## CONSTITUTION OF THE GENERAL ASSOCIATION,

ARTICLE 1. This body shall be called the GENERAL ASSOCIATION OF BAPTIETS IN KENIUCKY

ART. 2 This Association shall be composed of representatives from such Baptist Churches and Associations as are in regular standing.

ART 3. Every Church and Association contributing annually to the funds of this Association, shall be entitled to a representation.

ART. 4. This Association shall, in a special manner, aim to promote, by every legitimate means, the prosperity of the cause of God in this State.

ART. 5. It is distinctly understood, that this Association shall have no ecclesi. astical authority.

ART. 6. At each meeting of this Association, there shall be elected, by ballot. a Moderator, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, and fifty Managers, (five of whom shall be a quorum,) who shall constitute a Board of Directors for the management of all the business of this Association, during the recess of its Annual Meetings, and annually report to the same their pioceedings. Aur. 7. The Moderator, Secretaries, and Treasurer, shall perform the duties

usually performed by such officers in similar Associations.

ART 8. All Associations contributing to this, and co-operating in its designs, shall be considered auxiliary to it.

ART. 9. A General Agent may be appointed by the Association or Board of Managers, whose duty it shall be to survey all the destitution, the means of supply, &c., and report regularly to the Board, so as to enable them to meet the wants of the destitute. He shall also raise funds, and in every practical way promote the designs of the Association; for which he shall receive a reasonable support.

ALT. 10. Any visiting brethren, in good standing, as such, shall be entitled to sit in counsel in the Annual Sessions of this Association, but shall not have the right to vote.

ART. 11. The Annual Meetings of this Association shall be on Saturday before the 3d Lord's day in Uctober.

ART. 12. This Constitution may be amended or altered, (the 5th Article excepted,) at any annual meeting, by a concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Constitution of the Kentucky and Foreign Bible Society.

ART. 1. This Society shall be called THE KENTUCKY AND FOREIGN BIBLE Soci-ETY, Auxiliary to the American and Foreign Bible Society.

ART. 2. All persons contributing annually to the funds, shall be members of the Society.

ART. 3. Each contributor of thirty dollars or more, shall be a member for life. ART. 4. Life Directors and life members of the parent Society shall be, ex-officio, members of this. ART 5. All Churches and Societies agreeing to place their surplus funds In

the Treasury of this Society, shall be Auxiliaries, and their representatives be enti-

tled to the privilage of members. ART. 6. The funds of this Society, after a deduction of incidental expenses, shall be appropriated, through the American and Foreign Bible Society, as this Society may direct.

ART. 7. This Society shall annually elect a President, four Vice Presidents, a Recording and Corresponding Secretary, and Board of Managers, consisting of twenty members, all of whom shall te brethren in good standing in Baptist Churches, fifteen of them to reside in or near Louisville, and who shall hold their offices until superseded by a new election.

ART. 8. The President, Vice President, and Secretaries, shall be, ex-officio, members of the Board.

ART. 9. The Roard of Managers shall meet quarterly, or more frequently if necessary, at such time and place as they shall adjourn to, or at the call of the President or Secretary, and five members shall be a quorum.

ART. 10. The Board of Managers shall be charged with all business of the Society, during their appointment, and shall make a report at each annual meeting. They shall enact their own By-laws and fill such vacancies as may occur in their own body.

ART. 11. The Society shall hold its annual meetings at the same time and place of the annual meeting of the General Association of Baptists in Kentucky.

Акт. 12. The Minutes shall be signed by the President and Secretaries. ART. 13. No alteration shall be made in the Constitution, except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at an annual meeting.

## SEVENTH ANNUAL MEETING

OF THE

#### GENERAL ASSOCIATION OF BAPFISTS IN KENTUCKY.

The seventh annual meeting was held with the Baptist Church in HEN-DERSON, on Saturday, October 19th, 1844.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Rev. T. G. Keen, of Hopkinsville, from Isaiah 52, 1.

The annual report of the Board was read, stating that Rev. J. M. Frost, of Georgetown, had acted as General Agent for eight months, his plan of operation being most happily calculated to secure efficiency and permanency. Instead of merely taking collections after public addresses, personal application had been made, and subscriptions obtained for five successive This renders an annual visit to the same churches unnecessary, and vears. also enables the Board to form an estimate of its income for the ensuing The agent obtained in twenty churches, subscriptions amounting to year. six hundred and thirty-two dollars, for five successive years, making an aggregate of three thousand one hundred and sixty dollars. The subscriptions are due the first Saturday in September, annually. The agent collected, after public addresses, &c., one hundred and sixty-seven dollars, and also received three hundred and sixteen dollars of the subscription due Sept. 1844, making \$483 obtained in cash, and leaving \$300 due in good subscriptions. 'The agent travelled 1500 miles, preached 105 sermons, made 36 missionary speeches, and aided in protracted meetings at Danville, Bardstown, Burlington and East Hickman. The agent obtained ministerial labor, to be expended among the destitute, to the amount of \$145 for five years, making \$725. The agent thus obtained in cash, subscriptions and ministerial labor, the sum of four thousand and fifty-three dollars. A salary of \$750 per annum was voted to the agent, but he generously refused to accept any thing more than the amount actually paid out on account of his agency, thus making a donation of his services!

The Board also acknowledged the donation of 75,000 pages of tracts from the American Tract Society.

The Treasurer's report was read and adopted.

A letter was read from the Corresponding Secretary of the American Indian Mission Association, and referred to the following committee : Rev. W. C. Buck, Rev. S. Baker, and Rev. W. F. Nelson. The committee reported, and recommended the following resolutions, which were adopted.

Resolved, That the cheering intelligence received from the missionaries of the American Indian Mission Association, and the general favor with which the Society has been received by the churches, especially in the west and south, afford gratifying evidence that God is favoring the enterprise. Resolved. That we regard it as having peculiar claims upon western christians, and that it is well calculated to bring up the churches in this great valley to the great work of benevolent effort, and we therefore commend it to the prayerful and pecuniary support of all that desire the universal prevalence of the Gospel-

A letter was read from the Corresponding Secretary of the American Baptist Publication Society, which was referred to the following committee :-Rev. T. S. Malcom, Rev. S. Baker, and Rev. W. Morrison. The committee reported and offered the following resolutions, which were adopted.

Resolved, That we cordially approve of the objects of the American Baptist Publication Society, and recommend it to the patronage of the Baptist churches in this State.

Resolved, That we recommend to the churches to make their pastors life mem-Resolved, That we recommend to the churches to make ther pastors file mem-bers of the Publication Society, by the payment of twenty dollars, one-half of which will be returned, if desired, in the publications of the Society. *Resolved*, That we recommend to each Association the formation of a Book fund, for the circulation of the publications of the Society within their bounds. *Resolved*, That we recommend Bro. A. B. Harris to the brethren of this State, as

an agent and colporteur of the Publication Society.

The following resolution was offered by Rev. J. M. Frost, and unanimously adopted :

Resolved, That we recommend the following plan to secure funds for the permanent and regular action of the Association-1st: That pledges be taken from individuals in each church, as far as practicable, running through five years. This will combine the churches in harmonious action; increase the zeal i the churches will combine the churches in harmonious action; increase the 2ear 1 the churches for the General Association, by giving them to feel that they have a common in-terest in the work; train them to regular effort to spread the Gospel, and save a great deal of the agent's time. 2d: That an annual collection be taken in each church, when the pledges become due, for the purposes of the General Associa-tion. 3d: That a collection be taken on Sabbath at each of our district associa-tions, as far as practicable, for the same purpose. 4th: That a mblic collection be taken on the Sabbath at each meeting of the General Association.

Notice was taken of the death of our beloved brethren in ministry, Rev. A. G. Curry, of Shelbyville, and Rev. P. Warder, of Russellville.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks of this Association are hereby tendered to Rev. Thomas S. Malcom, for the care and labor beslow d in the compilation and publication of our Minutes.

The following resolution was offered by Rev. W. F. Nelson, Agent of the Western Baptist Theological Institute, and adopted:

Resolved, That we regard the cause of education, and especially that of the Christian ministry, as lying at the foundation of all our benevolent efforts, and we therefore heartily rejoice in the prosperity and prospects of Georgetown College, and the Western Baptist Theological Institute, at Covington.

It was voted that the Treasurer pay to Rev. T. L. Garrett forty-five dollars, the balance due him.

A vote of thanks to the brethren and citizens of Henderson, for their kindness and hospitality, was unanimously passed.

It was voted that the next annual meeting be held in GEORGETOWN, on Saturday, Oct. 18th, 1845; and that the Introductory Sermon be preached by Rev. R. T. Dillard, D. D., or by Rev. G. Mathews, as his alternate.

# KENTUCKY AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

#### FORMED IN LEXINGTON, MAY 3, 1839.

The sixth annual meeting was held in Henderson, on Friday, October 18th, 1845.

The annual sermon was preached by Rev. S. Baker, from Psalms 119, 105, followed by a collection, amounting to \$14 18.

The names of life members, subscribers, and delegates from auxiliaries, were enrolled. Rev. Rufus Babcock, D. D., Cor. Sec. of the American and Foreign Bible Society, was present.

The report of the Board of Managers was read. It stated that Rev. Ira M. Allen acted as agent for a few months, and obtained \$840 70. Among his collections were 15 life memberships, with the promise of 13 more. It also stated that the Depository of Bibles and Testaments in Louisville was kept up successfully, the receipts being \$230 76. The brethren who have attended to the sales, have acted gratuitously.

The Treasurer's report was read, shewing that \$1,279 12 had been received, of which \$1,140 70 had been sent to the parent society. The sum of \$244 50 had been transmitted to the parent society by Rev. J. M. Pendleton, and the Bethel Society, making a total of \$1,385 20 sent to the treasury of the American and Foreign Bible Society. It was voted that the Board correspond with Rev. T. R. Cressy, of Ohio, agent of the American and Foreign Bible Society, in reference to his spending a portion of his time in Kentucky.

The next annual meeting was appointed at Georgetown, on Friday, October 17, 1845. Rev. A. Goodell, of Frankfort, was appointed to preach the annual sermon, and Rev. W. F. Nelson, of Covington, his alternate.

# KENTUCKY BAPTIST MINISTERS MEETING.

### ORGANIZED AT FRANKFORT, JAN. 10, 1835.

The ninth annual meeting was held on Thursday, Oct. 17th, 1845, in Henderson. Twenty ministers were present, namely :

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Rev. J. M. Frost.

Rev. Wm. C. Buck was appointed Moderator, and Rev. T. G. Keen, Secretary.

An Essay on "Ministerial Deportment," was read by Rev. R. T. Dillard. An Essay on "The best method of conducting missionary efforts in Kentucky," was read by Rev. J. M. Frost. An Essay on "Open Communion" was read by Rev. T. L. Garrett. A skeleton of a sermon was read by Rev. T. G. Keen, on John 15, 5. Rev. Thomas Downs, as the oldest minister present, and Rev. A. M. Henry as the youngest, related their Christian experience and call to the ministry. Brethren Keen, Morrison, Henry, Mathews, Grace, Garrett, Wiggin and McCalla, gave an account of the state of the state of religion in their respective communities.

The following duties were assigned for the next annual meeting: Introductory Sermon by Rev. H. Malcom. Essays by Rev. A. Goodell, on "The advantages of convenient places of worship;" by Rev. T. S. Malcom, on "The value of Sabbath School instruction;" by F. A. Willard, on "The advantages and disadvantages of protracted meetings." Rev. G. W. Allen and Rev. G. Mason to present, each, a skeleton of a sermon.

Adjourned, to meet in Georgetown, Oct. 16th, 1845.

# CHINA MISSION SOCIETY OF KENTUCKY.

The annual meeting was held in Henderson, on Friday, Oct. 18th, 1844 The annual sermon was preached on Sunday morning, by Rev. W. C. Buck. The following officers were elected;

A letter was read by Rev. R. T. Dillard, from some unknown friend in Courtland, Ala., containing twenty dollars.

The amount transmitted to the Board at Boston during the year was \$256 08. The Treasurer, brother Peter, reported the sum of \$10 75 in hands, and the sum of \$134 04 in the hands of Rev. W. C. Buck, the former treasurer, making the sum of \$144 79 belonging to the Society. The sum of \$759 14 had been sent to the Board at Boston by churches and individuals, making a total of \$1,015 22 forwarded to the treasurer at Boston, from Kentucky, as acknowledged in the Missionary Magazine. Of this sum, \$608 93 was specially designated for CHINA—\$75 00 for the Karens—\$31 41 for Africa, and the remainder, \$192 58, for general purposes. Of the total amount forwarded to Boston, the sum of \$500 was a legacy of John L. Norton, of Russellville, for CHINA, and the sum of \$224 77 was from the Second Baptist Church in Louisville. No agent was employed by the Society during the year. Bro. John Stevens, agent of the Boston Board, received and forwarded to Boston \$26 70, and states that 782 copies of the Macedonian, and 58 copies of the Missionary Magazine, are taken in Kentucky.

It was voted that Rev. E. Kincaid be affectionately invited to visit the

churches in this State, and to devote as much of his time as practicable, to promote the interests of this Society.

Rev. Thomas S. Malcom was appointed to preach the next annual sermon, and Rev. H. B. Wiggin his alternate.

Adjourned, to meet in Georgetown, in October, 1845.

# MINISTERIAL EDUCATION SOCIETY.

## FORMED IN HENDERSON, OCT. 19th, 1844.

Immediately upon adjournment of the General Association, R. T. Dillard was called to the chair, and F. C. McCalla appointed Secretary. The committee appointed at a similar meeting the year previous, to raise \$500 towards the erection of a College building at Georgetown, for beneficiaries, reported that the sum had been secured. The Treasurer of the College then stated, that in addition to the \$500 named, Bro. W. W. Gardner had obtained in cash and notes, the sum of \$3,500, and that a three story brick building had been erected, (since named Paulding Hall,) which would accommodate 30 beneficiaries, when completed, which would be in about three months.

It was then proposed to form a Society, the object of which should be, to aid in acquiring a suitable education, such indigent, pious young men of the Baptist denomination, as shall give satisfactory evidence to the churches of which they are members, that they are called of God to the gospel ministry. Remarks were made by brethren Dillard, T. S, Malcom, Goodell, Nelson, Frost, McCalla and others, approving cordially of the formation of such a Society.

A CONSTITUTION was then formed.

ART. 1. The Society shall be called the Ministerial Education Society.

ART. 2. The object of this Society shall be to aid in acquiring a suitable education, such indigent, pious young men of the Baptist denomination, as shall give satisfactory evidence to the churches of which they are members, that they are called to the gospel ministry.

ART. 3. Any person may become a member of this Society for the current year, by paying fifty cents. The payment of twenty dollars, at one time, shall constitute any person a member for life. The payment of fifty dollars, at one time, shall constitute a director for life.

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ART. 4. Any Baptist Church, Association, or Education Society, contributing five dollars annually, shall be considered auxiliary, and shall be entitled to one delegate, and to an additional delegate for every additional five dollars.

ART. 5. The officers of this Society shall be a President, a Vice President, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer, and twenty Directors, to be elected annually, who shall together constitute a Board for the transaction of business, five of whom, when regularly convened, shall constitute a quorum.

ART. 6. The Board shall have charge of the pecuniary concerns of the Society, appoint necessary agents, receive the applications of candidates for aid, and judge of their qualifications; determine the place where beneficiaries shall pursue their studies; determine the amount of aid to be afforded them, and the conditions upon which it shall be given; and give vigilant attention to the character of their beneficiaries, that none may be received or continued who are not truly deserving of assistance. An annual report shall be made to the Society.

AET. 7. A Scholarship shall consist of an annuity or contribution of fifty dollars a year. When a scholarship is founded by an individual or a church. it shall be designated by the name of the individual or church, unless otherwise directed.

ART. 8. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held, in connection with the General Association of Baptists in Kentucky.

ART. 9. This Constitution shall not be altered, except at an annual meeting, and by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

## GENERAL ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS IN KENTUCKY.

#### ORGANIZED IN LOUISVILLE, OCTOBER, 1837.

The eighth annual meeting of the General Association of Baptists in Kentucky, was held with the Baptist Church in Georgetown, commencing on Saturday, Oct. 18th, 1845. The Introductory Sermon was preached by Rev. Ryland T. Dillard, D. D., of Fayette co., from 2d Corinthians 5, 17: "Therefore, if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new."

The meeting was called to order, the Moderator and Secretary of last year officiating. The following Associations and Churches were represented:

Voted, unanimously, That Rev. James M. Frost be continued as our General Agent.

The following resolutions were offered and adopted :

*Resolved*, That union among the various societies and associations of Baptists in the south, south-western and western States and Territories, is essential to the accomplishment of the greatest amount of good.

*Resolved*, That in order to accomplish this union, we dissolve our auxiliary connection with the American Baptist Home Mission Society, and become auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention.

*Resolved*, That the terms of the auxiliaryship to the Southern Convention be the same as those by which we were connected with the American Baptist Home Mission Society.

The General Agent presented his annual report, which was read, and referred to the Board for publication.

#### REPORT OF THE GENERAL AGENT.

As Agent of the General Association of Baptists in Kentucky, I have travelled 2820 miles, preached 105 sermons, made almost as many missionary addresses, visited about 30 counties, attended 5 associations, each of which invited me to take up a collection on the Sabbath for the General Association, and passed resolutions favoring the object. I assisted in the ordination of one minister. I have received \$1,436. I have paid out by order of the Board \$767, leaving a balance paid over to your treasurer of \$669.

A great deal of missionary labor has also been performed among the destitute, and at weak points. The church at OWENSBORO, Davies co., a very important point, was visited by me, by direction of the Board, and arrangements were made to pay off the entire debt upon their meeting-house, of \$1,000, or \$1,200. The church at HODGENSVILLE, Larue co., which the Board also directed me to visit, has paid off a considerable portion of the debt upon their meeting-house, and it is hoped, that upon the plan presented by your agent, they will soon raise the entire amount of \$600 or \$700.

The missionary feeling in this State is evidently ripening. I have met with very little opposition in the whole course of my agency.

Brethren, I cannot too strongly urge the importance of continuing the work of supplying the destitution of our own State, with enlarged and persevering efforts. There are now several fields which should be occupied immediately, viz: Madison co. and vicinity, Sharpsburg and vicinity, a part of Grant county, Pendleton county and Harrison county, western part of Louisville, Hardinsburg, &c.

Frost, our General Agent, during the past year; and gratefully acknowledge his generosity, in relinquishing one-third of the salary voted him by the General Association, and his fidelity and zeal in carrying out the operations of the General Association.

The Treasurer presented his report, which was accepted, being examined by the auditing committee, and found correct and properly attested, and referred to the Board for publication.

*Voted*, That the next meeting of the General Association be held at Danville.

A communication from Bracken Association; applications from Louisville, Hardinsburg, Crittenden, Jeffersontown, and Sharpsburg, for missionary appointments, were severally considered and favorably referred to the acting Board.

Adjourned, to meet at 2 o'clock, P. M. Prayer by Rev. W. G. Craig. Monday, Afternoon.

Prayer by Rev. V. E. Kirtley, of Bardstown.

Voted, That we approve of the Convention to be held in Frankfort, Ky., on Tuesday, the 10th of February, at 7 o'clock, P. M., for the adoption of measures to secure a more general and solemn observance of the Lord's day, and learn with pleasure that Rev. Justin Edwards, Secretary of the American and Foreign Sabbath Union, is expected to be present.

Voted, That all the missionaries of the General Association be instructed to use their best endeavors to sell to as many families as practicable, the cheap theological books and tracts published by the AMERICAN BAPTIST PUB-LICATION SOCIETY, and procure subscribers to the Baptist Banner, and the Western Baptist Review; and in the present deficiency of organized agencies for such labor, we strongly recommend every Baptist minister in our State to make exertions in their behalf.

Voted, That we gratefully acknowledge the readiness of the AMERICAN TRACT SOCIETY in furnishing our missionaries with a quantity of religious tracts for gratuitous distribution among the destitute; and that the Board apply for a donation of tracts for the ensuing year, sufficient for the missionaries connected with the General Association, and with the district associations.

*Voted*, That the objects of the General Association demand the *first*, the most prompt and energetic efforts of Kentucky Baptists.

The following resolution was offered and adopted:

Whereas, Rev. Dr. Pattison, President of the "Western Baptist Theological Institute," at Covington, Ky., has refused, though called upon, to define publicly his position in relation to the decision of the Acting Board of Foreign Missions, in answer to the Alabama resolutions, with which Board he was then connected; and, whereas, the Board of Trustees of said Institute, in their answer for him, while they assure us that he protested against that decision, have failed to give the reasons of that protest, and declare also that Rev. Dr. Pattison is, "by education and principle an anti-slavery man," therefore—

Resolved, That in the opinion of this association, the Western Baptist Theological Institute ought not, under present circumstances, to receive the apport of the Baptists of Kentucky.

Voted, That the printing of the Minutes be referred to the Board of Managers:

Voted, That Rev: Ryland T. Dillard, Rev. John L. Waller, Rev. Howard Malcom, Rev. James M. Frost, Rev. A. D. Sears, and Rev. G. Mathews, be messengers to the Southern Convention, to be held in Richmond, Va., commencing on Wednesday, June 10th, 1846.

Voted, That Rev. J. M. Frost, of Georgetown, be appointed to preach the next Introductory Sermon, and that Rev. William M. Pratt, of Lexington, be his alternate.

*Voted*, That we hereby tender our grateful acknowledgments to the church and citizens of Georgetown and vicinity, for their kindness and hospitality.

#### Annual Report of the Board of the General Association.

The Board of Managers present their annual report to the General Association, with heartfelt gratitude to God for the success which has attended the labors of the past year.

#### The General Agent.

The General Agent, Rev. James M. Frost, has labored during the year greatly to the satisfaction of the Board. For his services we have paid him \$500. The amount of labor performed by him; a general view of the most important locations in the State, and their claims upon us as Baptists; the condition of the churches, &c., are exhibited in his annual report, which will be laid before your body.

## Rev. Henry F. Buckner.

We have appointed Rev. Henry F. Buckner to labor for one year in Greenupsburg, Greenup co., Clarksburg, Lewis co., and vicinity, (the extreme north-eastern part of the State,) with a salary of \$400, of which \$200 is to be paid by the Board, and \$100 to be raised in the field of labor. We make the following extracts from his report:

"I set out for my field of labor the first day of March, 1845, and arrived in Greenupsburg on the 19th of the same month. I found it to be an interesting county-town on the Ohio river. There were but two Baptists in the place, both females. There is no house of worship in the town, except it be a school-house, in which preaching is kept up by the Methodists. A Presbyterian minister preaches occasionally in the court-house: I have preached in the court-house once a month, generally the 4th Sunday. I have baptized two. The citizens have shown me much kindness, generally allowing me a full house on preaching days. There are a few Methodists and Presbyterians, and it affords me great pleasure to state that the latter have manifested towards me much Christian kindness: "when I was a stranger they took me in."

"From Greenupsburg down the Ohio river to Salem church, in the Bracken Association, is very destitute of Baptist preaching. From 16 miles above Greenupsburg to the Falls of Blane, (about 44 miles,) there is no Baptist preacher; and from thence up Blane and Big Sandy, is an unexplored region of destitution, sufficient of itself to require the whole time of a missionary, and I would respectfully suggest the propriety of your attending to the claims and wants of this section, as it is entirely out of my reach:

"Clarksburg, the county seat of Lewis, is a small place, but the citizens take great interest in coming to preaching. There was once a respectable Baptist church in the vicinity, but nothing now remains to remind one of its former standing, except it be the ruined walls of a meeting-house, the graves in which some of the ancient members sleep, and perhaps one or two members who survive, and who now belong to other churches. There is no church in Clarksburg of any denomination, though preaching is regularly kept up by the Methodists.

"A neighborhood, about midway between Greenupsburg and Clarksburg, is a place of much promise for the cause of Christ. When I first visited this place there were but four Baptists, two belonging to a church ten miles distant, and two colored members of a church in the Bracken Association. I have preached there once a month, and at this time there are 17 members, who were yesterday constituted into a church, besides several converts, who no doubt will soon become members: There is no church of any other denomination in the neighborhood, and the Lord permitted me to be the first ordained Baptist preacher who ever visited them. The brethren have procured a deed to two acres of land at the sources of four creeks, all of which are thickly settled, on which they have completed a commodious house of worship: In this neighborhood I distributed, at one time, 12 Bibles, 40 numbers of the Macedonian, 12 tracts, 1 Hinton's History of Baptism, 1 Howell on Communion, and 1 Fuller's Gospel; being all the books I had for distribution, and could have usefully distributed four times the number.

"Grayson, the county town of Carter, is a small place, but the county joining it is thickly settled. In this place there is no church of any denomination, though preaching is regularly kept up by the Methodists, and occasionally by the Reformers or Campbellites. My circuit has been so extensive that I have never been permitted to preach there, though I have it in contemplation to do so as soon as I can:

"There is a neighborhood on Blane, (a creek running into the Big Sandy river,) in which I have preached a few times, and in which there is a good prospect for establishing a church: "Louisa, the county town of Lawrence, is a place about the size of Greenupsburg, in which there is no church of any denomination, and no Baptist preaching. It is so distant from my field of labor that I have never had an opportunity of visiting it.

"The encouragements and invitations which God has given the Baptist denomination, to keep a domestic missionary constantly employed in my field of labor, are many, and the obligations very binding, and it would rejoice me much to set them forth at length. I cannot forbear to allude to a few of them; 1st, The great extenf of *destitution*: It is true there are a few amiable ministers here of our denomination, but all of them who are ordained have the care of four churches, or are so confined that they cannot visit the destitute: Greenupsburg, Clarksburg, Grayson and Louisa, are interesting county towns, growing in population, but there is no meeting-house for any denomination in either of those places, and no Baptist preaching, except from the occasional visits of travelling ministers: There are also several villages, as Springville, Cannonsburg, Old Town, and Catletsburg, in which there is no stated Baptist preaching: My field of laber contains more destitution than can be supplied by any one missionary, and for information in reference to the part of Kentucky bordering on Big Sandy river, and above me, I would respectfully refer you to Rev. John Young, who has long and faithfully labored to sustain the Baptist cause in this region. 2d, There are many pious persons, of other denominations, who cannot persuade the ministers of their respective churches to administer to them the ordinance of Baptism, as the Bible and "their consciences" dictate, whereas if we were to keep a missionary employed, such Christians could obtain the ordinance at his hands: As an illustration, I have baptized, in one neighborhood alone, 7 such, among whom was a minister. 3d, The pressing invitations of the people. On every hand I am invited to visit neighborhoods, with many of which invitations I cannot possibly comply. 4th, Another call for the labors of a missionary is from the many persons employed at furnaces, in constant daily labor. In Greenup county alone there are, if I am correctly informed, 14 iron furnaces, seven of which are now in blast, and each employing the daily labor of at least 66 men. many of whom have families. There is no Baptist preaching at any of these furnaces. There are also many furnaces in the adjoining counties, laboring under the same inconveniences. 5th, A large portion of those who do not profess religion, are favorable to Baptist sentiments, and it is reasonable to hope that people of this class will more readily receive the gospel when preached by a man of their own religious sentiments, than by one against whom they are prejudiced. To a great extent, God has placed such people under our care, and it will be for us to account at the "judgment of the great day," for the interest we take in their behalf.

"From the first of March to the eighth of October, (seven months.) I have travelled 1547 miles, preached 150 sermons, baptized 26 persons, delivered 8 Temperance addresses, obtained 116 signers to the Temperance pledge, 4 subscribers to the Baptist Banner, assisted in ordaining one minister, in constituting one church, and distributed 12 Bibles, &c."

#### Our other Missionaries.

We have also appointed during the year Rev. William Head, to labor for

nine months within the bounds of the Goshen Association, and the Davies county Association, with a salary of \$225, one half to be raised in his field of labor, and the other half to be paid by the Board.

Rev. William Combs, a student of the College, was appointed to preach for the church at Long-lick, once a month for a year. The Board is to pay him \$25, with the understanding that he raise in the church \$25. He has excited a great interest, and is creating a happy and extensive influence.

## Rev. G. G. Goss has labored for us in Paris and vicinity.

## Cause for Encouragement.

When we contrast the present operations of the General Association with that which existed two years since, we feel that we have great reason to be encouraged. Then, but little interest was felt, not a missionary employed, the treasury exhausted, and a heavy debt incurred, with but a poor prospect of its being speedily liquidated. Now, a deep interest is felt, which is widening and deepening, several missionaries are in the the field, abundant means of liquidating the debt have been obtained, and there are unappropriated funds in the treasury.

#### The Work to be Done.

Still much, very much, remains to be done. We have only made a beginning in the great cause of extending the knowledge of God's word. 'The cry has been heard from almost every quarter, "Come over and help us," and our hearts have been deeply pained, because we have had no help to send.— Verily may it be said in relation to the moral prospect spread out before the Baptists of Kentucky: "The harvest truly is plentuous, but the laborers are few." With what deep and heartfelt emotions should we pray to the "Lord of the harvest, that he would send forth more laborers into his harvest."

We would take this occasion, through the delegates to the General'Association, to urge upon the churches the importance of seeking out the young brethren in their midst, whose duty it may be to become ambassadors of Jesus Christ, and affording them the means necessary to prepare themselves for this responsible calling. In this way alone may we hope to see faithful ministers of the gospel scattered over all the dark portions of our State, and kindling lights which shall cheer the hearts of many who are now sitting "in the region and shadow of death."

In conclusion, we would recommend the continuance of your present faithful and efficient agent, and pray that the spirit of God may be powed out upon the churches, that they may feel it their highest joy to contribute *abundantly* to the support of this most glorious cause, and thus aid in spreading the glad tidings of salvation.

#### MISSIONARIES EMPLOYED BY THE DISTRICT ASSOCIATIONS.

An adequate idea of the amount of Home Missionary effort in Kentucky, requires that the labor performed by district associations should be taken into account. Some of them are acting vigorously. Since the Annual Report was prepared, the Minutes of several Associations have been published, and we make the following extracts:

#### Bethel Association.

At the annual meeting in Russellville, commencing Sept. 27th, 1845, the following missionary labor was reported:

Rev. R. W. Nixon reported 117 days labor, 98 sermons, 29 baptized, 1232 miles travelled.

 Rev. W. D. Baldwin reported 97 days labor, 66 sermons, 60 exhortations, 3 lectures on Sunday Schools, 1 Sunday School organized, aided in the constitution of 3 churches and ordination of 1 minister, travelled 1300 miles.

Rev. J. Mallory reported 80 days labor, 73 sermons, 80 exhortations, 19 baptized, visited as many families as practicable for religious conversation, travelled 1,000 miles.

Rev. W. S. Baldry reported 91 days labor, 84 sermons, 22 exhortations, aided in the constitution of 3 churches and ordination of 1 minister, travelled 1300 miles.

Rev. J. Lamb reported 92 days, 92 sermons, 10 baptized, two temperance addresses, aided in the ordination of 3 ministers.

Brethren Watts, Morrow, Williams, S. S. Mallory, Morton, Gunn and Felts, reported missionary labor, making in the aggregate 92 days and 91 sermons.

The Association appointed six missionaries for the coming year, viz: R. W. Nixon, W. S. Baldry, J. Lamb, J. Mallory, W. D. Baldwin, and N. Lacy. The sum of \$289 50 was sent up by the churches for missionary labor, and during the meeting, \$166 was subscribed in money, and 205 days in labor.

A collection of \$60 was also taken up to send bro. J. Gunn to Georgetown College.

In 1843 a resolution was passed to sustain the American Baptist Publication Society by their "prayers, contributions, and best efforts to circulate its publications." Two hundred dollars was at once subscribed as a book fund. In 1844 a report was made of the sale of books to the amount of \$263 99. In 1846 a report was made of sales during the year, amounting to \$400.

## South District Association.

Rev. R. P. Steenbergen acted as missionary during the year, and reported at the meeting at New Providence, Aug. 16, 1845, that he had travelled 700 miles, preached 100 sermons. He visited nearly every church in the Association, and made an interesting statement of the location and condition of the churches.

Other extracts might be made from the Minutes of the Bracken Association, &c.

Resolved, That we have unshaken confidence in the American and Foreign Bible Society, and will cordially continue our support; and that we deem the adherence of the great Baptist family to this institution more especially important, at this time, when we need every fraternal ligament which may tend to preserve us from the sad catastrophe of a geographical division.

Resolved, That we appoint Rev. A. D. Sears, Rev. John L. Waller, and Rev. W. C. Buck, delegates to the next annual meeting of the American and Foreign Bible Society, the Board having authority to fill vacancies or make additions.

*Voted*, That the Minutes of this Society be printed in connection with those of the General Association, and that we bear our proportion of the expense.

Voted, That Rev. John L. Waller preach the next Introductory Sermon, and that Rev. D. R. Campbell be his alternate.

Voted, That our next annual meeting be held in DANVILLE, on Friday, Oct. 16th, 1846.

### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS.

The Board of the Kentucky and Foreign Bible Society, from the position they occupy as a state institution, must always feel the want of material out of which to frame a report which will interest an annual meeting. Nevertheless, the attention of the Society is called to the operations of its Board during the past year. But when we attempt a review of the past in the history of this department of our benevolence, and realize how little has been done in proportion to what might have been, especially when we consider the abundant facilities for doing good, with which the Lord has blessed many of the churches, it creates in our minds melancholy sensations; and we are led to reflect solemnly upon the alarming religious declension to which our beloved Zion has been subjected.

In the beginning of the year, Rev. T. R. CRESSY spent a few weeks in Kentucky as agent of the Society, during which time he visited many of our churches, and from the kindness with which he was received, as well as the success which attended his agency,, we are justified in believing that the Bible Society has a strong hold upon the affections of the Kentucky Baptists. Yet, since the excitement created by the avowed opinions of our Board of Foreign Missions, the effect arising from the distrust created thereby in our churches, in reference to every department of our common benevolence, has to some extent been felt by your Society.

The Board has endeavored, by appeals made to many of the most distinguished preachers of the denomination, to create an interest in behalf of the Society, by having its claims placed before each association in the State. How far they have succeeded, time alone will develope. The Board has from time to time, as remittances of money have been made to the treasury of the parent society, been in the habit of ordering the return of one half, in Bibles and Testaments, of each sum remitted. An assortment is always kept at the depository in Louisville, from which several of the auxiliaries of the State Society have been supplied. The amount of sales during the year from the depository has been considerable, and there are now on hand Bibles and Testaments to the amount of \$346. The Society is referred, for an account of the monetary operations of the Board, to the report of the Treasurer.

In closing an account of its action, the Board would impress upon the minds of the Society the melancholy truth that the Bible Society is now one of the very few ligaments which bind in benevolent action American Baptists. Consequently, all must see how important it is that we come up to this great work with increased zeal and more liberal contributions each succeeding year, until the pages of God's pure word, as it emanated from the mind of the Holy Spirit, shall be unfolded to the whole human family.

# KENTUCKY BAPTIST MINISTERS MEETING.

#### ORGANIZED AT FRANKFORT, JAN. 10, 1835.

#### CONSTITUTION.

Whereas, the improvement of the Christian ministry in vital piety, mutual love, union in principles and feelings, and co-operation in whatever may promote the kingdom of Christ, and the better preaching of the Gospel, is an object of paramount importance; and whereas, we feel a deep conviction that the stated meeting of ministers, and the free discussion of important subjects, relating to doctrinal, practical, and experimental religion, cannot fail to contribute to mutual improvement and the formation of ministerial character on a broader scale, and the uniting in a firmer phalanx of the armies of the living God, we adopt the following constitution:

ART. 1. This meeting shall be known by the name of the KENTUCKY BAPTIST MINISTERS MEETING. ART. 2. This meeting shall be composed of ordained ministers and licentiates,

ART. 2. This meeting shall be composed of ordained ministers and licentiates, in the State of Kentucky, by a vote of a majority of those present, and by signing the Constitution.

ART. 3. The officers of this meeting shall be a Moderator, chosen at each session, and a Secretary, chosen annually.

ART. 4. The exercises of this meeting shall consist of a sermon, short written essays on important religious subjects, plans of sermons, explanation of passages of scripture by persons appointed at a previous meeting, together with such other exercises as may from time to time be introduced, with free conversation on those subjects and exercises.

those subjects and exercises. ART. 5. The meeting shall convene annually at the time and place of the Kenrucky Baptist General Association, and at such other times and places as shall be thought convenient.

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# CHINA MISSION SOCIETY OF KENTUCKY.

#### CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE 1. This Society shall be known by the name of the CHINA MISSION So-CIETY OF KENTUCKY.

ART. 2. The object of the Society shall be to promote the preaching of the Gospel in CHINA, and among the nations that write, read or speak the Chinese language. ART. 3. Any person may become a member of this Society by contributing not less than one dollar annually. The payment of twenty dollars shall constitute any person a member for life. The payment of fifty dollars shall constitute a director

ART. 4. Any Baptist Church, Association, or Missionary Society, contributing

Arr. 4. Any Baptist Church, Association, or missionary Society, contributions five dollars annually, shell be cousidered auxiliary, and shall be entitled to one delegate, and to an additional delegate for every additional five dollars. Arr. 5. The officers of this Society shall be a President, six vice-Presideuts, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer, and twenty directors; twelve of whom shall reside in Louisville or vicinity. Five shall constitute a quorum for business. All the officers shall be members of the Baptist Church.

Annual report shall be made to the Society. Arr. 6. The annual meeting of this Society shall be held in connection with the Kentucky Baptist General Association. A sermon shall be preached at each arnual meeting, followed by a collection for the China Mission.

ART. 7. This Constitution shall not be altered, except at an annual meeting, and by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

The annual meeting was held in Georgetown, on Friday, October 17th, 1845, the President and Secretary of last year officiating.

The Constitution was read, after which the names of members were enrolled. Rev. J. B. Jeter, of Richmond, Va,, President of the Board of Managers for Foreign Missions of the Southern Baptist Convention, was invited to a seat, as a representative of that body.

Voted, That the annual sermon be preached at 7 o'clock, P. M. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year :

The committee reported the following resolutions, which were severally adopted :

Resolved, That we advise Rev. Issachar J. Roberts, missionary to China, to place himself under the direction of the Board of Managers for Foreign Missions of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Resolved, That we deem it necessary to renew our exertions to raise funds. for the spread of the gospel in China.

Resolved, That this Society will pay over the funds now in the treasury, with any additional funds that may be collected during the ensuing year, to the Treasurer of the Board of Foreign Missions, in Richmond, with the understanding that such funds shall be appropriated to the support of Rev. Issachar J. Roberts, and his assistants, in China, as far as may be necessary to their support.

*Voted*, That our Board be authorized to appoint delegates to the meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention, to be held in Richmond, Va., June 10th, 1846, in proportion to the amount of funds transmitted by this Society.

*Voted*, That our Minutes be printed in connection with those of the General Association, the expense to be paid from our treasury.

Voted, That the next annual sermon be preached by Rev. W. F. Broaddus, of Versailles; Rev. J. M. Frost was appointed his alternate.

Adjourned, to meet in Danville, on Friday, October 16th, 1846.

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF THE CHINA MISSION SOCIETY.

At the annual meeting held in Henderson, Oct. 18th, 1844, it was voted by the China Mission Society, that Rev. Eugenio Kincaid, for many years a missionary in Asia, be requested to visit the State, and promote the objects of the Society. Letters were immediately sent to Bro. Kincaid, and to the Board at Boston, asking their consent that Bro. K, who was then acting as their agent, should comply with the invitation of our Society. The Board gave their consent to the proposed arrangement, but the letter to Bro. Kincaid, in consequence of his travelling as an agent, did not reach him till the last of December. He then wrote, expressing his willingness to come, at whatever period should be thought best, stating that he preferred that mass meetings should be held. Instead of waiting for a reply, though at once forwarded, he started for Kentucky, and arrived in January. It was, of course, impossible to hold mass meetings in Kentucky at that season of the year. He visited Louisville and Maysville, and proceeded to New York, expecting to return in the summer.

The Board, still expecting the services of Bro. Kincaid, made no effort to secure another agent.

A called meeting of the China Mission Society was held in Shelbyville, commencing on Wednesday, June 4th. A committee of five was appointed, consisting of Rev. A. D. Sears, Rev. J. L. Waller, Rev. J. M. Frost, Rev. S. L. Helm, and Rev. W. C. Buck, to investigate the recent proceedings of the parent board, and propose such measures, for the consideration of the Society, as the facts in the case demanded. The committee reported the following preamble and resolutious, which were adopted :

"Inasmuch as the Acting Board of the Triennial Convention, in their answer to the Alabama Convention, have, in our opinion, identified themselves with the abolitionists of the north, have infracted the constitution of the convention appointing them, and infringed upon the rights and independence of the churches, by an assumption of unconstitutional power; and whereas, the General Board, at their recent meeting in Providence, virtually sustained the Acting Board, in the instance of misrule complained of above, therefore,

*Resolved*, That this Society feel it incumbent on them to express, in strong terms, their entire disapproval of the course of the Board of the Triennial Convention, in the matters referred to, and that, therefore, this Society ought to dissolve the auxiliary connection with the Board.

Resolved, That this Society entirely concur in and approve of the measures adopted, and the resolutions passed by their Board in Louisville, on the 17th of April, in reference to the acts and doings of the Poston Board, and set forth in their proceedings.

Resolved, That the funds of this Society be hereafter appropriated under the direction of our own Board, to the support of Rev. Issachar J. Roberts and his native assistants, at Canton, in China, until the Society shall be satisfied that duty requires them to direct their funds through another channel, or to appropriate them to another object.

*Resolved*, That the churches in Kentucky and the adjacent States be, and are hereby earnestly solicited, to aid this Society to sustain Bro. Roberts and his native assistants, in preaching the gospel, circulating the scriptures, and distributing tracts among the people of China.

Resolved, That it is desirable that the Board of this Society should open a correspondence with the Board of Managers for Foreign Missions of the Southern Baptist Convention, located in Richmond, Va., in order that this Society may be informed, at the earliest possible date, whether any, and if any, what arrangements are entered into between them and the Boston Board, as to the transfer of missionaries, &c."

About eight hunnred dollars have been transmitted to the Board at Boston, during the year, from this State.

A letter was received by our President, in the spring, from Fro. Roberts, stating that the Board in Boston was unwilling for him to remove to Canton, but that he had determined to labor there, although compelled to throw himself upon the generosity of the friends of Missions in that city. Last week the Board received information from a friend in New York, that Bro. Roberts had been without a salary since Jan. 1st, 1845, being dependent upon the charity of the public. We had supposed that he was as usual receiving his support from the United States, and grieved to hear of the unpleasantness of his present situation, immediately voted two hundred dollars for his support, being all the money in our treasury, which, by the time of your meeting, will have reached New York, on its way to China.

Your Board cherish the hope that our beloved brother will be hereafter entirely supported from Kentucky, and that the fact, that Bro. Roberts will be without support, unless we come up to his help, will at once incite to action. At least one thousand dollars should be transmitted during the coming year, for his support, and that of his native assistants.

# MINISTERIAL EDUCATION SOCIETY.

## FORMED IN HENDERSON, OCT. 19th, 1844.

#### CONSTITUTION.

ART. 1. The Society shall be called the MINISTERIAL EDUCATION SOCIETY. ART. 2. The object of this Society shall be to aid in acquiring a suitable educa-tion, such indigent, plous young men of the Baptist denomination, as shall give satisfactory evidence to the churches of which they are members, that they are called to the gospel ministry. ART. 3. Any person may become a member of this Society for the current year, by paying fifty cents. The payment of twenty dollars, at one time, shall consti-tute any person a member for life. The payment of fifty dollars, at one time, shall constitute a director for life.

tute any person a member for life. The payment of fifty dollars, at one time, shall constitute a director for life. ART. 4. Any Baptist Church, Association, or Education Society, contributing five dollars annually, shall be considered auxiliary, and shall be entitled to one delegate, and to an additional delegate for every additional five dollars. ART. 5. The officers of this Society shall be a President, a Vice President, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer, and twenty Directors, to be elected annually, who shall together constitute a Board for the transaction of business, five of whom, when regularly convened, shall constitute a quorum. ART. 6. The Board shall have charge of the pecuniary concerns of the Society, appoint necessary agents, receive the applications of candidates for aid, and judge of their qualifications; determine the place where beneficiaries shall pursue their studies, determine the amount of aid to be afforded them, and the conditions upon which it shall be given; and give vigilant attention to the character of their benefi-ciaries, that none may be received or continued who are not truly deserving of as-

Which it shall be given; and give vigilant attention to the character of their bench-ciaries, that none may be received or continued who are not truly deserving of as-sistance. An annual report shall be made to the Society. ART. 7. A Scholarship shall consist of an annuity or contribution of fifty dol-lars a year. When a scholarship is founded by an individual or a church, it shall be designated by the name of the individual or church, unless otherwise directed. ART. 8. The annual meeting shall be held on the Monday after the 3d Sunday in October, at the place of the annual meeting of the General Association. ART. 9. This Constitution shall not be altered, except at an annual meeting, and by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

The first annual meeting of the Ministerial Education Society, was held in Georgetown, on Monday afternoon, October 20th, 1845. The President of the Society being absent, the Vice President, Rev. H. Malcom, took the chair, and Br. B. T. Blewett acted as Secretary.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF THE MINISTERIAL EDUCATION SOCIETY ..

As the Ministerial Education Society was organized only one year ago, it is suitable that we should briefly describe the object designed to be accomplished by this Society. Immediately upon adjournment of the General Association, at the annual meeting in Henderson, Oct., 1844, Rev. Dr. Dillard was called to the chair. The committee appointed a year previous to raise \$500 towards the erection of a building at Georgetown for the accommodation of beneficiaries, reported that the sum was secured. The Treasurer of the College then stated that Bro. Gardner, a graduate of the college, had performed an agency, which resulted in securing more than \$3,500 in cash and notes, for the same purpose. It was then proposed to form a Society, the object of which should be, to aid in acquiring an education such indigent young men of the Baptist denomination, as shall give satisfactory evidence to the churches of which they are members, that they are called of God to the gospel ministry. The proposition met with favor from all present, and the Society was formed.

It gives us pleasure to state that the formation of the Society has been generally approved, and although but an infant society, we are cheered by the encouragement already received, though no agent has been employed.— About two hundred dollars has been contributed, of which fifty dollars has been appropriated to one of the students of Georgetown College. Most of the money was paid in to our treasury only a short time before the annual meeting, so that only one appropriation has been made.

The importance of ministerial education is, we trust, felt by all of us, and the design of this society being to aid those who are unable to defray their expenses while pursuing their studies, commends it to your affections and contributions. We tender to you our first annual report, having already two life directors by the payment of fifty dollars each, and three life members by the payment of twenty dollars each. We trust that the day of small things will not be despised, and that in coming years scores of young brethren shall be assisted in securing such an education as shall enable them to proclaim, with great success, the unsearchable riches of Christ.
