Dillard appointed in his place, who accepted the appointment, provided the ministers of the association would cordially co-operate with him, which was assented to nem. con., and on motion of brother Payne, the other messengers of this association pledge their co-operation and aid.

The missionary field of labors is extended at the will of the missionaries and executive committee.

The executive committee, in future, are to reside in Georgetown, and Elders G. C. Sedwick, Howard, Malcom, and brethren L. C. Stedman, G. G. Steffer and B. B. Ford, committee.

DEAR BRETHREN:

According to the government of the Church of Christ, or at least of that portion of which we are members, we cannot command obedience to authoritative precepts, but we beseech you, as fellow-servants of our common Master, to hear us upon the subject of *Christian stability*.

The Apostle Paul, having in the 15th chapter of his first letter to the Corinthians, finished a masterly and unanswerable argument in favor of the Resurrection, concludes with an exhortation to stability, saying: "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, for as much as you know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord."

It is a very fashionable and often repeated sentiment, that, provided a professor of religion is sincere in what he believes, it is all right; thus making sincerity the test of truth. But, dear brethren, truth is truth—whether we believe it or not. For when God requires any given proposition to be believed, that proposition must be believed and acted out, else we need not expect the divine blessing. Therefore, to believe the opposite of what God requires, even with the utmost degree of sincerity imaginable, is but mockery of God, and will be visited with chastisement.

As sincerity in error is dangerous to the souls of men; so instability in the truth is also dangerous. With what unbounded joy, was the heart of the aged Apostle John filled, when he found that the children of his sister in the Lord, were walking in the truth. "I greatly rejoiced that I found of thy children walking in the truth, as we have received a commandment from the Father." And what contributes more to the glory of

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the Gospel ministry now, than to see Christians consistent, stable, unmovable, in the principles and practice of our most holy religion? For want of this decision of character many lose their reward; being unstable as water, or as changeable as the wind. Hence, says the last named Apostle, "Look to yourselves, that we lose not those things we have wrought, but that we receive a full reward." Many professors have lost all they have been doing for years, for many years; and if for want of stability, a man may lose so many years of profession, duty, privilege and blessing once, may he not again and again, and at last die bankrupt in religion?

Living as we do in a society, compounded of all the interests of the Christian church, many are the opportunities for the trial of the Christian's faith; and equally many are the opportunities for our evincing Christian firmness in resisting the temptations to evil. There is a wild enthusiasm affoat, as to Christian liberty. It is the ultra democracy of the church; dangerous to its peace, ruinous to its prosperity. The Apostle Paul saw the budding of this noxious plant, when he exhorted his brethren not to use their liberty "as a cloak of maliciousness, but as the servants of God. This unbridled liberty is not only dangerous to the peace of the Church, but also of the State. For that untamed spirit, that is restless under the dicipline of the Church, nor ceases its restlessnes until all government of the Church is broken up, may not only live in contempt of the laws of God, but may despise government, speak evil of dignities, and break in upon the rules of civil society.

In view of innovations so dangerous, be steadfast, dear brethren, and abound in the work of the Lord. And let not the glare of a false liberality induce you to swerve from the principles and usages of our Christian fathers. If the institutions of the New Testament were ours, then we could alter them, and suit ourselves to others and others to us. But they belong to Christ, and we have no right to infinge upon the high prerogative of our Divine Legislator.

Brethren, we have a great work to do; let us not lose our reward by idleness, but let us be always abounding in the work of the Lord. The heathen world is continually saying "give us Bibles; send us teachers—" much of our own country needs the bread of life, and is thirsting for the waters of life. Let this be our motto: the dead have worked for us, we will work for the living. Our fathers, through whose instrumentality we enjoy the blessings of salvation, sowed the seed of truth, and we

have reaped the fruits of righteousness. Let us sow that others may reap. We now bid you an affectionate farewell in the language of the Apostle: "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, for as much as you know your labor is not in vain in the Lord." TO THE MESSENGERS COMPOSING THE ELKHORN ASSOCIATION.

DEAR BRETHREN:

On the 18th day of April last, the Executive Committee for the Elkhern Association, tendered me the appointment, in conjunction with brother J. D. Black, to preach within her bounds, to supply the destitute, hold protracted meetings, &c. At the time the appointment was tender, ed, the undersigned was under obligation, by promise, to attend a protracted meeting with Mount Pleasant Church, in the Franklin Association, which appointment was filled with evidences of the blessing of the Lord attendant. Eleven were added to the Church by experience and baptism. Only six of the Churches within the bounds of the Association have been visited by your agent; and he would here take occasion to remark, that he has not met with one individual who was opposed to the efforts of this body to advance the cause of Christ by the means she has adopted.

After the acceptance of the appointment by the undersigned, he was frequently solicited to leave the bounds of the Association, and deeming the cause a common one, on two occasions labored without its bounds. On one occasion by himself, when he avowed that he was laboring under the appointment of your body, on the other, in conjunction with brother Black.

Since the acceptance of the appointment, your agent has filled his engagement with the Church at Great Crossings, to preach once in every month, and has preached forty-five sermons in his appointment. No account of the number of exhortations or miles travelled, has been kept. Among the Churches where he has labored, there have been received by experience and baptism sixty-five. Forty-seven of the above additions within the bounds of the Elkhorn Association, the others among the Churches with which he labored without the bounds of said Association.

No effort has been made to collect funds publicly. Your agent has received in private contributions, twenty dollars and twenty-five cents.

Your agent would remark, at the close, that we have abundant reason to bless the Lord for his goodness and mercy, and, especially, for the evidences of his approval of our weak efforts to advance His cause by the means adopted by this Association.
