Rules of Decorum,

1st—The \triangle ssociation should begin and end with prayer by the Moderator. 2nd— \triangle Moderator and Clerk to be chosen of our body.

3rd—One person only shall speak at a time, who shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator and then speak.

4th—The person up shall not, while speaking, be interrupted by any one except the Moderator, nor shall the Moderator interrupt any member nor prevent his speaking until he gives his light on the subject, until he shall violate the rules of decorum.

5th—The speaker shall strictly adhere to the subject and shall in no wise reflect on the imperfections of the persons that spoke before him, but shall fairly state the case and convey his ideas as near as he can.

6th-No member shall abruptly absent nimself from the Association without leave from the Moderator.

7th-No person can speak more than three times on any subject, nor more than five minutet at a time without leave from the Association.

8th-No person shall have the liberty of laughing or whispering during business or public speaking in the Association.

9th-No member of the Association shall address another by any other appellation than that of Brother.

10th—The names of several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called over as often as the Association shall require.

PINK KNOT, KY., OCT. 7, 1904.

The West Union Associatian of United Baptists met this day in its thirtyfifth annual session with Pine Knot church. Devotionol exercises were conducted by the moderator.

Time 2nd Saturday of May, 1905, and each church composing this body is requested to organize a Sunday School and the moderators of the churches are especially requested to look after the interest of said schools and report to convention in 1905.

Committee on Resolutions reported. Report read adopted and committee discharged.

Committee on Finance reported \$2.50 delegates expenses and \$29.19 for printing. Total, \$31.69

Ordered that we have 1,200 copies of the proceedings of this association printed, that the clerk superintend the printing and distribution of the same and that he be allowed \$7.00 for his services. Reserve 100 copies for corresponding associations.

Resolutions.

1. Resolved, That there shall be no ecclesiastical power used in this association.

2. Resolved, That all questions coming before this body for its consideration shall be by motion attended by a second. All questions shall be open for debate.

3. Resolved, That we advise each church to limit its delegates to three of the lay members, ministers not limited.

4. Resolved, That we advise our churches not to send delegates that are members of other churches.

5. Resolved, That we advise our churches not to allow the doctrine of apostasy, modern sanctification advocated in their churches, school houses or homes.

6. Resolved, That we advise our churches to abstain from dealing in intoxicating drinks, and election bribery in any form, box suppers or anything that is not according to the word of God.

7. Be it further Resolved, That this body return sincere thanks to Pine Knot church and the entire community for their generous hospitality and tender regard for our comfort during our stay with them.

Minutes of today's proceedings read and received. The session was har-

monious. One of the most pleasant and we hope one of the most profitable for many years.

IS IT WISE?

WE HAVE been informed that there are Baptist Sunday schools which have yielded to the solicitations, personal and otherwise, of an undenominational publishing house, and which are taking, in whole or in part, the literature of that house in preference to the literature of their own Publication Society. In view of this information we desire to put the question, *Is it wise?* to pastors, Sunday school officers and teachers who may have been thus influenced.

Is it wise to put into the hands of Baptist children and youth a literature which in some parts is largely sensational, in other parts directly opposed to Baptist teaching, and in no part clearly and positively declarative of our distinctive denominational views? What sort of Baptists will the next generation be if the youth of this generation are brought up on a merely negative or an essentially Pedobaptist literature, and are not taught in the Sunday school the truths for which our fathers were ready to suffer and which form the only ground for our denominational existence? And how are young people to be brought to Christ and developed into stalwart Christians, if the aim in the literature employed is mainly to gratify a craving for the sensational and not to instruct and fortify against errors in doctrine and life?
