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OF THE

1811. NORTH DISTRICT ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS.

Held at Hopewell Meeting House, in the county of Woodford and State of Kentucky, on the 1st Saturday in August, in the year of our Lord 1811.

Brother David Chenault preached the Introductory Sermon from the Gospel of St. John, Chapter the 10th, verse 9th.

No messengers or letters received from the following six churches—viz: Poplar Run, Locust Creek, Tiger's Creek, Poplar Meeting-House, Burning Spring, East Fork of Flat Creek.

The association then chose brother Wilson Payne moderator, and brother Thomas Moseley, clerk.

Letters from corresponding associations were read and their messengers invited to seats—a letter from Elkhorn by their messengers, brethren Jacob Creath, Arthur Turner, John Killar, Thomas Bullock, Ambrose Bourne, Jeremiah Vardeman and Charles Buck—a letter from Bracken, but no messenger—a letter from Tate's creek by brother William Bush—a letter from South District by brother Gabriel Slaughter—a letter from Green River by brother Wm. Warder—a letter from Long Run by brethren John Taylor, John Scott, Joshua Rucker and James Bartlett.

A committee of brethren Jilson Payne, Robert Elkin, David Chenault, James French and Thomas Mosley to arrange the business for Monday. Brother James Mason appointed to write a corresponding letter to Elkhorn association—brother Daniel James to Bracken association—brother Tho. L. Patterson to Tate's creek association—brother Leonard Turley to Green River association—brother Robert Didlick to South District association, and brother James French to Long Run association.

Circular letter read and referred to the committee of arrangement.—Brethren Jeremiah Vardeman, John Taylor and Jacob Creath to preach to-morrow. The association then adjourned until Monday morning, 9 o'clock.

Monday morning the association met agreeable to adjournment and proceeded to take up the business in order, as arranged by the committee.—1st. *Providence* enquires, should churches invite strangers to preach, that are travelling through the country, calling themselves Baptist preachers, unless such can shew their authority? Answer—the association recommend to the churches in such cases to use caution, in inviting such preachers.

Circular letter read and approved and ordered to be printed with the minutes.

Corresponding letters read and approved and messengers appointed to bear them to each of the following associations—viz : To *Elkhorn*, brethren Isaac Croucher, Joseph Craig, Daniel James and Edward Trabue—to *Bracken*, brethren James Payne and John Jameson—to *Tate's Creek*, brethren Joseph Kelly and Ransdale Petty—to *South District*, brethren Robert Elkin, Robert Didlick, Joseph Craig and Edward Trabue—to *Green River*, brethren Leonard Turley, Richard Stephens and David Chenuault—to *Long Run*, brethren Robert Elkin, James Edwards, Isaac Croucher, Daniel James, Jessy Grady and Thomas Berry.

Brother James French to write a circular letter for the next association : brother Isaac Croucher to preach the introductory sermon at the next association, and in case of failure brother Ed-

and Kindred: brother Thomas Moseley to superintend the printing of the minutes : next association to be at Providence, Clarke county, on the first Saturday in August, 1812.

Circular Letter.

Dearly Beloved Brethren and Sisters,

FROM the foregoing table of churches, you will discover the loving kindness of the Lord, in visiting some of them with the gracious outpouring of his spirit; and as we, according to his promise, look for him to come again, a few observations on that tremendous day may not be amiss.
