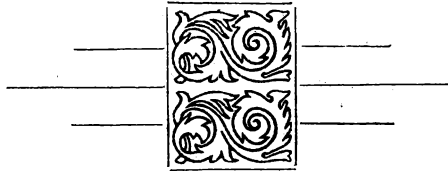

MINUTES

First Baptist Church

Lexington, Kentucky,

Sept. 4 and 5, 1912.

RULES OF ORDER.

1. The Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen annually, by ballot, immediately after reading the letters and credentials, those of the former year continuing in office until the choice is made.

2. "Kerfoot's Parliamentary Practice" shall be the standard of rules by which the deliberations of the Association shall be governed.

3. The Clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings, taking care of the books and papers belonging to the Association, and furnish a copy of the minutes of its transactions of each session for publication and distribution among the churches.

4. At every sitting business shall be opened and closed with prayer by the Moderator, or whomsoever he may request.

5. Corresponding members and ministers invited to a seat with the Association may debate, but shall not vote on any subject before it

6. No member of the Association shall absent himself without leave of the Moderator.

7. No person shall speak more than once on any motion, until all others wishing to speak have spoken, unless by permission of the Association.

8. Arrangements for the next Association shall not be attended to on the first day of the session.

9. When two or more churches apply for the Association to be held with them, the one applying which has been the longest without it shall be entitled to it

10. The Roll of Messengers shall be read the second day of the Association, and any Messenger known to have been present during the session shall be counted as present.

11. The basis of representation from the churches shall be two Messengers from each church, and an additional one for fifty members, and one for every fraction over twenty—and no one shall be eligible to a seat who is not a member of the church sending him.

12. The minutes shall be leisurely read and corrected, if necessary, before the rising of the Association.

13. These rules shall be distinctly read by the Clerk immediately after the organization of the Association.

The One Hundred and Twenty-Seventh session of the Elkhorn Baptist Association convened with the First Baptist Church of Lexington, Ky., Wednesday morning, September 4th, 1912. Moderator J. R. REPORT ON SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES.

Read by Dr. Arthur Yeager. Discussed by Dr. Yeager and Bro Swindler Adopted.

That the Baptists of Kentucky have long been interested in the subject of the proper education of their children, is attested by the fact that 83 years ago they founded at Georgetown a college which they have maintained ever since That this College was located within the bounds of Elkhorn Association, is a tribute to the influence and leadership of the old Association, in the councils of their brethren. And although this Association has been subdivided numbers of times, and dismissed scores of other churches to form other fraternities, it is still one of the largest and strongest Associations in the state of Kentucky.

This is no doubt partly due to the influence of Georgetown College, which has for more than 80 years been training the Preachers and the laymen of the

churches around it. And yet it is doubtful whether there are as many of our Baptist boys and girls from Elkhorn Association in Georgetown College now, as there were a quarter of a century ago, because of the fact that our Baptist people are not as loyal to their own schools, as they were in the past.

The growth of the state institutions—the comparatively small financial inducements which they offer, have proved too much for the loyalty of our people to their churches, or their appreciation of the value of the moral and religious training of their children.

Evidences multiply that there are large numbers of Baptists who do not care about the moral and religious influences that surround the school or college in which their children are educated.—Whether the school be pedo Baptist—Roman Catholic.

Non-religious, or irreligious, it makes no difference. The problem before us as Baptists, is to train our people every where that it does make a difference,—in fact that it is a matter of supreme importance that our children be educated in our own schools. The greatest and most pressing need of our modern life, is the elevation of our moral character of our people.

The supreme need of our churches is for intelligent and consecrated leaders, both men and women who are devoted to our Lord, and His church and who are capable and willing to serve in the up building of his Kingdom, through the local church.

These leaders among our people can never be secured through the training of our children in schools other than our own.

It is the plain duty of the churches of Elkhorn Association to set a good example to their sister churches of Kentucky, by loyal support of Georgetown College, which has so long stood within their bounds, and dispensed its helpful influences among them. The College is doing better work now, than ever before in its history,—and it is now more worthy of their loyal support than ever before—Its standards are higher,—its work more thorough and more generally recognized and its atmosphere more aggressively Christian, and more loyal to the faith of our Fathers, than perhaps ever before.

We recommend to our Pastors and to our people in every church, in the bounds of the Association, the prayerful, heart-searching consideration of their duty in this matter.

We also recommend, as one of the best ways of showing their interest in education, that every church renew its allegiance to the Baptist Educational Society of Kentucky, by making an offering every year to its support.

The Society has wrought well, and shown its capacity to solve our educational problems, if it can secure the united support of our churches in carrying out the wise plans which it has adopted.

REPORT ON MINISTERS' AID.

Read by Bro Lightfoot. Discussed by Dr. Maddox and Bro. Lightfoot. Adopted.

The old Arab priest, after giving his best years to the religious uplift of his people, is led out, in old age, to die in the arid deserts. The christian preacher's prayer to his God is--"Cast me not off when I am old; forsake me not when my strength faileth." Hence we who are abundantly able are commanded to "not withhold good from them to whom it is due, when it is in the power of thy hand to do it." So, because of conditions for which we as a denomination are responsible, there are many wornout preachers and their dependents, who need our care.

These aged preachers worked as hard as they knew how, while the people paid them as poorly as they could. These shepherds gave abundantly as leaders of the sheep. They had no bank accounts or invested money. Paralysis, disease and infirmities have crippled their usefulness; their tongues are now palsied; the people who knew them, know them no more.

The Baptist Ministers' Aid Society grew out of the above conditions. Of all the monies given by the Kentucky Baptists for their work one half is invested in a permanent fund unless it is designated until same reaches \$50,000, the other half is for immediate use. This wise provision ought to stimulate all to give liberally. Let us take heed that we forsake not these needy preachers as long as we live in Kentucky.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Read by Bro. Poole. Discussed by Bro. Powell and Dr. Sampey. Adopted.

We, your Committee on State Missions, beg leave to submit the following:

State Missions, we rejoice to note, is taking its rightful place with Southern Baptists as one of the greatest factors in conservation of a denominational spirit, and in the maintenance and extension of the kingdom of Christ.

Last year the different Southern states contributed \$475,000 to State Missions, and reported 57,000 baptisms as the result of the labors of State Mission workers. In the South much greater emphasis is placed on State Missions among Baptists than in the North. As a consequence one man in every five in the South is a Baptist, while at the North the proportion is one in every fifty-five. New York which contains one-tenth of the population of the United States reported an actual loss in membership last year. So did several of the New England States

Deducting the baptisms reported by our State Mission Boards from the total number of increase in each state in the South, and then deducting from the remainder the loss from deaths and exclusions, it will be readily seen that the progress or disintegration of the Baptist denomination depends upon the work of State Missions for the net increase about corresponds to the number of

conversions and baptisms reported by the State Boards. We were nobly blessed in our State work last year in conversions and baptisms, churches and Sunday Schools organized, houses of worship built, books and tracts distributed, and aid extended to churches at needy points in the construction of suitable houses of worship. State Missions, Sunday Schools and Colportage should have right of way from now until October 31. Our evangelists are working in the destitute and weak points throughout the State, organizing churches and Sunday Schools and strengthening the weak points. Our missionaries are reporting glorious results.

Last year we had 2,865 conversions, 2,121 baptisms, 1,035 additions by letter, making a total of 3,156. Last year this Association gave \$3,250 for State Missions, and this year should give \$3,700. Our Church Building Department is working wonders. The spirit of church building is upon our people throughout the State. Last year we aided in the construction of 107 churches at needy points. This year we hope to do as much. This puts demands on us for large sums for this important feature of permanent advancement in our constructive work and in taking the State for Christ and the Baptists. The Board is anxious this year to raise \$12,000 for church building, and this Association should give \$1,000.

We have four Sunday School experts in the field who are doing great things for the improvement of our Sunday School work. Last year 42 Sunday Schools were organized, and 97,379 children attended Sunday School. \$3,000 is needed to support this work and this Association should give \$150. By our colportage work we indoctrinate our people in Bible principles. We distribute through our colporters, tracts, books and Bibles. Last year our colporters sold 4,790 books, 1,260 bibles and testaments, and distributed 61,000 religious tracts. This Association should contribute \$100 to this important work.

Pastors and friends of Missions throughout the State should make one united, persistent effort to gather funds for the different features of our State work that we may close the year free of debt. "Expect great things from God, attempt great things for God." We are especially blessed in the wise and aggressive leadership of a great Baptist General as Corresponding Secretary of our State Board.

REPORT ON DISTRICT MISSIONS.

Read by Bro. Cooper. Discussed by Bros. Scruggs, Gray, Smith, Thompson, Case and Coakley. Adopted.

Your Committee finds that this portion of the work of the Association is being well taken care of by the Executive Board.

While it is the primary purpose of the Association to look after all missionary needs within its bounds, yet we are glad to note the effort to have all the churches cultivate a spirit of independence, so that they will become able to take care of their own work.

While we do not think any help should be withheld where really needed, we

also do not think it wise to open the treasury of the Association to any church until it becomes apparent that body has exhausted all efforts to fill the need. This we believe is and should be the policy of the Executive Board in distributing its funds.

It is gratifying to know that all the churches in the Association are now with pastors who are laboring earnestly and faithfully. We also note with pleasure the large number that have reported improvements on their property. Such signs are hopeful and encouraging.

During the past year the Association gave \$548.32 for this purpose, distributed as follows: Porter Memorial \$240, Tabernacle \$150, Sadieville \$37 50, Bryan Station \$37 50, Clover Bottom \$37.50, Mt. Freedom \$48 82. While many of the churches that have been helped in the past are needing less assistance each year, yet there is abundant opportunity for Mission work in many parts of the Association. With increased means these opportunities could be taken advantage of and the work of Elkhorn Association could be made more and more effective.

We therefore urge the churches to increase their contributions for this purpose and thus help to look after the work that lies at our own hand. Won't each church here do a little better for District Missions next year?

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

Read by Bro. Daugherty. Discussed by Drs Prestridge, Sampey and Dawes. Adopted.

The last report of the Home Mission Board was the sixty-seventh, and shows progress along all lines of work. Yet the task before Southern Baptists is one that calls for renewed effort, and one in which our faith should be stronger. For it is only a great faith in this great enterprise that will cause us to do our best toward it.

In the year 1902 the total amount contributed was \$88,874 as against \$366,-050 in 1912.

For sixty-seven years this Board has wrought nobly for the saving of the lost, and in caring for the spiritual needy in the South. Yet after this sixty-seven years of good work (for it has been good,) there are two and one half times as many in the South who make no profession of religion, as was the number of the entire population of the South in 1845. Our task then is to win this great number for the Lord Jesus. And to do this we need, as Dr. Gambrell put it, to enlist the unlisted and to develop the undeveloped.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Read by Bro. O. O. Green. Discussed by Bro. Green. Adopted.

Another year has rolled around and again our hearts are rejoiced over the successes that God has given us during these twelve months. Notwithstanding the fact that our Board at Richmond began the year with a distressing debt the achievements have greatly encouraged us. It is but another proof that God is able to take care of his own and that if we His servants press onward in the path of duty trusting only in Omnipotence for direction we need never be fearful of results.

The cause of missions should appeal to us with greater power as the years go by. The need, of course is just as great as ever due to the presence and power of sin. The authority of Christ's command is just as binding because it is for all time. The increasing success of the missionary enterprise makes it all the more evident that the cause of mission pays which fact must be admitted by those who take the most practical view of the subject. Then, too, the great changes that are now taking place make it all the more necessary that we be alert to make use of every advantage for the advancement of Christ's kingdom. The recent changes in China mean that practically one fourth of the human race is in process of transformation intellectually, politically, and, who shall not say, religiously. We must be ready with Gospel that its refining and purifying power may do its supreme work in the spiritual adjustment which must necessarily follow.

During the past year there were 4,300 baptisms on foreign fields. This is marvelous when we remember that a few years ago converts were numbered only by the hundreds and tens—now by the thousands. We now have on the foreign field 271 missionaries and 577 native workers, making a total working force of 848. There are 342 churches and 422 Sunday schools. There are nine Women's training schools with 312 students and ten Theological schools with 245 students. These with the other schools of all grades have 6,156 pupils. Of course, we realize that the greater part of the results of labors on the foreign field cannot be tabulated but these facts should greatly encourage us.

Last year Southern Baptists gave \$580,408 to Foreign Missions. At the Oklahoma Convention last May it was decided to ask the churches of the Southern Baptist Convention to raise \$618,000 for Foreign Missions this year. This amount has been apportioned among the states and associations. The Elkhorn Association is asked to give \$3,500 of this amount. Brethren, we can easily

give this amount and we should rejoice in the privilege

One other important matter has been brought to our attention: One hundred years ago Adoniram Judson and Luther Rice went out to India as Congregational missionaries. By a prayerful study of the Bible they became Baptists; this fact aroused the Baptists of America to organize their missionary efforts. It is now proposed that Southern Baptists raise one and a quarter million dollars as an Equipment Fund in honor of the Judson Centennial. This is to be done within the next three years and in a way not to conflict with our regular missionary offerings. We recommend that this association take steps which may aid in the accomplishment of this great and important task.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Read by Bro. T. C. Ecton. Discussed by Bros. Entzminger, Green and Scruggs

From the tenor of the letters from the various churches we are gratified to know that there is more interest manifested in the Sunday schools within the bounds of the Elkhorn Association than ever before. Every church reports a Sunday school, five of them report two schools, one reports three schools and all the churches report their schools in a flourishing condition. There are more baptisms reported and more pupils enrolled than at any previous time.

We give thanks to God and the brethren that there has been so noticeable advance in this department of our church work. And this is as it should be for great are the opportunities and possibilities of the Sunday school work. Men and women everywhere are awakening to the great necessity of bringing their children up under the happy influence of the Sunday school, and we find many active christian workers to day in the Sunday school who a few years ago considered it of little importance; consequently failed to aid in the great work. The Sunday school has risen in a few years from what seemed an insignificant and neglected work to a mighty power in the hands of God to teach the scriptures to the old and young alike and is to-day doing a work next to the preaching of the word in bringing lost souls into the light and liberty of the Lord Jesus and training these souls for service in his vineyard.

In fact its splendid influence is being felt in almost every nook and corner in our fair land. It has assumed such a strong and healthy growth that christian people everywhere are wide awake to its importance and are organizing to push forward the work. One in a position to know states that material advancement has been made in the Sunday school work. The Convention Teacher says "on every hand there are evidences of renewed interest in Sunday school work." And this is not a passing flurry but a permanent concern for the welfare of the cause. The editors state that there is a constant mention of the fact of enlarged orders for literature with the comment "our school is increasing so rapidly that we need more supplies." On every hand we hear of Teacher

Training, thorough organization and better equipment; all of this is encouraging to the real Sunday school worker. All of these are hopeful signs and should arouse us to greater effort to forward the work.

The Sunday schools have already achieved much under the wise administration of godly men and women, guided by the Holy Spirit and the outlook for the future is more and most promising. We commend and recommend the work of our dear Bro. Entzminger and Bro. Barnes his assistant. Let us stand by, pray for and support them as our collaborators for better Sunday schools. Let there be a continuation of increased interest in the Sunday school work of Elk-horn Association with the best methods and appliances that can be had until every man, woman and child saved and unsaved shall be gathered into the Bible school or teaching service of the church that the unsaved may be taught how to be saved and that the saved may be taught the way of the Lord more perfectly. With 31 schools, 348 teachers and officers, 3,999 scholars and 142 conversions last year we thank God and take courage

SOME RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. That special efforts be made to enlist our Sunday school officers, teachers and as many more as possible in the teacher training work.
2. That the Moderator appoint a committee to perfect a Baptist Sunday school organization within the bounds of this Association for the promotion of our own denominational work. That they shall set the time, select a place and plan a program for the first meeting.
3. That a special effort be made to get as large attendance as possible of our Sunday school workers at the Assembly at Georgetown June 30 to July 4th, 1913.

REPORT ON YOUNG PEOPLES' WORK.

Read by Bro. Bowden. Discussed by Bros. Bowden, Entzminger, Chiles, Coakley, Ecton, Scruggs. Adopted.

During recent years four distinctive ideas have come to the forefront in the B. Y. P. U. work as it has developed in the South. First of these is that the true ideal of the B. Y. P. U. is "training for church activity." This new motto has replaced the old motto "culture for service," for it is more definite and direct. All institutions that educate have for their object, culture for service, but there needs to be specialization. One institution trains for one thing and one for another. The special field for training that makes the B. Y. P. U. worth while is to get our young people ready to be active church workers. So it comes to pass, second, that in our meetings and study classes emphasis is given to those things that train for church membership. The weekly meeting has been put at the forefront, for in it the largest number are trained to speak, to plan, and to work, and all along ways natural to a Baptist church. So also the studies recommended for our Study Classes are such as better equipment

for service in the local church. This brings before us the third distinctive idea in the special development of this work among Southern Baptists. The point of emphasis is no longer on the movement, but on the efficiency of the local union. Our present literature looks to the building up of the work in the churches. Our assemblies, conventions and encampments have become institutes of methods. These are all excellent and we must not fail to support our Assembly Institute of methods at Georgetown. But we must emphasize the importance of making better individual unions, for they are among our greatest factors for training Baptist for more efficient service. And the fourth distinctive idea is that this training should be along denominational lines. The period of life with which the B. Y. P. U. deals, and the purpose we have in view in it, are such as to make the need of denominational emphasis greater than in any other part of our church work. If we have any purpose at all of perpetuating our best life as a denomination, we surely must see to it that in each successive generation those who show the disposition to take the lead in the work of our churches are, at the critical training time of life, instructed as to our Baptist ways.

So the great concern is that we have the facilities at hand to make our unions in the best sense places to train for church activity. Of great importance, certainly second to nothing, is the material for the weekly meetings. The B. Y. P. U. Quarterly speaks for itself. It is designed to help each member of the union—big or little—to do his work better. It does not give its strength to anything but this purpose of efficiency in the local union.

The Study Courses are also planned on much the same lines. The Education Committee has definitely settled on three principles: (1) these studies should be simple; (2) they should be brief, covering usually about twelve lessons; (3) they should bear directly upon the practical training of the young for church activity.

Our Daily Bible Reader's course is of great importance and we would heartily recommend it to every union as offering the solution to one of our greatest weaknesses—that of Scriptural ignorance.

In this Association there are some fourteen unions and all doing good work. Lexington has one of the liveliest and most helpful City Unions in the state. They do things in a progressive way and are felt in that city as a mighty force for good. The B. Y. P. U. work of the Elkhorn Association was never better.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

It is with gratitude that your committee is enabled to report progress along the line of temperance reform. As never before our people are awakening to the fact that the liquor traffic is the consuming curse of the universe. It is with special thanksgiving that we note that the various denominations are co-operating in their efforts to wipe out this dark blot on our civilization. Never before, was the outlook for the final abolition of the liquor business so bright as it is today.

Your committee feels that all of our churches are indebted to the Anti-Saloon League for its splendid efforts against this gigantic evil. We believe that the Anti-Saloon League the best medium through which all of our churches can combine their efforts towards the extermination of this deadly sin.

We wish also to commend Gov. McCreary and the Legislature of Kentucky for their services in securing the passage of the County Unit Bill, whereby any county can vote as a county on the liquor proposition.

At present the greatest drawback to the effective enforcement of the laws against the liquor traffic, is the shipment of liquor into dry territory. The Shepherd-Kenyon Bill, now pending before Congress will, if passed, prevent the shipment of liquor into dry territory, and prove of inestimable benefit to the temperance cause. We urge that all of our people do all within their power to induce our Senators and Congressmen to support this bill. It is gratifying to record the fact that this bill will be voted on at the December session of Congress and Dr. Dinwiddie, National Anti-Saloon representative, believes that the bill will become a law.

Let us not then relax our efforts, but rather multiply and intensify our activities to the utter extermination of liquor selling and drinking

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

There is no longer any need to present arguments showing the necessity of the education of Baptist ministers. There is often very great need that the people urge some of our younger ministers to become better educated. But most of the young ministers do not need urging. They want to fit themselves the very best possible. The difficulty with most of these is that they have not the means to secure a college education. The faculty of Georgetown College can bear witness to the large number of ministerial students that want to come to college but cannot for lack of funds. The fund the college has for that purpose is so small that many of them have to be denied, and so cannot come to college. For this reason many of them go to the Seminary unprepared for the work there. It is the belief of your committee that the greatest door of opportunity that is now open to the churches of Elkhorn Association, is that of helping worthy young ministers to secure a college education. We would earnestly recommend that every church in this Association endeavor to make a yearly contribution to help young ministers through Georgetown College. It will yield the handsomest return in advancing the Maker's kingdom of any

equal amount that may be given for any other cause.

In urging this on you we do not, of course, wish to lessen your contributions to the Seminary fund for needy students. Indeed, we also commend this cause to your generosity.
