and was granted full power in relation to the devise contained in the will of the late I. P. Shelby. That will set apart a tract of farm, 9 to 11 acres, fronting on the Lexington & Richmond Turnpike road, about ten miles from the city of Lexington, and also a fund of \$2,000 to be devoted to the use and construction of a Baptist church; all said property to be retained in the hands of his Executor for the period of five years, and to be used to the best advantage, and at the end of that time the property and its accumulations to be turned over by the Executor to the trustees of a Baptist church to be located and built on said land, the trustees to be appointed by this Association.

The occasion for the appointment of the committee arose from the doubt entertained by many of the best advised persons, whether it would be wise to establish a church at that place. would be nearly equally distant from our churches at East Hickman and Athens, and it was believed that it would be at best but a weak congregation itself, and would materially weaken and impair the usefulness of the two other congregations already established. So far as the committee were able to forecast the future, they were unanimously of the opinion that it would not be wise to establish this church at the place designated, and that it would be a source of weakness rather than a support to the Baptist cause in that neighborhood. Therefore after conferring with the relatives of the testator, they agreed to accept on behalf of this Association the sum of Fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500), to be applied to the purchase or construction of a Parsonage for East Hickman church, (of which church our Bro. Shelby was long a devoted and beloved member) to be known as the Shelby Parsonage; and in consideration of this \$1,500 that this Association in behalf of the denomination would relinquish all its claims upon the remainder of the devise. This agreement was reached some months ago, but cannot be fully effectuated without a judicial approval. Mr. John T Shelby, in behalf of the Executor and relatives, has undertaken to prepare the papers for that purpose, but it has not thus far been done. The committee asks from the Association the approval of its action, and that the same or some other committee be continued to effectuate the agreement.

EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT.

At a meeting of the Executive Board of the Elkhorn Association, of July 11, 1898, the chairman appointed W. D. Bryant, I. R. Howard and F. P. Jenkins, in the order named, to formulate a report to be presented to the Association at her present session. We report as follows: On Monday, September 13, 1897, the Board met and organized by electing J. W. Appleton chairman and F. P. Jenkins Secretary and Treasurer. Since our last report we have tried to guard and aid the interest of our denomination and churches in our Associational bounds as follows. We have aided the Corinth church in the support of T. J. We aided them for seven months at the rate of \$100 per year, \$58.34. all your board has expended for pastoral support at the churches named \$300. The several churches have contributed through our board, for various missions \$2,248.28. A gain over last year of \$146.16. Distributed as follows:
