# FIRST DAY—MORNING SESSION.

BIRCH LICK, KY., THURSDAY, Sept. 26th, 1878.

The Nineteenth Annual Session of the Irvine Association of United Baptists met with the Baptist Church, at Birch Lick, Jackson county, Ky., at 11 o'clock, A. M. After prayer by L. P. Johnston, the Annual Sermon was preached by T. L. Lawson from II Timothy, 4th chapter, 2nd verse,—"Preach the Word." DEAR BRETHREN: - As it has been our custom to close our Minutes will Circular Letter, I have selected the following subject, viz: Alien Immersi First. Is it right for us as the Church of Christ to receive persons into our lowship who have been immersed by ministers of human organizations? Ver not. First, they were commanded to teach and the baptize the taught; and if we are right on Christ sitting up his Church of comwe are the only people on earth that have the right to baptize, for it is clear our mind that he never has authorized one out of the Church to baptize. second proof that Christ did set up His Church is found in Daniel, 2nd char and 44th verse,-"And in the days of these Kings shall the God of Heaven up a Kingdom," &c. The Lord never delegated this power of setting up Kingdom to any one, but reserved it unto himself. Now when was this pro ecv verified? It must have been at the end of the law, for we read in Lu 16th chapter, and 16th verse, that "The Law and the Prophets were until John &c. Then did the Gospel begin at the preaching of John? For proof of the fact read Mark, 1st chapter, 1st, 2nd and 3rd verses, and also Mutthew, 11 chapter and 12th verse, -"From the days of John the Baptist until now, Kingdom of Heaven suffer violence," &c. We answer Neither do they send out men to baptize for us. Each organization has its cers to officiate in and for themselves. This being the case we cannot rece baptism from these modern sects. When we do we surrender our claims Baptists and say by our action that baptismal regeneration and baby sprink! with all other heresies and notions of men, is right. So, brethren, we hope pray that Baptists will think of these things, and remember that our fall rather than surrender these blessed principles, shed their blood and scaled truth with their lives. In conclusion, let me ask you, dear brethren, to e estly contend for the one faith, one Lord and one baptism.
