♦MINUTES.♥

The East Union Association of United Baptists met this day with the above named church in its second annual session, and after prayer by Elder S. Stanfill, the annual sermon was delivered by Eld. James A. Ingram, from Revelations, 22nd chap, and 8th verse. The Moderator of last session being present, called the Association to order for business and appointed S. S. Smith and J. R. Foley as a committee on credentials and enrollment. By motion, G. T. Hill was made temporary clerk; then received letlers and delegates from the following churches set forth in the table of statistics. (See table of statistics.) On invitation being given for admission of new churches, received a letter from the First Baptist Church of Kensee, Ky., by the hands of Brother Wm. Bryant; also one from Sulphur Spring Church, by the hands of Elder E. Allen and Jesse Walden, who were received and invited to seats with us and the right hand of fellowship was extended. Received Maple Creek Church under the order of South Union Association of its last annual session, received it as a member of our body by the hands of Elder G. T. Hill; then proceeded by private ballot to elect officers for the ensuing year, whereupon Elder J. A. Ingram was chosen Moderator, Elder S. Stanfill assistant and G. T. Hill Secretary and J. R. Foley assistant. The Moderator appointed the following committee to draft an order of business: J. G. Stanfill, J. W. Joues, M. Vandipool, S. Stanfill, Wm. Wells, John McVey, Wm. H. Bryant, Jesse Walden, G. T. Hill, N. Lawson A. Beard, I A. Partin and C. W. Freeman, who reported the following: 1st. Annual sermon. 2nd. Committee on Credentials and Enrollment. 3rd. Reception of New Churches. 4th. Election of Officers. 5th. Correspondence. 6th. Resolutions 7th. Committee on Divine Service. 8th. Committee on Home Missions. 9th. Committee on Foreign Missions. 10th. Committee on State Missions. 11th. Committee on Destitutions. 12th. Committee on Sabbath Schools. 13th. Committee on Education. 14th. Committee on Orphans' Home. 15th. Committee on Ministers' Aid Society. 16th. Committee on Literature. 17th. Executive Board. 18th. To select place of next annual meeting. 19th. S. Stanfill and J. A. Ingram, the Moderator, proceeded to appoint committees as

On motion, it is ordered that our next annual meeting be held with Clear Fork Church, one mile East of Saxton, Ky., commencing on Thursday before the first Saturday in September, 1893. On motion, it is ordered that we now adjourn till to-morrow morning 9 clock A. M. Prayer by C. W. Freeman.

Friday morning, met pursuant to adjournment. Reading and prayer by A. Beard. The Moderator called the Association to order. Report on Foreign Missions read and received and commit-

tee discharged.

Report on Foreign Missions: While our home field embraces many thousand souls in need of the Gospel, our foreign field embraces a great many more who are dying for the Gospel and we recommend that some steps be taken to assist in the dissemination and spread of the Gospel.

Report of committee on Education called for and received the following report: We, your committee on Education would recommend the Baptist Institute at Williamsburg, Ky., and the College at Georgetown, Ky., as good schools for the advancement of both primary and higher branches of education.

Report on Sabbath Schools read and received as follows: We, of your committee on Sabbath Schools, find in the bounds of our Association fifteen Sunday Schools with an average attendance of 357 students, and an enrollment of 617 pupils, with 72 officers and teachers, and there has been expended for literature and other expenses \$56.40, and there has been forty pupils bap-

tized, and we recommend that there be a vigorous and earnest effort made in the interest of Sabbath Schools.

Report on Baptist Ministers' Aid Society: We believe the Baptist Ministers' Aid Society of Kentucky is a noble institution, for the relief of our beloved and broken down ministers, and should meet the approbation of all and the hearty support of all.

Ordered that the rules be suspended and that a contribution be taken up for the Ministers' Aid Society, and \$3,80 was collected.

The following report on literature was read and received: We recommend as good sound literature the Western Recorder, published at Louisville, Ky., and Ford's Christian Reporter, a home journal published by S. H. Ford, St. Louis.

On metion it is ordered that we correspond by letter and delegation with North Concord, South Union, Mt. Zion, and Lynn Camp Associations, and the following brethren volunteer to bear the letters: To North Concord, T. E. Williams; to South Union, S. Stanfill and P. B. Stanfill; to Mt. Zion, J. A. Ingram; to Lynn Camp, Bro. Cobb. J. A. Ingram was appointed to represent East Union Association in the General Association of Baptist at Covington, Ky., and Elder S. Stanfill to represent us in the Southern Baptist Convention, Nashville, Tenn. Elder S. Stanfill was selected to preach the next annual sermon and Elder I. Lawson his alternate.

Report of committee on Destitution: We find six churches in the bounds of East Union Association without any ordained minister belonging to them; we also find south of the Pine mountain a large territory almost destitute of the Gospel, and seeing the necessity of the Gospel being preached in that boundary of our Association, we advise that some steps be taken to send forth some efficient preacher as an evangelist to evangelize the bounds.

CONSTITUTION OF EAST UNION ASSOCIATION

EXHIBIT A.

ARTICLE 1. This body shall be called East Union Association of United Baptists, and shall be composed of churches of the United Baptist faith and order.

ARTICLE 2. Each church composing this body shall be entitled to representation, with one vote for every twenty members, or fraction thereof.

ARTICLE 3. This body shall meet annually according to adjournment.

- ART. 4. This body, at each annual meeting, shall elect by private ballot, a Moderator and Assistant Moderator; a clerk and Assistant Clerk, whose duties shall be such as custom imposes on such officers.
- ART. 5. The business of this body shall be for the advacement and growth of Christ's Kingdom among all the churches of this body or elsewhere. Planing and advising and using all lawful and necessary means in our power to build up new churches in destitute neighborhoods; assisting the weak churches and building them up in the most Holy faith.
 - ART. 6. This body shall exercise no ecclesiastical authority.
- ART. 7. This body may appoint a committee to carry out or perform any business under Article 5.
- ART. 8. This body shall be constituted by and with messengers and delegates from the different churches belonging to this Association.
- ART. 9. New churches will be received by a vote of the delegates present, upon approved evidence of their United Baptis faith and principles. A mjority shall rule.
- ART. 10. Visiting brethren of the same faith and order will be invited to seats with us, and allowed the liberty of speech, but not to vote.
- ART. 11. This Constitution may be altered or amended, except Article 6, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present, after notice having been given at its previous annual meeting

- ART. 12. No member shall speak more than twice upon any one subject without leave of the Association. All speakers restricted to five minutes, unless time is extended by order of the Association.
- ART. 13. Members wishing to speak shall arise and address the Moderator with brotherly respect, and await recognition from him, and then speak. Any brother, having received recognition from the chair, is entitled to the floor, undisturbed, while his five minutes lasts, if he does not digress from the subject on which he is speaking. Members shall call no brother by any other appellation but that of Brother.
- ART. 14. Any brother may arise to a point of order, if any brother digress from the subject on which he is speaking. Question of privilege.
- ART. 15. A motion with a second is before the Association for action, unless another is made to amend, then the amendment is for action, afterwards the original.
- ART. 16. No member shall absent himself from the house during the business hours, without leave of the Moderator.
- ART. 17. All whispering and laughing strictly forbidden during business hours.
- ART. 18. Two members arrising and addressing the Moderator at the same time, both claiming the floor, the one fartherist from the Moderator shall be entitled to the floor first and the other next.
- ART. 19. This Association may withdraw its fellowship from any church in its bounds for a violation or departure from the United Baptist faith and practice.
- ART. 20. The Chair, having decided any question which is thought to be contrary to the constitution of United Baptist faith, any brother may appeal from his decission to to that of the house.
- ART. 21. On each morning at the opening of the Association there shall be given one hour, or such less time as is necessary, to the offering of resolutions and such new business as is necessary.
- ART. 22. If the Moderator fails to exact the rules of this Constitution in the trasaction of business, any member of this Association may move him to order, if he fails to exact said rules, the Assistant Moderator shall take the Chair.

It is ordered that this Association adopt Mell's Parliamentary Practice for our guide in the transaction of the business of our Association.
