### RULES OF ORDER.

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- 1. The Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen annually, by ballot, immediately after reading the letters and credentials; those of the former year continuing in office until the choice is made.
- 2. "Kerfoot's Parliamentary Practice" shall be the standard of rules by which the deliberations of the Association shall be governed.
- 3. The Clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings, taking care of the books and papers belonging to the Association, and furnish a copy of the Minutes of its transactions at each session for publication and distribution among the churches.
- 4. At every sitting, business shall be opened and closed with prayer by the Moderator, or whomsoever he may request.
- 5. Corresponding members and ministers invited to a seat with the Association may debate, but shall not vote on any subject before it.
- 6. No member of the Association shall absent himself without leave of the Moderator.
- 7. No person shall speak more than once on any motion, until all others wishing to speak have spoken, unless by permission of the Association.
- 8. Arrangements for the next Association shall not be attended to on the first day of the session.
- 9. When two or more churches apply for the Association to be held with them, the one applying which has been the longest without it shall be entitled to it.
- 10. The Roll of Messengers shall be read the second and third days of the Association, and any Messenger known to have been present during the session shall be counted as present.
- 11. The basis of representation from the churches shall be two Messengers from each church, and an additional one for fifty members, and one for every fraction over twenty—and no one shall be eligible to a seat who is not a member of the church sending him.
- 12. The Minutes shall be leisurely read and corrected, if necessary, before the rising of the Association.
- 13. These rules shall be distinctly read by the Clerk immediately after the organization of the Association.

### @Elkhorn Baptist Association.

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The Elkhorn Baptist Association met in its One Hundred and Sixteenth Annual Session with the Long Lick Baptist church, Scott county, Ky., August 13, 1901, and was called to order at 10 o'clock by the Moderator, Bro. J. R. Howard. All joined in singing the grand hymn "How Firm a Foundation." When Bro. J. W. Waldrop, of Owen county, read the Scripture beginning at the 17th verse of 20th chapter of Acts; after which Bro. Edmond Harrison, of Hopkinsville, led in prayer. The congregation united in singing "Stand Up, Stand Up For Jesus," and Bro. J. V. Riley, of Owenton, Ky., led in prayer; then "All Hail The Power of Jesus' Name" was sung.

### Afternoon Session.

Association called to order at 2 o'clock. After song service, devotional exercises were conducted by Bro. S. A. Owen reading the 26th Psalm, after which prayers were offered by Brethren W. D. Nowlin, W. H. Felix and I. B. Timberlake.

Report on Home Missions read by Bro. J. J. Rucker and discussed by Bro. J. J. Rucker and Bro. J. G. Bow, after which the report was adopted.

Report on Home Missions.

Home Missions is one of the leading features of the work of the Southern Baptist Convention. The Board, having control of the work, is located in Atlanta, Ga. This Board and the denomination at large suffered a great loss, during the last year, by the death of its Secretary, Dr. F. H. Kerfoot. Dr. Kerfoot's great worth 1s too well known throughout the south to need any eulogy at my hands in this report.

The work of the Home Board is directed principally to our South-

The work of the Home Board is directed principally to our Southwestern Territories, Western T. xas the mountain countries extending from the Missis-ippi river, through Tennessee, Northern Georgia, Northern Alabama, North Carolina, Southern Kentucky and Virginia. In addition to the above they have also the care for the missionary work of the Island of Cuba, the colored population of the south and the foreign population gathered in our large cities.

The magnitude of the work should stimulate every Southern Baptist to a renewed consecration to the cause of Missions and to liberal contributions to the work of this Board. I hereto annex the statistics of the Board as published in the minutes of the Southern Baptist Convention:

Report of Committee on Foreign Missions was read by Bro. Preston Blake.

### Report on Foreign Missions.

We rejoice to note the continued progress in our Foreign Mission work. Two years ago when the Convention met at Louisville, it was ordered that the missionary force be increased 25 per cent. This meant a large increase in our expenditures, but the order was carried out, and at the end of the year, the contributions had increased from \$109,167.43 to \$140,102.30, an increase large enough to meet the additional expense. Again the order was given to advance, and in response to this order, twenty-one new missionaries were appointed, and the contributions increased to \$156,083.33. The largest amount ever contributed by our people to Foreign Missions. Thus the Board has been able to meet its increasing financial obligations, and to close each year without a cent of debt. During those two years of advance, some important new stations have been opened, and old ones greatly strengthened; new churches have been formed; training schools have been organized for the purpose of preparing the native preachers and teachers for intelligent service, and publishing houses established.

We rejoice also to note that during the troubles in China our missionaries acted with commendable discretion, and Christian fortitude, and that the native Christians, amid the spoiling of their goods, and great peril of life, with very few exceptions, remained loyal to Christ. In spite of the troubles in China, which forced our missionaries there to leave their stations there for several months, there were 1,009 baptisms on the Foreign field. For all these things we thank God and

take courage.

But as the work enlarges the needs likewise increase. We need more missionaries. From many fields comes the urgent appeal for more men. Some years ago more men were applying for appointment to the Foreign field than the Board was able to send, but now they are calling for men to go. May the "Lord of the harvest" send forth the laborers into the needy fields. Again we need more money. While many of our churches are responding liberally to the call, yet statistics reveal the fact that large numbers of churches in the South are contributing nothing to this work. In every District Association earnest effort ought to be made to reach these non-contributing churches, and persuade them to enter into this work.

At the last meeting of the General Association of Kentucky, a recommendation was adopted asking Kentucky to raise \$20,000 this year for Foreign Missions. This means an increase over last year of nearly \$6,000. We recommend that Elkhorn Association endeavor to raise her part of this increase, and that earnest prayer be made to God in behalf of this work, that the hearts of our people be enlarged and thoroughly enlisted in the great work of world-wide evangeliza-

tion.

Bro. E. F. Wright read report of the committee on State Missions. Bro. J. G. Bow spoke to both State and Foreign Missions, giving synopsis of the work done and asking the Brethren of Elkhorn Association for their prayers and financial help for all the Boards to be increased.

State Missions.

To take and to hold Kentucky for Christ is a duty and privilege especially committed to and enjoyed by us as Baptists. The fathers, at untold disadvantage, planted these churches here in this fair land. With this vantage ground let us prove ourselves worthy of them and our common mission. Nineteen hundred years have passed since we were commanded to tell the good news to every creature, more than one hundred years has Elkhorn Association been laboring to this end, (and right nobly has she wrought,) yet in one section of our own Ken-

tucky there are sixteen county seats without Baptist churches, while in country, town and city there are multitudes unreached by the gos-

pel.

We are glad and grateful that so much has been done. We appreciate the efficient labors of our Secretary. We sympathize with him as he undertakes, with the help of God and the brethren, the immense task before him. We pledge to him our prayers and our gifts.

The receipts last year for State Missions were about \$7,200, and with this, eighty-one missionaries and colporters have been kept in the field for all or part of their time. Results in baptisms, church building and local support are encouraging. Other departments of the work committed to the Board have been conducted with success.

Dr. Bow asks Kentucky this year for \$10,000 for State Missions and additional contributions for Sunday School colportage and church building. Last year Elkhorn gave \$837.50 to State Missions and one-half of this was used in this Association. Brethren let us give our Secretary \$1,000 for his work this year in addition to the funds used in this Association.

### Circular Letter.

As we listened to the speeches and took some humble part in these celebrations, we wonder if the standard of piety and of loyalty to the great head of the church which we have set for the 20th century is as high as it

should be.

The hopeful indication that is to be seen on the horizon of our future as a denomination is that we are approaching one of the greatest revivals in the world's history, namely, a revival in the church—a

deeper work of grace in the hearts of God's people.

Let us pray earnestly and work faithfully fellow pastors to bring this about, then and not till then will the problem be solved which has confronted Southern Baptists for years in the past and still confronts them, namely, how to elicit, combine and direct this great Brotherhood, so as to bring greater glory to God.

We feel that the increased opportunity in the past two years, to

We feel that the increased opportunity in the past two years, to send the gospel to foreign lands, has brought with it corresponding obligations. God our Father knows whether we have met and dis-

charged our duty in this matter as we should.

Brethren we can do more for Missions than we have done. God pours from full vessels, not empty ones. May we at home be filled with the Spirit of the Master, and of Missions for His service.

In conclusion we maintain that the greatest need of our Association is that the individual churches and pastors be filled with the true spirit of Missions which includes,

(1)—A love for lost souls.

(2)—A spirit of self-denial to have them redeemed. May this spirit possess us entirely. Respectfully submitted,

Dear Brethren:-Your Executive Board met at the First Baptist church, Lexington, Ky., on the second Monday in September, 19.0, and was duly organized by the election of Brother J. W. Appleton, Chairman, and R. H. Gray, Secretary and Treasurer. Since which date your Board has met regularly on the 2d Monday in each month, and at nearly every meeting there has been a full attendance of its members, and at many of its sittings we have been encouraged by the presence of the pastors of the city of Lexington, and the pastors of some of our country churches. After prayerfully inquiring into the wants of our weaker churches, we have thought it best to extend aid to the church at Corinth until she is able to maintain regular preaching, and have sent to labor among them Bro. H. H. Steinmetz, who reports from time work, and that the congregations are becoming larger. He seems greatly interested in his work, and we hope ere long to hear that fraternal love prevails, and that the Lord is doing great things for the brethren at Corinth. We have expended at that point the sum of \$70.

Rules suspended and refort on Sunday Schools taken up; read by Bro. R. H. Gray and adopted.

### Report on Sunday Schools.

In the Southern Baptist Convention there are 19,558 churches, with 1,657,996 members, and 10,115 Sunday Schools, with 670,569 pupils. Kentucky has 1,615 Baptist churches with a membership of 183,181, but in these churches there are only 777 Sunday Schools, with 48,289 pupils. Last year there were 9,096 baptisms, and 1,875 of these were from the Sunday Schools. Elkhorn Association with a membersaip of 5,569 in 29 churches, three of which report no Sunday Schools, has 30 Sunday Schools with 2,448 pupils. And last year out of 278 baptisms 64 were from the Sunday Schools.

The Sunday School work of the State Board is in connection with its general missionary operations and is known as the Sunday School and Colportage Work. \$2.245.12 were received for this cause during the preceding year; 16 missionaries are designated as employed by this fund; 38 Sunday Schools have been organized within the last year; \$1,550.10 worth of Bibles, books, and tracts were sold and given away; and there are in all 86 Sunday Schools, with 5,474 pupils, under the supervision of the missionaries.

We would call special attention to the work of our Sunday School Board, located at Nashville, Tenn.; and to the remarkable success it has achieved. It is proving itself to be one of the greatest agencies for good that Baptists have ever established. With April 30, 1901, it closed its first decade. Its receipts have grown from \$19,574.83 in 1892 to \$78,380.97 in 1901. During these ten years it has given to denominational work in cash, Bibles, books, tracts, etc., \$106,619.94. Its benevolent appropriations for the last year aggregated \$16,288.52.

To this Board has been committed the Bible work of the Southern Baptist Convention. The report at New Orleans says: "The Board made appropriations in Bibles, Testaments and other portions of Scripture last year, 18.481 copies, with a money value of \$3,964.80; and this year 31,554 copies, with a money value of \$5,016.31." Their Scriptures have gone into the destitute homes of the South, and have been distributed among foreigners on our own shores and in other lands. For this Bible distribution the Board receives contributions from the churches; and we most earnestly ask our churches to co-operate in this work and to make their contributions for Bible distribution to our own Board.

The Board is also doing the Baptists of the whole country a noble service in the publication and distribution of the best denominational literature; and is cestined, we believe and hope, to become what the Baptists of the South have so long needed, a great publishing house.

But the chief work of the Board is that which it was especially organized for, the publication of our Sunday-School literature. We give a list of its periodicals with prices:

Report of Committee on Schools and Colleges read by Bro. W. D. Nowlin. Discussed by Bros. B. D. Gray, W. D. Nowlin and Edmond Harrison, of Hopkinsville, Ky., and adopted.

### Schools and Colleges.

Brethren, we are glad to report that the Baptists of Kentucky have a large number of schools and greater facilities for educational work than ever before.

We have in the State of Kentucky at present sixteen Baptist schools, namely:—Georgetown College, Bethel College, Bethel Female College, Clinton College, Liberty College, Williamsburg Institute, Bardstown Institute, Lynnland Institute, Ohno Valley College, Larimer Baptist College, Mamre Baptist College, Shelbyville College, Laurel Baptist Seminary, Barbourville College, Theodore Harris Institute and the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary.

### GEORGETOWN COLLEGE.

As Georgetown College is located within our bounds, we wish to call special attention to her work, facilities and needs.

After three years waiting this, our oldest institution, has secured

a President in the person of Dr. B. D. Gray, who has entered upon his work under the most favorable auspices. During the interim Frof. Arthur Yager has rendered most valuable services as Chairman of the Faculty, and the College has done fine work under his administration. Dr. Gray was duly inaugurated at the recent commencement, where the largest number of students were graduated ever known at a single commencement in the long history of the institution, viz., 30. During the year there were 345 students, of both sexes, in attendance. The College was bereaved during the session by the death of Miss Rowena Pollard, but it was very fortunate in securing the services of Mrs. Vineyard, of Nicholasville, for the position thus made vacant. During the year the College has had no agent in the field, except that the Rev. H. S. Burgess, by a special arrangement, has been looking after increasing the endowment for a part of the year. There are good prospects of an increase in the endowment The Trustees are elected by the Kentucky Baptist Educational Society.

This, our oldest and best endowed College, located in the heart of the Blue Grass region, on three lines of railroad, and now under the administration of a President who is believed to have been called of God to this service, faces the new century with brightest prospects.

SOUTHERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

While this school of the prophets is not distinctively a Kentucky institution, other States being interested, yet Kentucky has more interest in it than other States, because of its location at Louisville, because Kentucky has given a great deal more money to it than has any other State, and has furnished more students.

President Mullins has successfully closed the second year of his administration. There has been a marked increase in the proportion of students who have had the advantage of college training, the number last year being 211, out of a total enrollment of 231. There are seven Professors, besides instructors. The courses have been extended and the standard raised: Mr. B. Pressley Smith still has control of the New York Hall, and of the Students' Aid Fund, which he has successfully managed.

Dr. Mullins succeeded in adding some \$30,000 to the tunds of the Seminary, and will prosecute the work, hoping ere long to complete the additional \$200,000 needed. The property of the Seminary, real estate and all, aggregates in value \$850,000. But some of this is unproductive, and there has been a lowering of the rate of interest, which, in addition to the need for enlargement, has rendered additional endowment necessary.

Prof. McGlothlin, who occupies the chair of Church History, is now pursuing special studies abroad on a leave of absence. He will

probably return about the 1st of March next.

The Bantists of Kentucky have great facilities and opportunities for educational work. All our schools, however, need to be strengthened, and large additions should be made to their equipments and en-We hope the early years of the new century will see this dowments. advance made.

Your committee emphasizes the importance of patronizing our denominational schools. The facilities offered in these schools are such that the poor as well as the rich may obtain an education of the high-Respectfully submitted, WM. D. Nowlin, Chairman. est order.

Report on Orphan's Home made by Bro. S. A. Owen. After which Bro. G. W. Argabrite made a plea for the orphans and took up a collection which amounted to over two hundred dollars, in cash and pledges, being one of the largest collections ever taken for this cause in the Association.

Orphan's Home.

The Baptist Orphan's Home at Louisville, deserves our highest consideration and commendation, and should merit our most hearty support. It is conducted under the able and efficient management of our beloved sister, Miss Mary A. Hollingsworth. This institution stands as a proud monument of the generosity of Kentucky Baptists. And next to the church of God, it should occupy a place in every Baptist heart. Its object is to care for poor and destitue orphans of Baptist families. During the past year one hundred and fifteen helpless children have been cared for. The health of the Home has been good and its management unsurpassed. The report of the last Association shows that fifteen churches contributed nothing for this purpose. Your committee, therefore, would urge each church to largely contribute to this worthy and much beloved institution. And remember that Christ said, "In as much as ye have done it unto the least of these, ye have done it unto me."

Report of Committee on Co-operation in the Centennial Celebration, read by Bro. E. F. Wright and adopted.

### Centennial Celebration.

Your committee appointed one year ago has lost two of its number, Bro. Eberhardt, by removal to Missouri, and Bro. George S. Scearce by death. The former gave us the benefit of work done by him up to his leaving last fall, and the lamented Scearce was permitted to render real service to the committee and brethren before his call to rest.

It was thought best to conduct work along two special lines.

1. The holding of century meetings in our churches. Such meetings have been held, directly under the auspices of your committee, at Midway, Mt. Vernon, Great Crossings and Dry Run. Similar work

has been done in other churches by the pastors and brethren.

2. The distribution of denominational literature. In this we have had the co-operation of the Sunday School Board and the result is most gratifying. We have received from Dr. Frost and placed in the homes of our people; 262 copies of "Baptist Why, and Why Not?"; 106 Bibles and 525 sets of Centennial tracts of 12 each. The money value of this literature at wholesale rates is \$342.60. All of it has been sold without one cent of profit or expense to any one (exception is made in the tracts handled, some of these were given away by the generous liberality of the S. S. Board.) The twelve tracts selected were written especially for this work by Brethren Burrows, Carroll, Gambrell, Ford, Felix, Millard, Mullins, Landrum, Dill, Eager, Eaton and Gardner. The total number of pages tracts distributed is 125,760, which is 46,489 more pages than all the tracts used and reported by the missionaries and colporters of our State Board last year.

We appreciate the help which brethren have rendered. Special mention should be made of the S. S. Board, and the committees on this work at Great Crossings, Stamping Ground. Georgetown, Midway and

Providence.

Report of Committee on Obituaries read by Bro. W. D. Nowlin and after some appropriate and feeling remarks by Bro. Nowlin was adopted.

Obituary.

This Association has lost by death within the last year, two of its pastors. The Rev. H. G. Ferguson, who died in Midway, Dec. 25, 1900, and the Rev. George S. Scearce, who died at his home in Versailles, April 24, 1901. Also Dr. F. H. Kerfoot, Corresponding Secretary of the Home Mission Board, who for a number of years was a pastor in

this Association, died at his home in Atlanta, Ga., on June 22, 1901. 

A vote of thanks was extended to the membership of this church for the generous manner in which they entertained the Association.

Report of the committee on Temperance read by Bro. J. J. Rucker and adopted.

### Temperance.

Temperance, at the present time, means opposition to the legalized liquor traffic. The organizations most active in their opposition to the liquor traffic are, The Prohibition Party, The National Temperance Society and Publication House, headquarters in New York, The Anti-Saloon League, now organized in thirty-six States, The Woman's Christian Temperance Union, that has belted the World with its White Ribbon, The Local Option Movement, The Good Templars, and many other smaller bodies.

These forces are moving steadily towards the desired end. Public sentiment is gradually yielding, as shown by advances made every year. The last national victory gained was the banishment of the saloon from the United States army by act of Congress, which is now in force. Secretary Long had previously suppressed the traffic in the Navy.

The next national issue to be taken up is, to prevail upon Congress to so modify the Internal Revenue laws that no tax receipt, for the sale of intoxicating drinks, shall be issued in territory where such sales are prohibited by State or municipal laws.

The question in which we are most directly interested is, to secure from the Legislature some necessary amendments to our present State Local Option laws. To this end the leading denominations of Christians of the State united, several years ago, in the appointment of what is known as the Interdenominational Local Option Committee who, four years ago, engaged Dr. G. W. Young as Field Secretary, who spends all his time in the field creating public sentiment, looking after the desired legislation and the enforcement of law where local option is now in force. We ask the Elkhorn Association to adopt the following resolutions:

1. That we endorse the work of the State Local Option Committee

and pledge our moral and financial support.

2. That we urge every Christian voter in our State to make his ballot a subject of prayer and that he refuse to support any man for the legislature who will not declare himself on the right side of this J. J. RUCKER. question.

Report on Minister's Aid by Bro. J. J. Rucker, adopted.

### Minister's Aid.

This is an organization to which the churches of Elkhorn Association have been constant contributors since its organization, thirteen years ago. The outlook is now very encouraging as indicated by the last annual report of the Corresponding Secretary. Some large donations have been made to the permanent fund, the number of churches contributing is increasing and the methods of making the contributions are more systematic. Some of the Sunday Schools and Ladies' Aid Societies are remembering the aged ministers.

The Society has under its control two separate funds. The permanent endowment fund, only the interest of which may be used for current expenses; and the current funds contributed by the churches,

for the assistance of our present superanuated ministers.

During the past year one beneficiary died, at the age of seventy-three, having preached constantly for a period of about forty years. Six were received by the Board, making the number now looking to the Board for assistance twenty-nine. All our pastors and churches should note this fact and make regular and liberal contributions to the current fund, that the Board may have abundant funds to carry forward the work committed to their care.
