

# MINUTES

Constitution of the General Association of Baptists in the State of Kentucky.

Art. 1. This body shall be called the General Association of Baptists in the State of Kentucky, and shall be composed of representatives from each Baptist Church in the State, and shall be organized annually on the first of the month of May. A committee shall be appointed to prepare a constitution for the Association, and to call a meeting thereof at the place and time appointed.

## GENERAL ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS

Art. 2. The business of this Association, during the recess of its annual meetings, shall be referred to a committee of three members, to be chosen by the Association, and annually reported to the same at their proceedings. The members of this committee shall perform the duties usually devolved upon them by the Association.

Art. 3. All Associations, churches, and individuals, who are desirous of contributing to the support of the Association, shall be invited to do so, and no person shall be excluded on account of his rank or position in the Church, or of his color, or of his sex, or of his age, or of his education, or of his talents, or of his wealth, or of his poverty, or of his health, or of his sickness, or of his infirmity, or of his disability, or of his inability to perform any of the duties of a member of the Association.

## IN KENTUCKY:

Art. 4. Any person who is a member of any of the churches in the State, and who is desirous of contributing to the support of the Association, shall be invited to do so, and no person shall be excluded on account of his rank or position in the Church, or of his color, or of his sex, or of his age, or of his education, or of his talents, or of his wealth, or of his poverty, or of his health, or of his sickness, or of his infirmity, or of his disability, or of his inability to perform any of the duties of a member of the Association.

## AND THE

Art. 5. The Constitution may be amended or altered, (the six Articles excepted,) by a majority of two-thirds of the members present at a meeting of the Association.

## KENTUCKY AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY:

Art. 1. This Society shall be called the Kentucky and Foreign Bible Society, and shall be organized on the first of the month of May, 1842. All persons contributing annually to the funds shall be members of the Society.

HELD AT BLOOMFIELD, OCTOBER, 1842.

Art. 2. Each contributor of five dollars or more shall be a member for life, and each contributor of one dollar or more shall be a member for one year. All churches and societies desirous of having their names registered in the books of this Society, shall be entitled to the privilege of members.

## WITH TABLES OF THE BAPTIST ASSOCIATIONS, CHURCHES, AND MINISTERS, IN KENTUCKY.

Art. 3. This Society shall have the honor of receiving from all churches, associations, and individuals, who are desirous of contributing to the support of the Society, a copy of their names, and of the amount of their contributions, and of the names of their churches, associations, and individuals, who are desirous of contributing to the support of the Society, and who shall have their names registered in the books of this Society.

Art. 4. The President, Vice President, and Secretaries, shall be elected annually, and shall hold office for one year. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Society, and shall have the management of the Society's affairs, and shall be authorized to execute all the business of the Society, and shall be responsible for the same.

Art. 5. The Board of Managers shall be composed of five members, to be chosen annually, and shall have the management of the Society's affairs, and shall be authorized to execute all the business of the Society, and shall be responsible for the same.

Art. 6. The Board of Managers shall have the honor of receiving from all churches, associations, and individuals, who are desirous of contributing to the support of the Society, a copy of their names, and of the amount of their contributions, and of the names of their churches, associations, and individuals, who are desirous of contributing to the support of the Society, and who shall have their names registered in the books of this Society.

## MINUTES Constitution of the General Association.

Art. 1. This body shall be called the GENERAL ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS IN KENTUCKY.

Art. 2. This Association shall be composed of representatives from such Baptist Churches and Associations as are in regular standing.

Art. 3. Every Church and Association contributing annually to the funds of this Association, shall be entitled to a representation.

Art. 4. This Association shall, in a special manner, aim to promote, by every legitimate means, the prosperity of the cause of God in this State.

Art. 5. It is distinctly understood, that this Association shall have no ecclesiastical authority.

Art. 6. At each meeting of this Association, there shall be elected, by ballot, a Moderator, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, and fifty Managers, (five of whom shall be a quorum,) who shall constitute a Board of Directors for the management of all the business of this Association, during the recess of its Annual Meetings, and annually report to the same their proceedings.

Art. 7. The Moderator, Secretaries, and Treasurer, shall perform the duties usually performed by such officers in similar Associations.

Art. 8. All Associations contributing to this, and co-operating in its designs, shall be considered auxiliary to it.

Art. 9. A General Agent may be appointed by the Association or Board of Managers, whose duty it shall be to survey all the destitution, the means of supply, &c., and report regularly to the Board, so as to enable them to meet the wants of the destitute. He shall also raise funds, and in every practical way promote the designs of the Association; for which he shall receive a reasonable support.

Art. 10. Any visiting brethren, in good standing, as such shall be entitled to sit in Council in the Annual Sessions of this Association, but shall not have the right to vote.

Art. 11. The Annual Meetings of this Association shall be on Saturday before the 3d Lord's day in October.

Art. 12. This Constitution may be amended or altered, (the 5th Article excepted,) by a concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

## Constitution of the Kentucky and Foreign Bible Society.

Art. 1. This Society shall be called THE KENTUCKY AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY, Auxiliary to the American and Foreign Bible Society.

Art. 2. All persons contributing annually to the funds shall be members of the Society.

Art. 3. Each contributor of thirty dollars or more, shall be a member for life.

Art. 4. Life Directors and life members of the parent Society shall be, ex-officio, members of this.

Art. 5. All Churches and Societies agreeing to place their surplus funds in the Treasury of this Society, shall be Auxiliaries, and their representatives be entitled to the privilege of members.

Art. 6. The funds of this Society, after a deduction of incidental expenses, shall be appropriated, through the American and Foreign Bible Society, as this Society may direct.

Art. 7. This Society shall annually elect a President, four Vice Presidents, a Recording and Corresponding Secretary, and Board of Managers, consisting of twenty members, all of whom shall be brethren in good standing in Baptist Churches, fifteen of them to reside in or near Louisville, and who shall hold their offices until superseded by a new election.

Art. 8. The President, Vice President, and Secretaries, shall be ex-officio, members of the Board.

Art. 9. The Board of Managers shall meet quarterly, or more frequently if necessary, at such time and place as they shall adjourn to, or at the call of the President or Secretary, and five members shall be a quorum.

Art. 10. The Board of Managers shall be charged with all business of the Society, during their appointment, and shall make a report at each Annual meeting. They shall enact their own By-laws and fill such vacancies as may occur in their own body.

Art. 11. The Society shall hold its annual meetings, at the same time and place of the annual meeting of the General Association of the Baptists in Kentucky.

Art. 12. The Minutes shall be signed by the President and Secretaries.

Art. 10. No alteration shall be made in the Constitution, except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at an annual meeting.

OF THE

## GENERAL ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS

IN KENTUCKY

ORGANIZED OCTOBER 20, 1837.

The fifth annual meeting of the General Association of Baptists in Kentucky, was held in BLOOMFIELD, commencing on Saturday October 15, 1842,

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Elder THOMAS S. MALCOM of Louisville, from 2d Cor. 2: 16, "*Who is sufficient for these things?*"

The meeting was called to order, the Moderator and Secretary of the preceding year officiating.

Invited visiting brethren to take seats with us. Elder Isaac McCoy, for many years Missionary among the Indians, accepted the invitation.

On motion, requested Elder McCoy to give the Association such information relative to the Indians, as he may think proper. The request was complied with in part, and it was resolved that the subject be resumed, at a future stage of the meeting.

Appointed a committee of Elders Pendleton, Colgan and Sedwick, to arrange the business for Monday.

Appointed brethren Keen and Caldwell a committee to report in reference to the state and prospects of Georgetown College.

On motion, referred the Report of the General Agent to a committee of brethren, H. Malcom, and Sedwick, with the Agent.

Agreed to refer the printing of the Minutes of this meeting to the Committee of Arrangement.

Appointed Elders T. S. Malcom and R. Holman, to prepare a table of the statistics of the denomination in the State for publication in the Minutes.

Appointed brethren Jarvis and Halbert to audit the account of the Treasurer of the past year, and to settle with the General Agent.

On motion, Elder Vaughan was appointed to preach the next introductory sermon, and Elder Pendleton his alternate.

Agreed that the next meeting of this body be held at GEORGETOWN, commencing on Saturday before the third Sabbath in October, 1843.

Adjourned till 7 o'clock P. M. Prayer by Elder Colgan.

#### SATURDAY EVENING, 7 o'clock, P. M.

Met according to adjournment. Prayer by brother Blair.

On motion, agreed to resume the subject of Missionary effort among the Indians.

The following resolutions were adopted :

*Resolved*, That this Association contemplate the Indian Mission with deep interest, and regard the service as specially appropriated to the western churches.

*Resolved*, That we highly approve of the proposed plan of a Western Indian Mission Association, and recommend to the denomination in this State a hearty co-operation with other States in the Convention to be held in Cincinnati the last Thursday in this month, in order to perfect such an organization.

On motion, appointed Elders Wm. C. Buck, Geo. C. Sedwick, Wm. Vaughan, T. S. Malcom, R. Melvin, A. G. Curry, Daniel S. Colgan, Howard Malcom, and brethren Jacob Eliot, Simeon Fisher, James H. Bagby, Wm. Blair, Isaac N. Halbert, Samuel Haycraft, Wm. Allen, Thos. Hansbrough, Jas. E. Tyler, Wm. Colgan, C. Vanbuskirk, to attend the Convention referred to, in the last resolution.

Adjourned until Monday morning, 9 o'clock. Prayer by Elder Keen.

The Committee to whom was referred the following Report of the General Agent, made their report which was referred to the Board of Managers:

#### Report of General Agent.

Your Agent had prepared a report at length and forwarded to Corresponding Secretary which did not reach him; consequently, the following imperfect one, hastily drawn, is respectfully submitted.

Your Agent has visited the churches, in whole or in part in 18 counties, making 57 churches. Besides, I attended the Anniversaries of five Associations.—The exhibit, accompanying this will show the amount of funds which have come into my hands.

I have visited but very few churches that were able to give any assistance towards supplying the destitute of the State. Churches where hundreds might have been collected a few years ago, I have found barely able to meet their own wants. The feeling of the churches is generally favorable to the Association. I have met with no opposition on this score in any quarter. The spirit of discord has been banished from our ranks, and our churches enjoy more peace and unanimity than they have ever done in any period of their history. Perhaps the destitution has been as well supplied this year as it could have been under more favorable pecuniary auspices. Few of our ministers have been idle. I think it probable that there has been more preaching in our State during the past year, than ever was in the same length of time. We have enjoyed one continued revival season. The additions to the churches have been unusually large.

The district Associations are carrying out the plan recommended by the General Association of employing missionaries within their bounds, as may be seen from the following facts:

**BETHEL ASSOCIATION.**—Elder R. W. Nixon, the Missionary of this Association, during the year preached 268 sermons, attended 20 protracted meetings, assisted in ordaining 3 elders and 7 deacons, constituted 3 churches and traveled 3,023 miles. There were 379 conversions at the meetings attended. The amount paid in for his support was \$401.00.

**CONCORD ASSOCIATION,** has appointed a protracted meeting at every church in its bounds, and ministers to attend each.

**ELKHORN ASSOCIATION.**—Three missionaries were in the field part of the year, Elders J. D. Black, A. G. Curry, and Y. R. Pitts. Brother Pitts reports 45 sermons and 65 baptized. The labors of brother Black and brother Curry are not reported, which we regret as each were active and successful. This Association has for the present year two missionaries, Elders R. T. Dillard and J. D. Black.

**GOSHEN ASSOCIATION.**—Elder H. Ellis acted as Missionary, but his labors are not reported.

**LIBERTY ASSOCIATION.**—Elder Moses Akin acted as the Missionary during six months, and Elders John Jones and James Locke each six weeks. \$214.00 were contributed.

**LONG RUN ASSOCIATION.**—Elder R. Melvin the Missionary of this body, assisted in five protracted meetings in which 311 were baptized. During the 243 days in the service of the Association he preached 233 sermons, and traveled 1181 miles. He was re-appointed at the last Association.

**RUSSELL'S CREEK ASSOCIATION.**—Elder Moses Akin reports six months labor in the service of this body.

**SOUTH DISTRICT ASSOCIATION,** voted to appropriate the money that was placed last Association in the hands of A. Rice, Treasurer, to the objects of the General Association.

**SALEM ASSOCIATION.**—Elder C. Lovelace reports 302 sermons and 61 exhortations, 38 baptized, and 1586 miles traveled.

A vast amount of missionary labor is performed by ministers under no appointment.

On motion, referred the Report of the Joint Committee of this body and of the Board, in relation to financial concerns, to the Executive Board.

At a meeting of the Board of Managers of the General Association held in the 1st Baptist church, on Monday evening January 16, 1843, the following Report of the Examining Committee was read, and on motion was received and concurred in, and the committee discharged;

**Report of Committee of the Board.**

The committee to whom was referred the examination and adjustment of the accounts of the General Agent and the reports of the Special Committees of the General Association, upon those accounts, beg leave to submit the following Report:

Your committee after carefully examining the accounts made out in the hurry of business by the Auditing Committee of the General Association, and reported in the minutes of their proceedings as published in the Banner and Pioneer of December 22, and comparing the report of the Auditing Committee with the reports of the General Agent for the two years of his agency, discovered discrepancies (doubtless the result of haste) which they could not reconcile, and which would not only present inexplicable difficulties in the accounts, but in the opinion of your committee does a manifest injustice to the General Association, as it was thereby required to pay to the Bible and Foreign Mission Societies a large sum of money collected by the Agent of the Association while legitimately employed in their service, and appropriated to those societies, by arrangements of the General Agent only, without the direction of either of those societies. In view of these facts, and with a view to present the whole transaction in the clearest light before the public, your committee recommend that the following statement of the accounts be substituted in the published minutes for the one made out by the Committee of the Association.

From the above statement it will be seen that the sum of \$744.53 collected, and the further sum of \$21.62 received for sale of Minutes for the last year, 1840, '41, and the sums of \$135.30, and \$47 on subscription collected 1841, '42, are all surrendered to the General Association; leaving only to be assumed by your Board the sum of \$236.60 for the Bible Society, and \$35.68 for the Foreign Mission Society of his first years agency, and \$11 for the Bible Society of his second years agency, amounting for the two years to \$247.60 to the Bible Society, and \$35.68 for the Foreign Mission Society. Making the total assumed by you to those two Societies \$283.28, and in this way the committee recommend the matter to be settled.

It will be seen by the Board that the salary of the Agent for the one year and nine months reported service, would entitle him at the rates allowed him the first year, to \$1750—whereas by this arrangement he will receive only \$1231.73, and that upon your assuming to pay the above sums to the Bible and Foreign Mission Societies, he relinquishes all further claims upon the Board for salary.

The Committee on Georgetown College made the following Report:

**The Committee on the State and Prospects of Georgetown College respectfully report:**

We conceive the existence of the College of the greatest importance, not only in advancing the cause of Ministerial and General Education in this State, but also South of us, where for many years it will be impracticable to establish similar institutions. It is a matter of sincere gratification, after many years of severe struggle, to see it placed upon a permanent basis. The large amount of subscriptions obtained by President Giddings, forms an adequate guarantee as to its pecuniary stability. The character of its *Faculty*, a proof of which we have had for two years, has secured the entire confidence of the public. We are satisfied that no College in the West is giving so thorough and elevated a course of instruction. The high literary attainments and experience of its President, enables him to meet the expectations entertained, and to secure the esteem of the students entrusted to his care.

We have learned that there are now about *ninety* students, most of whom are in College proper—*eighteen* of these are pursuing their studies with reference to the ministry—three finished their course at the close of the last session. We have been sensible that the confluence of students has been restrained by the high price of board—we, therefore, are pleased to learn, that just before the commencement of the present Term, arrangements were made, by which the price is reduced so low, as to remove every possible objection on that account.

The Library has grown to be one of the largest in the West. The Philosophical apparatus, although deficient in many desirable articles, is costly and every way competent to the purposes of daily instruction. The new and spacious College edifice is not entirely finished in the interior—there are six recitation rooms finished—one of which is occupied temporarily for a Library and another for a Museum. The old College edifice furnishes room for the *Preparatory Department* and two Halls for the Literary Societies, (Ciceronian and Tau Theta Kappa,) which have been lately fitted up by the voluntary subscriptions of the students.

We regret to learn that the remissness of the subscribers, in paying their instalments, which we are aware is owing to the pressure of the times, has occasioned serious embarrassment to the Trustees. We had fondly hoped that the "DOLLAR SYSTEM" which had been so heartily approved would have furnished relief, but even this easy and excellent plan has, as yet, yielded but small assistance. We earnestly hope that this seeming neglect will not discourage the Faculty and Trustees. We are happy to believe that the churches will be alive to the interests of this Institution and heartily co-operate in sustaining it.

We would recommend the adoption of the following *Resolutions*:

*Resolved*, That in view of the ability of the President and Professors of Georgetown College, we earnestly recommend it to the affectionate regard and patronage of the Baptist denomination throughout the South West.

*Resolved*, That we pledge ourselves as individuals to use immediate exertions to carry out the plan of raising one dollar from every Baptist in Kentucky, and affectionately invite all our brethren to co-operate with us:

## SATURDAY, October 15.

Met at the call of the Chair. Prayer by Elder Buck.

In the absence of the President, Elder Sedwick, one of the Vice-Presidents, took the chair.

The following resolution offered by Elder Baker and sustained by an able speech was adopted :

*Resolved*, That the work of supplying the world with pure translations of the word of God, is specially appropriate to the general principles of the Baptists.

The Committee appointed to take into consideration so much of the Report of the Board as relates to the acts of the General Agent, made the following Report :

The undersigned, a Committee to adjust accounts with the General Agent for the year 1840—41, beg leave to Report—

That the sum of \$760.53 was collected by the Agent of the General Association for that year, upon the principle that one half should be equally divided between the Bible Society and Foreign Mission, making \$190.13, which added to \$236.60 of specific donations, makes a total of \$476.73 realized during that time by the General Agent. Of this amount, \$250 were allowed by the Board of Managers for his salary, leaving in the hands of the General Agent, \$176.73 at this time.

The Committee would further state that the Board of Managers appointed a Committee to audit the account and settle with the General Agent, but owing to the absence of the Agent and other hindrances, settlement was not made.

The General Agent read his Report, which on motion was referred to the Board.

#### BIBLE SOCIETY.

Another year has passed, and it becomes my duty as your General Agent to give an account of my stewardship. Shortly after the adjournment of the Society in Russellville, I entered upon the duties of my office. I visited in the months of November and December last, the counties of Mason, Bracken, Fleming, Nicholas, and Bourbon. The unparalleled pressure in the monetary concerns of the country rendered any collections almost impossible. Your Agent, therefore, could do little more than explain the objects of the Society and urge upon the brethren their duty, that as they had opportunity they should do good unto the benighted inhabitants of earth.

Owing to the unsettled condition of the money matters alluded to, your Agent for three months, deemed it prudent, not to urge the claims of the Bible cause upon the churches. He was every where disheartened at the cry of distress, which came from every class of the community. The rich and the poor alike complained of the scarcity of money, and but few seemed to know what would be their condition when the storm which had already wrecked the hopes and the fortunes of so many had spent its fury. Under these circumstances, your Agent deemed it the

best course he could pursue to keep the great concerns involved in the glorious enterprise of giving the Bible to the nations, before the people. This he has done to the best of his humble capacity. Hence, on the first tour spoken of, he organized an auxiliary society, and labored in its behalf as far as practicable.

In June, I visited the counties of Carroll and Gallatin. In the months of February and March, and also in April and May, I visited the counties of Lincoln, Garrard and Mercer; and again in July, August, September, and to 10th of October, I visited the counties of Washington, Mercer, Lincoln, Garrard, Madison, Jessamine, Woodford, Scott, Franklin, Shelby and Henry: and in all places where prudence justified it, I presented the claims of the Bible. I obtained some subscriptions, and made some small collections, which as they were done through local societies, I did not keep an account of. The subscriptions in some places were liberal, and will in due time, it is confidently believed, be reported to your treasury.

The Baptists have, in the work of giving the Bible to the nations, been providentially placed in a peculiar and highly responsible situation. We are the only religious community who plead that the Bible, the whole Bible, and nothing but the Bible, should be given to the nations un mutilated and undisguised—that ALL the words of this life, without concealment and without ambiguity, ought to be placed in the hands of every man on earth, in his own tongue wherein he was born. The Bible Societies of this and other countries, under the control of our Protestant pedo-baptist brethren, have refused to circulate any translation of the scriptures made in the language of the heathen, unless “conformed in its principles to the common English version, at least so far that all the denominations represented in these societies, may consistently use them in their several schools and communities.” This rule not only forbids the circulation of the only versions existing in many languages, and thus leaves the people to perish for the want of knowledge, but it precludes the possibility of giving to some other nations at all, while in all it requires the truth to be mutilated or concealed to subserve and to foster party and sectarian purposes and predilections. The Baptists, on the other hand, have said to translators, “endeavor by prayerful study and diligent search, to ascertain the precise meaning of the original text; and to transfer no word which is susceptible of a literal translation.” They hold no sentiment and observe no practice, which they fear will suffer by ascertaining the precise meaning of the original text, and by a literal rendering of every word which is susceptible of it. In this respect we stand proudly pre-eminent. For adhering to this rule, and for contending for these principles, we have been discarded by our brethren. But though deserted and persecuted by them, the Lord has not forsaken us. Our efforts to spread the word of God, under the propitious smiles of our heavenly Father, have already been blessed much beyond our most ardent anticipations.

Let us not then despond under difficulties or cower before opposition. If the Lord be for us who can be against us? The Lord has greatly blessed us during the present year, in almost every section of our country. Let us feel our obligations as the stewards of the Lord—that all we have and are, belong to him; and let us so live and so act as we expect to meet our God and our fellow-men in the judgment day, and opposition and error will fall before us, and the world be filled with the knowledge of the truth.

Your Agent has traveled about 3000 miles, and has presented the claims and explained the principles and objects of the Society, in ninety-three discourses.

On motion, referred the subject of the General Agency to the discretion of the Board of Managers.

## Report of the Corresponding Secretary of the Bible Society.

The position of a State Society acting mainly as a medium for receiving the contributions of various auxiliaries, and transmitting the same to a more general body for ultimate appropriations, admits of comparatively little action to be reported; unless it be what is accomplished by agents employed to visit the different auxiliaries and churches, to stir up their minds to the importance of the object in view, and to assist them in raising contributions for that object as circumstances will permit.

During the former part of the year which closed with the last anniversary, the Board then acting more in expectation of securing again the agency of brother KINOSFORD, whose previous labors while acting for the Society had been both acceptable and successful, being ultimately disappointed in this expectation, and having in the field no officially appointed agent during that year, the only report of the Board for that anniversary was the account of monies raised and collected by brother Waller, the President of the Society, who in various places advocated the claims of our cause in a very able and efficient manner while acting as the official Agent of the General Association of the State. As many of the sums mentioned in this report of monies were only subscribed and not collected, while others whose transmission he expected, were not passed to his hands until the very time of the last Annual Meeting, the settlement of his account with the Society remained to be effected under the administration of the present Board.

In view of his efforts in behalf of the Bible cause, your Board thought it expedient by a retrospective action to recognise him as the previous agent of the Society. And as a considerable portion of his time while engaged in the service of the General Association has really been employed for the Bible Society, and many contributions had been taken by him on the proposal to apply one-half of the amount collected to Home Missions in our State, and to divide the other one-half equally between the Bible Society and Foreign Missions, we were also of opinion that this Society ought to assume one-quarter of the salary appropriated for his services by the Board of the General Association. By a mutual understanding therefore with the Board, we agreed to assume such a portion of their obligations and voted accordingly to appropriate \$250.00 of his collections in payment of his salary—designating the balance after defraying the expenses of printing the Minutes for the Treasury of the American and Foreign Bible Society.

We rejoice at the especial interest which has been manifested in this department of benevolent effort throughout the State; and believing that another essay in respect to its importance is neither fitting nor necessary for the present Report, for information respecting the prospects of the cause, the efforts of auxiliaries and the amount of monies contributed, we refer to that of the General Agent.

THURSDAY, October 13th.

The Minister's meeting met on Thursday before the third Lord's day in October, 1842. The Introductory sermon was delivered by Elder Thomas G. Keen, from the Epistle of Jude, the last clause of the third verse—"That ye should earnestly contend for the faith once delivered unto the saints." The meeting was called to order by Elder Pendleton the Chairman of the preceding year. Elder Keen was appointed Secretary *pro tem*. Moved, That Elder McCoy preach to-night. A Committee of brethren McKay, Minor, Duncan and Sutcliffe, were appointed to arrange the preaching.

Moved, That Elders Colgan and Leake be appointed a Committee to take suitable notice of the death of ministers during the last year. Adjourned until night. Prayer by Elder W. C. Buck.

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THURSDAY EVENING, 7 o'clock.

Met according to adjournment. Moderator in the Chair. Prayer by Elder A. G. Curry. The Introductory Sermon was made the subject of fraternal criticism, and after the brethren had freely expressed their views, it was unanimously *Resolved*, That the author be requested to furnish a copy of his sermon for publication in the Banner and Pioneer.

Appointed a Committee of Elders, Buck, Sedwick and Baber, to suggest themes to be discussed during this meeting. Adjourned until to-morrow morning at half-past eight o'clock. Prayer by Elder Pendleton.

FRIDAY MORNING, October 14.

Met at half-past 8 o'clock. Moderator in the Chair. Prayer by Elder R. Melvin. The Committee to present themes for discussion made report.

The Committee to select persons to write and one to preach the

next Introductory Sermon, offered their Report which was laid upon the table.

The question, "What is the best method of conducting protracted meetings so as to secure the efficiency of the ministry and the permanent peace of the Church," was freely discussed.

Moved to adjourn to the call of the Chair. Prayer by Elder Pendleton.

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SATURDAY, October 15.

Met at half-past eight o'clock A. M. Prayer by brother Hansbrough. The Committee to notice the deaths among the ministers of this meeting during the last year, submitted the following Report which was unanimously adopted:

**Report on Deceased Ministers.**

Since our last meeting our Heavenly Father has in wisdom removed from us our esteemed brethren Elder James Nall and Elder Absalom Ford.

Elder JAMES NALL at the time of his death resided in Hardin county and was between fifty and 60 years of age, was a faithful and laborious minister of the gospel for about 25 years. He has left a family and numerous connexion to lament his loss, and has gone to reap his reward above.

Elder ABSALOM FORD was called home in the morning of life. He was about 25 years of age, and had been preaching about three years. He was a young man of ardent piety, well tempered zeal and of great promise. Though young he had been very useful in building up the cause of Christ. He was greatly esteemed by all that knew him. He lived at the time of his death in Scottsville, Allen county.

*Resolved*, That we affectionately cherish the memory of these worthy brethren and sympathise with the churches formerly enjoying their ministry in the deprivation of their faithful labors.

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## CHINA MISSION SOCIETY.

Buck, took the Chair and called the meeting to order, and Elder T. S. Malcom being chosen Secretary, the Society proceeded to business.

The Treasurer made his Report, and brethren F. A. Willard and J. Eliot were appointed a committee to audit the same.\*

After some further deliberations upon the general interests of the Society, it was adjourned to the call of the Chair.

### MONDAY MORNING.

At the call of the Chair, the Society came together, and the meeting being duly opened by prayer—on motion, brethren Buck, T. S. Malcom, Waller, Willard and Eliot, were appointed a committee to alter the Constitution of this Society, so as to adapt it to its present condition as a State organization connected with the Baptist Foreign Missionary Board.

The following Resolutions were presented by Elder H. Malcom, and unanimously adopted:

*Resolved*, That the Board furnish Georgetown College with one hundred copies of the Chinese Mission Advocate, to be given one copy to each of the present beneficiaries, and the rest to be retained and given to future beneficiaries one copy each.

*Resolved*, also, That twenty-five copies be delivered on application to each of the following Colleges, viz: Shurtleff College, Ill., and Granville College, Ohio, and Franklin Institute, Ia.

Adjourned till the next annual meeting.

The names of **COUNTY TOWNS** are printed in small capitals.

Whenever there is a post-office near a church and of the same name, the fact is indicated by the letters, *p. o.*

The names of *Licentiates* are in italics.

The tables are all compiled from the minutes of 1842, with the exception of South Concord Association.

No one who has not been engaged in a similar undertaking can form an idea of the difficulty and amount of labor in compiling such statistical Tables. The minutes of seventeen of the Associations, do not designate the names of Ordained and Licensed ministers. In the minutes of the remaining Associations, although, the names of ministers are designated, only those appear on the minutes, who were present at the annual meeting. In many cases the compiler could only ascertain the names of ministers, by private information or by noticing the names of those who preached the introductory sermons, or who were appointed to perform the duty at the next meeting. The actual number of ministers, must therefore considerably exceed the number reported in the following tables.

The Counties in which the churches are located could seldom be ascertained from the minutes, but enough are given to determine the geographical position of each Association in the State.

OTHER DENOMINATIONS IN KENTUCKY.—The EPISCOPALIANS, according to the American Almanac, have twenty Clergymen and 384 communicants. The REFORMERS or CAMPBELLITES, are numerous but publish no statistical returns. The CUMBERLAND PRESBYTERIANS, have a considerable number of churches. There is to my knowledge but one UNIVERSALIST church in the State, and one UNITARIAN church.
