

A FOREWORD.

Just a few days after the close of the 1918 meeting, our beloved Brother and Clerk of the Association, Rev. J. T. Hoglan died and when the manuscript came into the hands of the moderator it was considered too late to publish the minutes and another reason for not having them published at that time was, there was not money enough on hand to have them published and it was too near our next meeting to get the money from the churches to do so.

The Association just closed, unanimously passed the following resolution: Resolved that the Clerk of this Association make a brief summary of our last meeting and publish it in the minutes of this, our 1919 session. The present clerk is under great obligations to our moderator, Rev. Dana Terry for compiling the statistical table of our last meeting, the most difficult part of the summary.

The fifth session of the Natchitoches Baptist Association was held with the Provencal Baptist Church, Aug. the 30, 31, 1918. Rev. Dana Terry was elected moderator and by previous appointment preached the introductory sermon. Rev. J. T. Hoglan was elected clerk.

The Natchitoches Baptist Association met in its sixth annual session with Central Church, Sept. 4th and 5th, 1919.

Rev. W. J. Ross conducted devotional services and J. B. Wood led in prayer.

We earnestly commend to all of our brethren in the churches the use of the Sunday School as an expression of church work, looking to church attendance.

Orphans' Home.

The committee on Orphans' Home reported as follows:

Our Baptist Orphans' Home is located at Lake Charles, La. and has 102 children in it. Dr. F. C. Flowers, Supt.

These children must eat, wear and be otherwise provided for every day in the year just like other children, and they have no others to look to for this support but Louisiana Baptists.

The means coming in has run lower than for several years.

Bro. Flowers has sent out urgent appeals for immediate help.

The 75 million will not be ready for a long time yet as the collections have not begun yet.

We urge our churches to send a liberal collection to Bro. Flowers at once.

They should have our money, our prayers and our children, that they may abound in that thing unto which God has ordained them. Their urgency under God calls for this Association to enter fully into the apportionment asked of us in the present campaign and we so recommend.

Report on Foreign Missions.

Any just appreciation of the Foreign Mission Board's work and responsibilities, and any effort to provide adequate resources for this work must be based upon a knowledge and just consideration of the extensive fields which the Board is cultivating, the conditions on these fields, the variety of work that is being conducted, and the necessities of the work which we have allowed to accumulate through the years.

The Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention is charged with propagating the gospel in Japan, China, Africa, Italy, Mexico, Brazil, Argentina, Chile, Etc. Such numerous and extensive mission fields put this work out of comparison with anything else we are doing.

On these fields there are vaster numbers of human beings than the human mind can grasp. The population in these lands mounts into the hundreds of millions,—some of them white, some black, some yellow, but all of them the objects of God's love.

The condition of these millions as compared with the people whom we know adds emphasis to the appeal of the great field and the great numbers. These multitudes.

whether in pagan or papal lands, are hanidcapped by ignorance and superstition, by physical suffering, and above all by aggravated sin for which they have found no remedy. If there is any pity in the Christian heart, it ought to be provoked by the deplorable conditions under which millions of our fellow beings on these mission fields are spending their lives while we enjoy the blessings of the gospel and a Christian civilization which it has produced.

But we shall not properly appraise Foreign Missions if we overlook the fact that it includes the evangelization of the lost, the education of the ignorant, the training of the saved, the healing of the sick, the housing of feeble mission churches. Indeed, all that we are doing at home through state mission boards, home mission boards, orphanages, sanitaria and the rest we are doing through the Foreign Mission Board. No adequate provision can be made for a work so extensive, so varied and comprehensive if we put Foreign Missions on a parity with any single Christian enterprise which we are conducting at home.

There is another fact, and a great fact it is, which must be taken into consideration if we are to meet our obligations to this great work at this time. The War immeasurably enlarged our international Christian duty. The heroic efforts and sacrifices which we made to set the world free from the extraordinary restraints of autocracy creates for us a new and larger duty to promote everywhere the internal constraints of the gospel of Christ. The unrestrained freedom of unregenerated

human nature inevitably menaces the world. The extraordinary world situation which we have created with our guns lays upon us the most serious responsibility to send the gospel into all nations.

The Convention at Atlanta in May recognized the new obligations which this extraordinary world situation laid upon Southern Baptists and authorized the Board to undertake reconstruction work in Europe, to hasten with the gospel into disturbed and endangered Russia, and to set up the banner of Christ in Persia, Syria and in Galilee, from whence the blessings of Christ's life and death have flowed down through centuries to us, and to which we are under peculiar obligations. In the new work thus designated for the Foreign Mission Board its task and its needs have been well-nigh doubled. Let churches and individual givers lay to heart these facts in making future contributions to this work.

It is further fitting to say that as poorly as we have supported this great world enterprise, the blessings of heaven have been upon it. Some of the results of the work last year were 5,635 converts baptized, 41 churches organized, two churches assuming self-support, 61,588 patients treated, and 129,298 treatments administered.

The world fields are ripe upon the harvest, but much of the bending grain will be lost if we do not quickly thrust in the sickle. The world has never seen the universal human mind so expectant, so ready to make great decisions, and therefore such need for quick and decisive action by those who would turn that mind to the right things and lead the world by the highway of the cross

back to God. Foreign duty was never so imperious as just now.

The Foreign Mission Board furnishes for free distribution the best tracts and can fill orders for the best books on Foreign Missions. We would, therefore, recommend to our people that they cultivate an acquaintance with the Literature Department of the Board and seek to promote among our church membership a better knowledge of the work.

While the 75-Million Campaign has been presented to the body in another report, your committee on Foreign Missions would add its endorsement of this movement and its admonition to the churches of the Association that there be no failure to give this Campaign the most unqualified, faithful and enthusiastic support. The success of the Campaign will help everything that we are doing and its failure would hurt everything. We have set for ourselves a task worthy of a great people and shall prove ourselves worthy of our inheritance if we accomplish it. The eyes of our Lord and of the world are upon us and we must succeed in this great thing to which we have laid our hands.

Report of State Missions.

This committee is glad to report that our State Missions work is in a prosperous condition. The Board laid out the work for the present year upon the largest basis in the history of the work. In order to meet the increasing expenditures of this year, our churches will have to more than double their gifts to State Missions.

The season that is now upon us is the time to lay great stress upon this. We urge upon all of our churches to thoroughly canvass all their members, to see that every member does a worthy part by this interest. State Mission work lies at the base of all other Christian activities. Many of our foremost churches are the result of state mission endeavor. There are many towns in our state and whole parishes without a Baptist Church. There are 222 towns and villages where no white Baptist church has ever been. We must meet this situation with great courage, consecration and contribution. desire that every messenger visiting in this Association shall feel himself committed to a faithful presentation of this whole matter unto the whole church before the Convention year closes.

Ministerial Relief and Annuities.

This term includes more than we have been accustomed to thinking of in connection with helping our dependent preachers, because it includes provision whereby our young, active ministers can begin to lay by a small per cent of their earnings each year with the assurance that the denomination will add to this amount a liberal per cent, sufficient to greatly lessen the embarassment of declining days. We would urge that all of our preachers under sixty years of age join the Annuity Department and thereby make provision for themselves against a rainy day. But while urging this, we would not forget that noble band of veteran preachers or their widows who have borne with them the burdens incident to pio-

neer life. Our State Mission Board co-operates heartily with the Board of Ministerial Relief and Annuities of Dallas, Texas, in securing information relative to those who are in need of help, and relative to the raising of funds. We urge all of our preachers to make liberal provision for these old ministers, and request a free-will offering upon the floor of this Association.

We, your committee on Home Missions beg leave to report as follows:

Never in the history of Southern Baptists has the term Home Missions seemed quite so meaningful as at the present great hour.

Not that it has not always meant the same thing, but its meaning through the providence of God has become known.

God's hand has so wonderfully moved in our own dear state as to afford opportunities unparalled in any age passed.

In the gift of the Baptist Sanitorium at Alexandria, the Bible Institute at New Orleans, and the French Academy in Acadia Parish, we have splendid proofs of the help the Home Mission Board can give Louisiana.

The mountain school work of our Home Board shows the efficiency of this department of our work, and it is clamoring for enlargement.

The strong force of evangelists employed by this Board is doing our denomination a service that cannot be supplied in any other way.

The help that many of our churches, weak and struggling ones, is receiving in supporting their pastors through the co-operation between our State and Home Boards, and the loans and gifts made in building new church houses cannot be supplied in any other manner.

Our Home Mission work is reaching thousands of Italians, French, Spanish, Mexicans, and others in its immigrant and foreign speaking department.

God is calling us through this 75 million campaign to do larger and more heroic things for His glory through this department of our denominational work.

The ladies held their meeting, preparatory to their organization for the 75 Million Campaign. Mrs. Janie Stephens gave an able and practical address as to how the ladies should organize for this campaign.

A motion was adopted that the apportionment of \$40,000.00 to our Association, to be given in the next five years, in the south-wide 75 Million Campaign, be accepted. Adopted.

Each church was requested to appoint the following members as its leaders in the 75 Million Campaign.

The following resolutions offered by Dr. C. C. Carroll were unanimously adopted by rising vote:

Whereas, we hear with profound regret, of the resignation of Dr. Dana Terry as pastor of the First Baptist Church of Natchitoches, La., therefore, resolved,

- 1. That since Bro. Terry has been among us, we have found him an able, earnest and zealous leader in all questions pertaining to the general good of the people.
 - 2. That we have found him a highly educated,

faithful and sound Gospel Minister of Jesus Christ and an aggressive worker in all Kingdom interests.

- 3. That as Moderator of our Association we have found him an able, well informed and lovable presiding officer and regret to give him up.
- 4. That we pray God to so direct him in His providences, that the able and efficient services of Bro. Terry continue to be given to the Lord's cause in our state.

(Note by the Clerk.) Since the adoption of the above, Dr. Terry has accepted the pastorate of the Baptist Church at Kentwood, the largest church in the State numerically, except the 1st Church of Shreveport.

The following resolution, offered by Rev. J. D. Carroll, was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That after the expenses of getting out the Association minutes are paid, the remainder of the Associational funds be turned over to Bro. J. B. Wood to help pay his expenses to go to see his aged sister in Georgia.

In addition to the above amount, which would have been about eight dollars, Bro. L. E. Hudson proposed to get out the minutes at actual cost and give the remainder of what would have been the regular price of publishing them, as his contribution to the above object.

Since this matter has thus necessarily got into the minutes, it is due the churches and myself to state that I am the oldest of ten children and my sister is the third child. I am 76 years old and she is 73 and very feeble I have seen her but one time in 36 years. Five years ago the churches and Brethren around my home gave me the means to go to see her and I spent two weeks with her.

We are the only two left of ten children.

These facts become known to the Association and it gave me a voluntary collection of \$16. A good Brother and his wife, the latter of whom I have known from Childhood, handed me a check for \$15. These amounts, with the clerk's fee and the above gift of the Association and of Prof. Hudson, gives me ample means to go to see her again, and I start the 15th of September for a sixweek's trip. God bless those who have helped me in this.

Thus closed the 1919 session of the Natchitoches Baptist Association.

From the beginning to the last song and prayer, it was a mountain top experience (writ large) both spiritually and in a business way.

After a song, Prof. E. Godbold led in prayer and the Association adjourned, to meet with Harmony Church, on Thursday, 10 A. M. before the first Sunday in September, 1920, Eld. J. B. Wood to preach the introductory sermon and Eld. J. D. Carroll, alternate.
