

Constitution of East Union Association.



ARTICLE 1. This body shall be called the East Union Association of United Baptists, and shall be composed of churches of the United Baptist faith and order.

ART. 2. Each church composing this body shall be entitled to representation, with one vote for every twenty members or fraction thereof.

ART. 3. This body shall meet annually according to adjournment.

ART. 4. This body at each annual meeting shall elect, by private ballot, a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk, whose duties shall be such as custom imposes on such officers.

ART. 5. The business of this body shall be for the advancement and growth of Christ's Kingdom among all the churches of this body or elsewhere, planning and advising and using all lawful and necessary means in our power to build up new churches, and building them up in the most holy faith.

ART. 6. This body shall exercise no ecclesiastical authority.

ART. 7. This body may appoint a committee to carry out or perform any business under Article 5.

ART. 8. This body shall be constituted by and with messengers and delegates from the different churches belonging to this Association.

ART. 9. New churches shall be received by a vote of the delegates present, upon approved evidence of their United Baptist faith and principles. A majority rules.

ART. 10. Visiting brethren of same faith and order will be invited to seats with us and allowed the liberty of speech, but not to vote.

ART. 11. The Constitution may be altered or amended, except Article 6, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present, after notice having been given at its previous annual meeting.

ART. 12. No member shall speak more than twice upon any one subject without leave of the Association. Chairmen of committees are given ten minutes, all others five, unless time is extended by the Association.

ART. 13. Members wishing to speak shall arise and address the Moderator with brotherly respect and await recognition from him, and then speak. Any brother, having received recognition from the chair, is entitled to the floor, undisturbed, while his five minutes last if he does not digress from the subject on which he is speaking. Members shall call no brother by any other appellation than that of Brother.

ART. 14. Any brother may arise to a point of order if any brother digress from the subject on which he is speaking, question of privilege.

ART. 15. A motion with a second is before the Association for action unless another is made to amend; then the amendment is for action, afterwards the original.

ART. 16. No member shall absent himself from the house during the business hours without leave of the Moderator.

ART. 17. All whispering and laughing strictly forbidden during business hours.

ART. 18. Two members arising and addressing the Moderator at the same time, both claiming the floor, the one farthest from the Moderator shall be entitled to the floor first and the other next.

ART. 19. This Association may withdraw its fellowship from any church in its bounds for a violation or departure from the United Baptist faith and practice.

ART. 20. The Chair, having decided any question which is thought to be contrary to the Constitution of the United Baptist faith, any brother may appeal from his decision to that of the house.

ART. 21. On each morning at the opening of the Association there shall be given one hour, or such less time as is necessary, to the offering of resolutions and such new business as is necessary.

ART. 22. If the moderator fails to exact the rules of this Constitution in the transaction of business, any member of this Association may move him to order. If he fails to exact such rules, the Assistant Moderator shall take the chair.

It is ordered that this Association adopt Mell's Parllamentary Practice for our guide in the transaction of the business of our Association.

PROCEEDINGS.

First Day, September 14th, 1898.

The East Union Association of United Baptists met this day in its Eighth Annual Session, and at 10 a.m. was called to order by Bro. S. Stanfill, Moderator of last year.

Devotional exercises consisted of singing, by Association, "I Need Thee Every Hour," reading of the 2nd and 10th Psalms, and prayer by Wm. B. McGarity.

Eld. Isham Lawson, who was elected to preach the Introductory Sermon being absent, the Association ordered that the sermon be preached to-night at 7:30.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

(Discussed by W. B. McGarity, B. E. Parker, J. L. Reaves, P. L. Mahan, P. B. Stanfill.)

The most glorious work man ever engaged in is saving souls. Since Christ came his Gospel has spread, until now the isles of the sea as well as the continents are becoming His. Formerly the question was, will the nations be open so we can preach to them the Gospel? But God has opened every country. The Gospel preacher is not only protected, but welcomed in China, Africa and nearly everywhere else. Recently God has placed in our hands Cuba, Porto Rico and the Philippine Islands—seventeen million ignorant people, as bad or worse than heathen. We have missionaries in China, Japan, Africa, Italy, Mexico, Brazil. Seventy-six missionaries and one hundred and seventeen native assistants are laboring in these countries. The Lord gave us 701 conversions and baptisms last year.

We rejoice to see an increased interest among our members in missions. Five churches report contributions this year. We hope that next year every church will give something. Our noble Secretary, Brother R. J. Wallingham, says that ninety-two cents on every dollar sent to him goes to our missionaries. The Baptists of the South gave last year \$124,249.69.

We suggest that our fifth Sunday meetings be continued, and Foreign Missions be made a prominent feature.

Only six churches in our Association reported schools last year and nine this year. We suggest that every church organize a school, and that they use the lesson helps printed by the Baptist Sunday School at Nashville, Tenn.

REPORT ON ORPHANS' HOME.

(Spoken to by Thomas Owens.)

We, your Committee on Orphans' Home, beg leave to report the following: Our Baptist Orphans' Home, located at Louisville, Ky., is doing a good work taking care of and finding homes for the Baptist orphans in the State. Twenty-eight years ago Miss Mary Hollingsworth was called to this work. The Home was started with but three orphans, who with their matron took up their abode in a rented house. Since that time 1,015 children from the State at large have homes, 305 from the city. Of those given out, fourteen were adopted and fifteen appren-

ticed. In either case the child is to be educated and treated as if born into the family. There are at present eighty-eight children in the Home who are depending on the gifts from the church for bread and clothing. We ask each church in the East Union Association to make a special offering to the Home at once, and send same to Miss Mary Hollingsworth, the present matron.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

(Spoken to by Ingram, Owens, Stanfill, Mahan and Bird.)

Because of the constant scenes of intemperance there is danger that we become insensible of the great evil of drink and our duty respecting this curse. There are few communities, churches or homes among us which have not directly or indirectly felt the power of this evil. Every day we see examples which show that strong drink is the enemy of everything that is good and the promoter of everything that is bad. Is it not time that we should all become concerned about this agency which is abroad in our land and which destroys more lives and causes more suffering than all other evils?

Shall we remain silent and inactive while the enemy, strong drink, is destroying the youth of our land? We would urge upon our churches to warn the tempted, to advise those who are being led astray, and after using our influence to check them, to withdraw fellowship from those who visit saloons, or those who manufacture or sell, or those who in any way aid in making or selling of strong drink.

Our Home Mission Board, located at Atlanta, Ga., with Rev. I. T. Tichenor Secretary, is working in our cities, on the frontier, among the negroes, the Indians in the mountains and among the foreigners. Nearly every section of the South teels the work of this Board. Last year \$54,050.41 was given for this work. Our Association gave \$10.02.

The Board is taking steps to open work in all parts of Cuba and Porto Rico. They ask for \$50,000 for this purpose. May the Lord stir upon hearts to take part in this great work.

After singing How Firm a Foundation, we were dismissed by Brother Owens.


