## RULES OF ORDER:

1. The Moderator and Clerk shail be chosen annually, by ballot ammediately after reading the letters and credentials; those of the former year continuing in office until the choice is made.
2. "Kerfoot's Parliamentary Practice" shall be the standard of rules by which the deliberations of the Association shall be governed.
3. The Clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings, taking care of the books and papers belonging to the Association, and furnish a copy of the Minutes of its transactions at eash session for publication and distribution among the churches.
4. At every sitting, business shall be opened and closed with prayer by the Moderator, or whomsoever he may request.
5. Corresponding members and ministers invited to a seat with the Association may debate, but shall not vote on any subject before it.
6. No member of the Association shall absent himself without leave of the Moderator.
7. No person shall speak more than once on any motion, until all others wishing to speak have spoken, unless by permission of the Association.
8. Arrangements for the next Association shall not be attended to on the first day of the session.
9. When two or more churches apply for the Association to be held with them, the one applying which has been the longest without it shall be entitled to it.
10. The Roll of Messengers shall be read the second and third days of the Association, and any Messenger known to have been present during the session shall be counted as present.
11. The basis of representation from the churches shall be two Messengers from each church, and an additional one for fifty members, and one for every fraction over twenty-and no one shall be eligible to a seat who is not a member of the church sending him.
12. The Minutes shall be leisurely read and corrected, if necessary, before the rising of the Association.
13. These rules shall be distinctly read by the Clerk immediately after the organization of the Association.

## PROCEEDINGS

OF THF

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The Elkhorn Baptist Association met with the Glenn's Creek Paptist Church, Woodford county, Ky., on its One Hundred and Fifteenth Anniversary on Tuesday, the 14th day of August, 1900, and was promptly called to order at 10 o'clock a. m., by J. R. Howard, the Moderator.

The congregation joined in singing that grand old hymn, "Come 'I'hou Fount of Every Blessing," and at its conclusion Bro. A. F. Baker read a part of the 34th Psalm, when prayers were offered by Brethren W. H. Felix, Z. T. Cody and A. F. Baker.

Bro. B. H. Dement, who had been appointed to preach the Introductory Sermon being absent, Brethren T. Warn Beagle and F. W. Eberhardt were appointed by the Moderator to nominate some one to perform that duty, who reported at once the name of Bro. Preston Blake, of Lexington, which nomination was confirmed by a unanimous vote.

The Letters from the Churches composing this body were then called for and read by Brethren H. W. Coleman and F. W. Eberhardt, when it was learned that all the twenty-nine churches had responded hy letter and messengers, except Clear Creek.

The letters in many things gave encouraging reports, showing an advancement along all lines of Christian work, and an increased effort to better support and maintain the various missions aided and fostered by the Association.

At the conclusion of the reading of letters and reports from the churches, Bro. Preston Blake, who had been chosen for that purpose, after song and prayer, preached the Annual Sermon, taking for his text the entire last chapter of John, from which he developed in a forceful manner, the "Qualifications for Christian Service." Brethren Lister Witherspoon and E. B. Allender were appointed "Tellers" to take the vote for Moderator and Cleriz for the ensuing year, at the assembling of the Association at the afternoon session, and report the result.

Bro. T. T. Eaton being present spoke in the interest of the Western Recorder, and Bro. J. E. Gwatkin represented the Baptist Argus. And then the Association adjourned until 2 o'clock $p$. m.

## Tuesday-Afternoon Session.

At 2 o'clock $p$. m. the Moderator rapped for order, and the great congregation joined in singing "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name," and devotional exercises were conducted by Bro. W. D. Nowlin.

Brethren Witherspoon and Allender, appointed Tellers to report the vote for Moderator and Clerk, announced that J. R. Howard was unanimously elected Moderator, and R. H. Gray Clerk, tor the ensuing year.

Brethren J. V. Riley, Malcolm Thompson and John G. Edwards were appointed by the Chair a Committee on "Order of Business."

The following Visiting Brethren were recognized and invited to seats: Bro T. T. Eaton, of the Western Recorder; J. E. Gwatkin, of the Baptist Argus; S. F. Thompson. employed by the State Board, on Mission work in the mountans of Kentucky; H. H. Hibbs, of Williamsburg Coliege; E. S. Alderman, President of the Bethel College; Miss Mary Hollingsworth, of the Orphan's Home, Lnuisville; H. W. Virgin, B. A. Copas, A. J. Copas, J. W. Smith, Mrs. M. E. Karsner, J. S. Morris, A. F. Baker, S. E. Whipkey, and W. W. Hamilton, of Louisville.

## Home Missions.

The Board that has charge of the Home Mission work of the Southrn Baptist Convention, of which Elkhorn Association is a part, is loated at Atlanta, Ga. July 2, 1899, Dr. F. H. Kerfoot was eleced Coresponding secretary. We all know the force and efficiency given to uny enterprise by making Dr. Kerfoot a prominent factor in it. The serations of this Board cover a vast territory. The Board has many lifficulties to overcome, and jet the work has progressed wonderfully und its prospects for greater usefulness in the future are growing brighter every year.

Ihe report to the last meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention shows the following statistics: Funds collected $\$ 79,366.68$. Number of Missionaries 671. Churches and Stations 2,168. Baptisms 5,696.

The number of stations being occupied, the number of churches organized, the number of church houses built, the amount of money contributed and the number of Missionaries at work, are all increasing rapidly with every indication of more efficiency and usefulness in the Master's vineyard.

Hence we can appeal to our people every where for more liberal contributions to this Board, with the full assurance that it will be judiciously expended where it will produce the best results.

Particularly noticeable is the desire to beautify and remodel the meeting houses. Some are building new houses of worship We heartlly approve of this and commend the brethren and sisters for their labors in this direction. May God's richest biessings and choicest benedictions rest upon you all, and may the present year be one characterized by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit in our hearts and lives

The Circular Letter being called for was read by Bro. E. F. Wright, who made remarks upon the same. Which letter was adiopted and ordered printed.

## Circular Letter.

The history of our Association extends back fifteen years into the past sentury. We have been long in the school of experience, age brings many advantages. The territory included in this Association is unsurpassed. The members of Baptist churches have a fair share of this world's goods, and when compared with other sections of our country are enjoying marked prosperity. We are persuaded that all of us are anxious for the furtherance of the gospel everywhere and that we are willing to lay upon God's altar, our prayers, our time, our talents and money. The pulpits in our Association are well manned, our church buildings are ample and comfortable. Ability is the measure of responsibility. Is this splendid array of material and spiritual force counting for all it should?

The Centennial of Missions appeals to us with peculiar emphasis. Review the past, survey the future, equip for service. Let none of our churches be left out. We suggest a plan: Let seven churches arrange with seven competent Brethren who will come and present separate phases of Missions. The seven churches thus form a circuit an:l arrange the appointments of the Brethren so as to give each church a Mission Week.

We have not entered in and possessed all of this fruitful God-given land here in our midst. Some how an increasingly large mass of peo. ple is unreached. The poor are in the land and not always in our churches. It was once the glory of the gospel that it was preached to the poor. In every school house, at every cross-roads a congregation can be gathered, many of whom never enter our churches. Brethren extend arms of the churches; establish preaching stations, organize Sunday Schcols and by all means save some. The obligation can not be evaded.

Unon the sovereign churehes and individual pastors we lay these duties in the name of our Master. His own divine mission announced at Nazareth may be our guide at home. Our commission received just before His ascension, is the limit of obligation abroad.

The hour for the consideration of Foreign Missions having arrived Pro. Z. T. Cody, the Chairman, read the report of the committee, which was ably discussed by him and Brethren Preston Blake, T. T. Eaton, E. F. Wright and J. S. Sowers. The Brethren spoke earnestly and tenderly on this great subject, and especially so concerning the situation of our brethren in China, who have been bravely looking into the very face of death, and Bro. F. W. Eberhardt was invited to lead in a prayer for the protection of our missionaries who are exposed to all the passions and misfortunes of war, occasioned by the Boxers in China. Then the report was adopted.

## Foreign Missions.

At Louisville, in 1899, the Southern Baptist Convention asked for an increase of 25 per cent. in our contributions. This increase was made. The Foreign Mission Board reported at Hot Springs that the gifts of the churches reached $\$ 140,102.30$. Against $\$ 109,267.43$ for 1898-99.

The cost of collecting and distributing this amount was 13 2-7 cents on the dollar; but only $85-7$ cents to the dollar is the amount that the Richmond office costs. The balance, about $41-2$ cents to the dollar, is what certain States charge the Board for their services. Eighty-seven cents out of every dollar contributed gets to the foreign field. In this cost is included the salaries of our Secretaries, and there are no missionaries under our employ who do a more valuable missionary work for the churches than these Secretaries.

Kentucky gave $\$ 15,825.15$; against $\$ 12,128.45$ for the previous year. We stand third in the list, surpassed only by Virginia and Georgia.

We can not speak too thankfully of the work of our noble women. Through the Woman's Missionary Union of Baltimore, Md., they have contributed beyond their proportion to the success of this year's work. They have turned over to the Foreign Board $\$ 31$, ,757.65.

We rejoice that our Board has closed three successive years without debt. The report of Dr. Willingham says: "A large number of churches have increased their gifts so that they now give enough or more than enough, to pay the salary of one missionary. In several instances also there are brethren and sisters who are giving enough to pay the salary of a missionary." We are glad to note that Kentucky furnishes a fair proportion of these churches which have made large advances in contributions.

But the most inspiring item in the last Report of the Board is this: "Last year we reported 845 baptisms-the largest number in the history of our work. This year we report 1,341 . Thus we see that while we resolved to increase the work 25 per cent the Lord honored our purpose of heart, and increased the results in the foreign fields over 50 per cent. To get an idea of the wonderful blessings of the past few years let us remember that in 1896, after over fifty years of work, we had in foreign lands a living membership of 3,801 . In the past three years there have been added by baptism 2,887." The largest number of baptisms for this year is reported from our South China Mission and is 53o.

Here are some of the statistics from all of our fields:

Such are some of the results of their labors, but let us think of this sentence from Dr. Taylor, of Rome, Italy: "The statistical table gives the results of the years' work so far as figures can do it, but who shall tell of the labors and solicitudes, the joys and sorrows, fears and hopes of the workers, in the midst of discouragements, sicknesses, bereavement, poverty and persecution! These are known only to God. Are they not written in His Book?" Death has not visited our mission force this year.

Last year sixteen new missionaries were sent out to the various fields, perhaps the largest number that we have ever sent forth in one jear. But our missionaries and Secretaries are pleading for more laborers. Here is a statement from the report that should make us pause and pray; "We are in creat need of more men and women for foreign fields. For several years we have had our attention directed to the need of the means to carry forward the work. We now need the workers. We have not been praying the Lord as we should to send forth laborers into the harvest. We need at once from fifteen to twenty men and women for important points."

Our missionaries on the fields are carrying out the whole commission of our Lord, preaching, baptizing and teaching; and they are ever reaching forward to new fields, and establishing those enterprises that help in the furtherance of their great aim. Upon the fields of labor God has given us wise and consecrated laborers; and over the work here at bome there has been placed, as we believe in the providence of God, a Secretary, Dr. R. J. Willingham, that is indeed a servant of Jesus Christ.

The Southern Baptist Convention asks the churches to give this year $\$ 200,000$ to the Foreign Mission Work. The General Association in its recent session at Owensboro, recommended that Kentucky raise $\$: 5,000$ of this amount. Elkhorn's proportion, if we take the gifts of the Association for last year as a basis of recioning, is about $\$ 3,000$. And your committee would recommend that steps be taken to raise this amount in our Association for Foreign Missions this year.

In view of the fearful evils that lower over the Empire of China, your committee would also recommend that special prayer be offered in behalf of the missionaries and native converts in that unhappy and dustracted land. Z. F. CoDy, W. D. Bryant.

The report of the committee on State Missions being called for, Bro. W. H. Felix, the Chairman of said committee, asked and was granted further time, and the Centennal Committee haring filed no
written report, Bro. F. W. Eberhardt discussed the question, when on motion by Bro. Z. T. Cody, a committee composed of Brethren F. W. Eberhardt, Z. T. Cody, E. F. Wright, Preston Blake and George S. Scearce was appointed to co-operate with the General Association of Kentucky Baptists in furtherance of the Centennial Celebration.

Then the Association adjourned until Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock. Prayer by Bro. I. B. Timberlake.

## Wednesday Morning.

The Association met Wednesday morning, Bro. J. R. Howard, Moderator, in the chair.

Song and Scripture reading by Bro. Otis Hughson. Prayers were offered by Brethren S. F. Thompson and J. A. Norris. The devotional exercises closing with the singing by the large audience of the hymn, "Stand Up For Jesus."

The report on State Missions being again called for, Bro. W. H. Felix read the report, which after appropriate remarks by Brethren Felix, T. T. Eaton, H. H. Hibbs and S. E. Whipkey, was adopted.

## State Missions.

We rejoice to report that the statistics of our State Secretary show a decided advance in our State Mission work. Amount contributed to State Missions and colportage work last year wa; $\$ 7,673.27$. This does not include District Missions, which was $\$ 6,740.91$. Amount raised for church buildings, lots and improvements, $\$ 7,051.48$. Sermons preached, 3.443 ; conversions, 547 ; baptisms, 408 Value of Bibles, books and tracts given away, $\$ 48.35$.
'Ihis shows improvement over other years, yet we are not satisfied with our present attanments, especially in view of the fact that in Eastern Kentucky alone there are sixteen county scats without a Baptist church. Brethren the time has come for greatly enlarging our State work.

We heartily recommend our new State Secretary, Dr. J. G. Bow, and feel that under his efficient leadership we shall accomplish greater things for the Lord.

We also recommend that an effort be made to increase our contributions to State Missions.

We further recommend the raising of $\$ 10,000$ for a building fund, as recommended by the Executive Board and State Secretary.

'The report on Ministerial Aid was then read by Bro. I. B. Timberlake and elicited much interest, indicating that the dear old brethren, who from age and its consequent infirmities, have laid aside their working armour, will not and shall not be forgotten. A contribution was taken for the benefit of Bro. J. J. Edwards amounting to $\$ 22.79$, and added to the fnnd tor aged ministers, and so stated in the report to Bro. George H. Cox, agent for the Ministerial Aid Fund. After many pleasant words spoken by Brethren I. B. Timberlake, S. F. Thompson and T. J. Stevenson, the report was unanimously adopted

## Ministers' ${ }^{\text {Aid }}$.

Your committee on looking over the report of the General Associ. ation find that there are about twenty-five aged ministers who are de. pending on the Baptists of the State for their support.

These men of God are now old and dependent and destitute of the means of obtaining support. They should not only be cared for, but crowned with kindness and appreciation, for the work which they have done for the Baptists of Kentucky. Not to care for these men would be nothing less than a crime and a blot on the records of the Baptists of the State.

It is high time to stop resolving and go to doing something for these servants of the Lord Jesus Christ. One hundred and eighty thousand Baptists should not neglect to care for these helpless few.

Your committee most heartily trust and recommend that the churches in Elkhorn Association will lay this important matter to heart, and urge their members to larely contribute to this nuble object. We also endorse the movement to raise fifty thousand dollars for the construction of a home for aged and helpless Baptist ministers in Kentucky.

The old chureh at Mt. Frecdom now proposing to change its location to Wilmore, Ky., the Association commends said church to the churches composing the Association, as an object worthy Christian benevolence.

## Executive Board.

To the Eilhorn Association when convened with Glenn's Creek Church, Wocdford county, Ky., August 14 and 15, 1900 :

Dear Brethren:-Your Executive Board beg leave to report that it was regularly organized, by the election of J. W. Appleton, Chairman, and R. I. Gray, Secretary and Treasurer.

Since four last meeting the Board has held its recular monthly sessions at the First Bantist church, in Lexingion, Ky., and have prayerfully endeavored to perform the duties to which you have assigned them. We have striven to use the means committed to our trust at such points as it would accomplish the most good for the Master's cause. We have aided financially the following churohes: Corinth, on the C. S. Railroad, in Grant county, near the line of Sentt county, ard are glad to report that the brethren and friends have erected an excellent church building, the payment for which has all been guaranteed, and has since been collected, and is now out of debt. To this chureh we donated $\$ 75$.

Mt. Freedom, organized in 18:2, has taken on new life, and being now situated in a sparsely settled neighborhood, has determined to erect a now chmel building at the thriving city of Wilmore. We hare
supplemented the salary of Brethren George Green and G. W. Wheatley at that church by donating $\$ 75$.

One of our oldest churches, Clover Bottom, which was for years strurgling for existence, constituted in 1802, has during the past Association year, erected and paid for an excellent house in which to worship, and the Lord has greatly blessed them in adding eight persons to therr membership by experience and Baptism, and one by letter. We have supplemented the salary of its pastor by donating to them $\$ 100$.

At Sadieville, in Scott county, we have expended the sum of $\$ 75$ in aid of pastor's salary, where our brethren have no house of their own, but hope to rise and build in the near future.

We have thus expended of your means the sum of $\$ 325$, all of which was given in aid of pastor's salary. Respectfully submitted,

The report of the Committe on Orphans' Home, at Louisville, Ky., was read by Bro. W. D. Nowlin, aad a cash contribution was taken, amounting to $\$ 50$, and ordered pard to Miss Mary Hollingsworth as a part of the amount contributed by the churches composing the Association. Quite a number of the churches in addition, gave pledges of financial and to the "Home," and then the report was adopted.

## Orphans' Home.

The Baptist Orphans' Home, located in Louisville, is one of our greatest benevolent denominational institutions in the State and is doing a great work for God and humanity. It has about completed thir-ty-one years of its labors of love, under the faithful superintendency of our popular and devoted sister, Miss Mary A. Hollngsworth. The institution has a gradual growth under her fostering care from the beginning. There have been received into the Home 1,081 children, which make an average of nearly 35 a year.

The health of the institution is unusually good, and the training given the children in the Home is far superior to that given in many Christian Homes. We are glad to believe that the sense of responsibility to support this noble institution is gradually extending among our people.

Our charity is often misplaced, but here is a home for helpless children, who are the objects of the Father's special care, appealing to us for support. Fifteen churches report nothing for this object.

We urge that the Orphans' Home be given a fixed place in the schedule of collections of this Association and that each church composing this body make a contribution to the Home some time during the year.

velopment of the moral character as well as the intellectual attain. ments of the student. The report of the committee was approved.

## Schools and Colleges.

Georgeiown College, the oldest of our institutions, has had a good year, and it is the best endowed. It is located in a refined community in the heart of our Bluegrass region, on three lines of railroad. During the year 363 students, of both sexes, have been in attendance. The office of President remains vacant, Prof. Arthur Yager continuing to serve as Chairman of the Faculty. Prof. E. E. Ayres has proved a val. uable addition to the teaching force, and the Bible course under him has been of great advantage to the students. In all there are twen'y instructors. The chair of Greek has been vacated by the retirement of Prof. J. C. Harry, a most accomnlished scholar and teacher of rare efficiency. His place will be supplied by Prof. Granville Terrell, who is believed to have unusual qualifications for such a position.

Although this is the oldest of our Baptist institutions, there has been no leqal requirement that any of the trustees should be Baptists; the law simply requiring that they be elected by the Kentucky Baptist Educational Society, membership in which is secured by contrıbuting $\$ 100$ to the College. An amendment to the charter has now been secured by the committee which requires that at least three-fourths of the trustees shall be members of regular Baptist churches.

The college has had no representative in the field during the past year, Dr. W. B. Crumpton, after rendering valuable service, laying down this work and returning to Alabama. The Rev. S. H. Burgess is engaged to raise the proposed $\$ 50,000$ Woman's Endowment, which is greatly needed. The college also needs addition to its apparatus, hbrary and museum.

Southern Baptist Theological Seminary: While the Seminary of Louisville is not a hentucky institution, its location in our midst, and the facts that Kentucky has given it more money than all of the rest of the States put together, and that there are always more students from Kentucky than from any other State, مives us a larger interest in the institution than belongs to any other State.

This is the first year of the new President's (Dr. E. Y. Mullins') administration, and the Seminary has had a successful year. There were 256 students from 31 States and 5 fordign countries, 46 of them being from Kentucky.

At the beninning of the scholastic year the institution lost Dr. F. H. Kerfoot, who resigned his professorship to accept the Secretaryship of our Home Mission Boarl at Atianta. Though the number of the faculty was thus made one short, the work was divided out among them and all the courses were duly carried on. The recent election of Dr. George B. Eager, who has accepted a professorship, makes the Faculty full again.

With the endorsement, first, of the Executive Committee, and afterward of the Trustees, President Mullins has undertaken to add $\$ 900,000$ to the endowment of the Seminary, within five years, and, first of all, to secure a gruarantee fund of $\$: 5,000$, or $\$ 5,000$ a year, for
the annual currentexpense deficiency, until the proposed increase is made. About $\$ 10,000$ of this $\$ 25,000$ guarantee fund has been secured.

The services of Mr. B. Pressley Smith, of South Carolina, have been secured for the management of the Students' Fund and of New York Hall. The amount of aid given to each student aided is limited to $\$ 6$ per month, and no aid is given unless the student reaches the required standard and stands his examinations. This sum was some $\$ 1,500$ short at the end of the session, and the Trustees directed that efforts be made at the State and District meetings to pay this deficiency, and to provide for the next session's needs.

Your committee emphasize the importance of patronizing our denominate schools. The facilities offered in these schools are such that the poor as well as the rich may obtain an education of the highest order.

Resolutions on the subject of Temperance were read by Bro. J. J. Rucker, who explained the object of Interdenomnational Committee, in full, and said resolution was unanimously approved.

## Report on Temperance.

For years past the Temperance people have been trying to persuade men to abstain from the use of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes. At the same time they have asked for the legal suppression of the open saloon. In 1896 the Baptists of Kentucky, at their annual session in Bowling Green, espoused the legal side of the question and determined to appeal to the law for a redress of the wrongs growing out of the liquor traffic. Other Christian bodies joined us, and thus we formed the State Interdenominational Local Option Committee. The duty assirned to this committee was to secure the enactment of a sound Local Option Law. During the session of 1898 this committee appealed to the Legislature for the passage of the desired law, but the appeal availed nothing, because of the opposition of certain partisan leaders. In the fall of 1898 the committee effected an organization to take a part in the campaign for the election of another Legislature and State officers. You are all familiar with the result as to state officers. In the election of the Legislature, they were successful in changing the complexion of fifteen or twenty seats. Men who were opposed to the desired law in 1898 were left at home and those in favor of it, took their places. So that in the last Legislature there was a good working majority in both houses, thoroughly committed to the passage of the bill.

It was started in the senate and passed through all the preliminary stops and was within one day of being put upon its final passage, when that terrible tragedy, the assassination of Senator Goebel, occurred, that prevented all further legislation of a general character.

In view of the success of the State Committee in moulding public sentiment in favor of total abstinence for the individual, and for the legal suppression of the open saloon, we recommend the adoption of the following resolutions, passed by the General Association at its recent session in Owensboro :

1. That we heartily endorse the action of the Inter-tenomina-
tional Local Option Committee in the non-partisan attitude which they assumed and maintained in the prosecution of the work placed in their hands. We rejoice also in the marked progress made under the magnificent leadership of Dr. G. W. Young, Field Secretary.
2. That we urge the Committee, in the future as in the past, rigidly to adhere to the non-partisan attitude towards all political parties, and to appeal to Christian voters to support at the ballot-box, regardless of party relations, only such men as are known to be opposed to the onen saloon.
3. That we pledge ourselves, in connection with the other Chris. tian denominations, to give a hearty financial support to the state Committee that the Field Secretary may be kept constantly upon the platform agitating our cause, watching legislation, and pleading for the enforcement of proper regulative or prohibitive laws.

## Womans' Mission Work.

A very earnest, helpful meeting was conducted by Miss LeCompte on the second day of the Association. Hereafter we hope to hold the Woman's meeting on the flrst day.

The meeting was opened by the song "All Hail The Power of Jesus Name," after which we were led in prayer by Mrs. McGlothlin. The address of welcome by Miss Edwards, was responded to by Mrs. Blackburn, of Woodlake. The Scripture reading by Mrs. Sowers, of Mt. Vernon, was followed by our Vice-President's address, in which she so earnestly pleaded for greater giving, greater spirituality, greater perseverance, and a greater sense of personal responsibility for the advancement of the work. She also urged upon us the need for more prayer, both public and private, and urged us never to refuse to respond, if only with a sentence or two, that we may learn to pray with each other. She then asked for a chain of prayer which was responded to by quite a number. Miss LeCompte returns to the Vice-Presidency after an absence of one year, in which Mrs. Dement served. On her remoral from the bounds of the Association, Miss LeCompte consented to again take up the work, and was welcomed to her old place. She then gave us a synopsis of the work for the past ten years, which was especially interesting, showing as it did a steady and healthful growth along all lines.

Reports for 1891,1892 and 1896 were missing. The number of Societies has increased from six in 1890, to twenty-two, with an averare increase of over one hundred dollars each year in giving.

Training School in Chicacro, owned by the Northern and Southern Boards jointly. This school was founded nineteen years ago by twen-ty-three Christian workers who met for conference, realizing the crying need for such an institution. It is supported by voluntary contributions. It has sent forth 149 workers among 13 nationalities in the United States. Mrs. Steinmet is laboring in Georgetown where her husband is studying for the ministry; both hoping to be missionaries.

The meeting was closed with prayer by Mrs. Dudley, of George ${ }^{-}$ town. Mrs. Preston Blake, Secretary, Pro tem.

And thus closed one of the most harmonious and prosperous meetings of the Association. The sacred old hymn "Blest Be The Tie That Binds," was sung, the brethren giving each other the old-time handshake.
