RULES OF ORDER.

- 1. The Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen annually, by pallot, immediately after reading the letters and credentials, those of the former years continuing in office until the choice is made.
- 2. "Kerfoot's Parliamentary Practice" shall be the standard of rules by which the deliberations of the Association shall be governed.
- 3. The Clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings, taking care of the books and papers belonging to the Association, and furnish a copy of the Minutes of its transactions at each session for publication and distribution among the churches.
- 4. At every sitting business shall be opened and closed with prayer by the Moderator, or whomsoever he may request.
- 5. Corresponding members and ministers invited to a seat with the Association may debate, but shall not vote on any subject before it.
- 6. No member of the Association shall absent himself without leave of the Moderator.
- 7. No person shall speak more than once on any motion, until all others wishing to speak have spoken, unless by permission of the Association.
- 8. Arrangements for the next Association shall not be attended to on the first day of the session.
- 9. When two or more churches apply for the Association to be held with them, the one applying which has been the longest without it shall be entitled to it.
- 10. The Roll of Messengers shall be read the second and third day of the Association, and any Messenger known to have been present during the session shall be counted as present.
- 11. The basis of representation from the churches shall be two Messengers from each church, and an additional one for fifty members, and one for every fraction over twenty—and no one shall be eligible to a seat who is not a member of the church sending him.
- 12. The minutes shall be lessurely read and corrected, if necessary, before the rising of the Association.
- 13. These rules shall be distinctly read by the Clerk immediately after the organization of the Association.

PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

ELKHORN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

The One Hundred and Twenty-Fourth Session of the Elkhorn Baptist Association convened with the Midway Baptist Church, Midway, Ky., Tuesday morning, September 7, 1909. The body was called to order by the Moderator, Bro. J. R. Howard, at 10 o'clock. Songs, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" and "Come, Thou Almighty King." Devotional exercises led by Bro. J. M. Frost, of Nashville, Tenn. Song, "Amazing Grace, How Sweet the Sound." Scripture reading, Exodus third chapter. Prayer by Bro. Frost. Moved that we go into the election of officers.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

Moved and carried that the Cerk be instructed to east the vote of this body for Bro. J. R. Howard for Moderator. Moved and carried that the Clerk be instructed to east the vote of this body for Bro. B. F. Swindler, for Assistant Moderator. Moved and carried that Bro. R. W. Higgins be instructed to east the vote of this body for Bro. Malcom Thompson for Clerk and Treasurer.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

Report of Committee on Order of Business read by Bro. Swindler. Bro. Rucker moved as a substitute that we read the letters, which was lost, and the report was adopted.

Your committee appointed at your last session, beg leave to report as follows:

COMMITTEE ON DIGEST OF LETTERS.

Moved and carried that the time of the reports on Orphans' Home and Ministerial Aid be interchanged.

REPORT ON MINISTERS' AID.

Read by B. F. Swindler. Discussed by J. D. Maddox, B. F. Swindler. Adopted.

This Society has now attained its majority, having made its twentyfirst annual report to the General Association at Ashland last June. Its year closed May 31, 1909. In the time of its operation it has handled the goodly sum of \$94,923.02. During the past year the churches contributed \$5,592.63. Some of our best churches are found among the remaining seventeen which made no contributions last year. The amount distributed to the beneficiaries was \$2 600.45. While Rev. J. D. Maddex is the efficient Corresponding Secretary and Bro. C. L. Field is the Treasurer, the Society requests "send al! communications to the Baptist Minister's Aid Society, Owensooro, Ky." Let us make a note of this and govern ourselves accordingly. This society represents one of our broadest and most gracious benevolences. While its supreme object is to aid aged and indigent ministers, it includes also their widows, and incidentally their minor children. Hence it not only equals the Orphans' Home in its charlty, but surpasses it, inasmuch as it cares for a class more help ess than the orphan. The care of the orphan appeals to us not only for its relief but what it may become to society, and to the denomination; but the old minister has run his race, so what aid is extended is pure and unselfish charity, and an expression of gratitude for his labors of love. But our gratitude should be more abundant and abounding. The gift of the living ministry is among God's best gifts to man. We would recommend that every one of our churches include this society as one of its annual objects to contribute to. And to this end we further recommend that each church have a standing committee to look after the work, and with whom the Society can correspond, and through whom information can be given our churches. We would arge our pastors to make special mention of the Society in every wise worthy the confidence and contributions of our people. Let Elkhorn Association rise in the majesty of her power and do her whole duty by this nob'e and most gracious charity. Respectfully submitted.

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

Moved that Prof. W. J. McGlothlin be requested to address the body on "Ministerial Education." Adopted.

There was a time when Baptists did not have an educated ministry. Let us thank God that this can no longer be said of us. The standard of the ministry within our ranks is as high as that in any other religious body on earth. But we need more preachers and more money with which to educate them. The growth of the denomination demands a corresponding growth in the number and efficiency of our ministers. This means larger endowment and a larger outlay of expense to meet the ever increasing demand. It is a well-known fact that not many young men from rich homes enter the ministry. As a rule, the young men who respond to God's call to preach the gospel come from families which have not been blessed abundantly with this world's good's, and therefore are not financially able to pay their way unided through the college and seminary courses. It is the duty of our Baptist people to aid these worthy young men and to support the institutions where they are educated in order that our preachers may be trained for the very best service possible.

Your committee would call special attention to the effort now being made to endow a chair of Sunday-school Pedagogy in our Seminary at Louisville. The Sunday-school Board at Nashville, the founder of this chair, proposes to give one dollar for every two dollars given by the Sunday-schools of the South up to the point where the Sunday-school Board has given \$20,000 and the Sunday-schools of the South have given \$40,000, making in all \$60,000. We would urge that everywhere our people take up this matter and show their appreciation of the Board's generous offer and carry the work through to a glorious victory.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

Read by Bro. R. K. Kelley. Discussed by Bros. Kelley and Harris. Adopted.

God has graciously blessed our Home Mission work during the past year. We spent within the bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention, \$302,860.74; built and repaired 368 houses of worship, helped support 24 mountain schools, received into our membership 25.109 by baptism and 22.669 by letter.

Kentucky with 216,031 Baptists, 1,738 churches and 76 District Associations gave \$23,641.39 or ten cents per capita. She holds fourth place in contributions and seventh place in per capita of contributions, with her sister states. Our Elkhorn Association gave \$1231, entitling her to second place with her sister associations. This is very good, but we must do better in order to meet our apportionment next year and the great demands of the work and wonderful blessings of our Lord will lead us to do better.

When we consider our frontier work, our mountain work, and our city mission work, we can scarcely think of a more complex, difficult and far reaching work than that of Home Missions. It is of supreme importance that we enter the door of opportunity, which is now open and endeavor to Christianize this mixed mass of humanity for God and the Baptists. One hundred dollars given to-day will do more than a thousand five years hence. May the Lord of our great missionary enterprises enable us to "lift up our eyes and behold the fields already white unto harvest."

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Read by Bro. B. A. Dawes. Adopted.

Your committee can make an encouraging report for the past year.

I. The Workers and Their Work.

We now have on the foreign fields 231 missionaries, 98 ordained natives and 277 unordained native helpers, making a total working force of 606. There are 259 organized churches and 559 outstations. Of these 14 churches are self-sustaining. The membership in foreign fields is now 16,596, which is an increase of more than 2,000 over last year. The number baptized last year was 2,905 as compared with 2,174 for the previous year, an increase of nearly 40 per cent. This shows the greatest fruitage in the history of the Board. In addition, Southern Baptists have in the foreign fields 142 schools and colleges, and eight theological seminaries. The number of students in these schools is 3,864. A number of consecrated physicians and other Christian helpers are conducting a number of hospitals, and through these the hearts of the people are being opened in favor of the Christian missionaries. Last year 42,959 persons were treated by our medical forces in foreign lands.

H. The Financial Record.

Southern Eaptists gave to the Foreign Mission work last year \$460,797.62 as against \$402.328.16 the year before, an increase of more than \$58,000. Of this amount Kentucky Baptists gave \$37,527.54, an increase over the year before of \$2,500. Of this amount Dr. Powell's report shows that the Baptists of Elkhern Association gave for this work \$1,855.30. This is the thind largest amount given by any Association in the state. When we consider the size of this Association and the material resources we ought at least to be second.

- III. Recommendations.
- 1. That prayer for this work be offered earnestly in all the churches.
- 2. That the paster and messengers of each church lay this work on the hearts of the individual members, and that they make a personal appeal to each member for a gife to this worthy cause.
- 3. Following the suggestion of the Foreign Board we recommend that a committee be appointed by this body to apportion among the churches the \$2,400 that this Association has been asked to raise for the work during the current year

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Read by Bro. J. W. Ponter. Discussed by Bros. Shout Prather, Hibbs, G. H. Nunnellev and J. W. Porter. Adopted.

With gratitude to God and congratulations to the brethren we are enabled to report the greatest year in the history of the State Mission work. We believe that our people are coming to realize their obligations to evangelize this great commonwealth. The work of this Board during the past year has resulted in 3,893 conversions and 3,318 baptisms. Total additions to the church, 4,864. Total amount of money by workers for all purposes \$49,916.41. While the work of the year has been gratifying, yet it is by no means what it should have been. When we consider the fact that there are 50,000 more Baptists in Kentucky than all other Christians combined, and possessing, too, our proportionate part of the wealth, it is evident that a great and growing responsibility rests upon us. The bequest of Theodore Harris, of Louisville, of a large portion of his estate as a permanent Building Fund, will it is believed, result in the building of not less than 100 Baptist churches a year. Trusting in the promises of God and going forth in the full measure of our duty, what may not the 221,000 Baptists do in the coming year! Your committee would therefore urge increased contributions for the work of this Board. Our Secretary, Bro. W. D. Powell, is deserving of great praise for his untiring labors in this behalf. J. W. LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE BOARD TO THE ASSOCIATION.

Dear Brethren:

Your Executive Board feels very much encouraged in the reports that come to us in the work done, and we are thankful to our Heavenly Father for the wonderful gifts to us through our brethren in giving us their prayers and means to do the work. You will see by the report from Bryan Station, Sadieville and other places which we have given aid, what has been done, and we hope in the near future to see some of them self-sustaining. Quite a number of the churches have not given anything to missions through the Board, especially for State Missions. The contributions to State Building Fund have increased largely. REPORT ON STATE OF CHURCHES AND MISSIONS, ETC. REPORT ON SUNDAY-SCHOOLS TO THE ELKHORN ASSOCIATION, MIDWAY, KY., SEPTEMBER 9, 1909.

A comparison with the report of last year reveals some interesting, and in some respects, encouraging facts. Number of schools last year, 30; this year 31, a gain of 1. Total number of officers and teachers last year, 237; this year 241, a gain of 4. Total number of scholars enrolled last year, 3,161; this year 3279, a gain of 128. Number of conversions from the S. S. last year, 82; this year 167, a gain of 85.

We believe that there is no more effective means of extending the Master's Kingdom than through the Sunday-school; for through it the Word of God is taught and preached, souls are saved characters are formed, and Eves are trained in service for the King.

Realizing the vast opportunities for Sunday-school work by our churches of this Association, your committee beg leave to recommend that during the coming year we assume a more aggressive attitude toward the Sunday-school situation, encourage a more thorough preparation of our teaching force, and seek to establish other Sunday-schools in destitute districts, and above all else strive for the salvation of the lost, looking to the Lord Jesus for grace and leadership.

We wish further to commend the work of our Sunday school Board at Nashville and recommend its literature as sufficient for every need in our Sunday-schools. We would also call attention to the Teacher Training Department which is now being conducted by that Board, and urge that our pastors, superintendents and teachers see that some work of this kind be done in our Sunday-schools that we may in the future have a better equipped teaching force.

Your committee heartily commends the following:

- 1. The Summer Assembly, which is held at Georgetown annually in June.
- 2. The work of T. J. Watts, our Corresponding Secretary of the State, for the most efficient services he rendered us.
- 3. The literature published by the Sunday-school Board which meets all the demands for the training of our young people. It is well adapted to promote denominational loyaky, growth in grace and Bible knowledge.

- 1. That the pastors and messengers of this Association give their loyal support to the organization of a B. Y. P. U. in each church of our Association.
- 2. That this entire Association take interest enough to have the annual assembly at Georgetown become "state wide" in power for the development of our young people.

These children are compelled to have food raiment, education and religious training. O, loving hearts, that beat so tender and true for the little ones of your small family circles, will you not hear and heed the call to visit and aid the orphans in their need, for "Thou art the helper of the fatherless"?

We recommend that all our churches cheerfully co-operate in supporting this institution by making annual contributions in money, provisions, and clothing. If possible, visit the home and see the children and Miss Abercrombie, the lovely and beloved matron, and by all means subscribe for the Orphans' Friend, their monthly paper. REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

Read by Bro. Clarke. Discussed by Bros. Clarke and Frost. Adopted,

"If the Lord be for us who can be against us? Let the rulers take counsel together against the Lord, but He that sitteth in the heavens shall laugh; He shall have them in derision." The liquor traffic, Pharaoh-like, has heard the heaven-born demand, "Let My people go," and the allies of Bacchus no longer ask "Who is the Lord that we should obey His voice to let His people go?" They are recognizing as never before that there is a God in heaven, and

that He will not keep His anger forever.

When the Canaanites had fulfilled their days of iniquity, and were to be driven from the land of milk and honey, the divine command to Joshua was "Have I not commanded thee?" Be strong and of good courage, be not afraid. neither be thou dismayed, for the Lord thy God is with thee." No terms of peace, no quarters, no collabitation, no mercy, but annihilation was the command. In this we are taught that destruction precedes construction in the service of God and humanity. Even the Law of God was manifested to destroy the works of the devil, and as no drunkard shall inherit the kingdom of heaven certainly the liquor traffic is the work of the devil and should be de-True "the wicked fleeth when no man pursueth," but he always makes better time, some one has said, when somebody is after him. Demonslike the liquor dealers, cry "Let us alone," but, Jesus-like, the temperance people continue to cast them out. Let Marse Henry rave, and his followers imagine a vain thing; it may be that by this craft they have their wealth. and they must needs cry, "Great is Diana of the Ephesians."

Prohibition is no longer an experiment. It has been demonstrated that both local and state-wide probibition does prohibit. This is evidenced by the following facts: The liquor dealers are fearful as to its results; the great magazines and dailies are advocating regulation or extermination of the liquor traffic, and the politicians and political parties are at least taking notice of this mighty deliverer of the people from the open saloon. We register our protest against the invitation extended by the Louisville Board of Trade to the liquor dealers of the south to locate in Kentucky. We are assured that the Kentucky people, as a whole do not want them. That this uncircumcised Phillistine may speedily be driven from our state and nation, we express our earnest desire that the Prohibition Party, the Anti-Saloon League, the W. C. T. U. and all other temperance forces unite and co-operate as far as possible in the worthy cause to which they are all called—the destruction of the liquor traffic. We close as we began by quoting from Paul, "If God be for us who can be against us?" There can be no doubt that the Lord is with us in this fight, therefore those who are against temperance are against God. But who has ever oppes d God and prespered? Did Pharaoh? Did Herod? Let us pray that the Lord may open the eyes of the liquor people before it is too late. The Lord help us to hate the liquor traffic, but love the unfortunate dealers and consumers

institutions, as well as other schools, are seeking larger endowments. We commend them to our people and heartily endorse their appeal for funds. We earnestly advise and urge all Baptists everywhere to patronize and support their own schools, and whatever else they may have to forego, not to neglect the education of their children.
